THE King's Plate of One Hundred Pounds will be Run for on Lewes Downs in Sussex, on Friday the 12th Day of August instant, by any Horse, Mare or Gelding, being no more than Six Years old the Grass before, as must be certified, under the Hand of the Breeder, carrying 12 Stone, three Heats round the Heat's Course; to be shown and entered at Verrall's Coffee-house in Lewes, on Thursday the 11th Day of August instant, or they are not to Run for the said Plate: And if any Difference arise relating to their Ages, Enting or Running, the same to be determined as usual, according to such his Majesty's Orders or Rules, as shall be produced at the Place of Enting, or Running for the said Plate. And on Saturday the 13th Day of August instant, a Plate of Fifty Guineas will be Run for by any Horse, Mare or Gelding, being no more than Five Years old the Grass before, that never won a Plate or Match of the Value of Fifty Pounds, at any Time before, carrying 10 Stone. The Horses for this Plate to be entered likewise at Verrall's Coffee-house in Lewes on or before Thursday.

LINCOLN RACES 1748.

HIS Majesty's Plate of One Hundred Guineas will be run for on Tuesday the 13th of September next, on the Round Course on the South Side of Lincoln, by any Horse, Mare or Gelding, being no more than six Years old last Grass, carrying twelve Stone, three Heats; to be shewn and entered at the Nag's Head in Waddington on Monday the 12th Day of September in the Evening before they run.
