#### Warfam, March 31.

He Provincial Diets have been every where held, in order to the General Diet, which is to Affemble here the twentieth of the next Monet for the Election of a King.: In most of the Provincial Diets, the Interests of

the Queen have been greatly confidered, and especially in Lithuania : the Nobility of which Dutchy have in their feveral Meetings agreed, That no Piaffi, that is a Native of these Countreys, shall be elected, but such Some days fince aran one as may marry the Queen. rived here a Gentleman fent by Prince Charles of Lorr sine, with particular infructions, to endeavor to gain the Grand Mareschal Sobietski to his fide, and accordingly the faid Gentleman is gone hence for Lublini where the Marefchal at prefent is. They write from thence, that the Deputies of the Army having long attended there, about getting their arrears paid ; and finding that the Commissioners who had the direction of the Matter, still sed them with empty promiles, with-out any intention in reality to give them satisfaction, were upon departure towards the Army, with threats shat they would Confederate, and procure their Moneys that way 3 but the Grand Mareschal Sobietski with his Authority pacified them, telling them amidifs the promiles of fpeedy payment of their Moneys, that this was no time to quarrel amongst themselves. There is appointed a general rifing of the Nobility, to prevent any force, with which the most powerful may think to affist themfelves at the Election ; and even this, we fear will occasion great disorders.

Genoua, March 31. This week arrived here from Naples, the Marquels de Pouar, who was Extraordinary Ambaffador at Vienna from the Crown of Sphin. From Milan we have advice, That the Troops which were marched from thence towards the Franche Comte, are returned again, the Swiffers having refufed them paffage; which the Spaniards very much floatach, and fay is contrary to the Perpetual League between the Smiffers and the Houfe of Auftriz; but it feems the former are offended, Thatafter the most Christian King had, at their earness comte, the Spaniards refuse to accept thereof. The Duke of Mantua continues whereof, the Empress Dowager Eleanor, who is Heir Prefumptive of the Territories of the faid Duke; is fending a perfon of quality to Cafal, to take possibilition in her name, in cafe the Duke fload die. In Milan they continue their Levies.

Vienns, April 8. The fixth inflant Prince Willem of Furftenbergh was brought to Newfladt, not far from hence; where he is kept clofe prifoner: Some begin to talk here of making bis Process. The Count de Souches appointed by the Emperof to command his Porces this Summet, is now here; his Baggage is alteady marched towards Egra in Bohemia, where is appointed the Rendevous, and he himfelf will fuddenly

follow; and in the mean time the Reveral Regiments are on their march to the place of Rendevous. From Hungary we have advice, That the Vifier of Offen had caufed the Chiaus that was lately here, upon his return thither, to be firangled, for not having followed fome orders which he had given him in charge. In Poland, they are preparing for the Blection.

Stranburgh, April 13. The feventh inflant Monfieur de Turenne, atrived in the Camp of the Marquels of Rochefort, who lay with the Forces under his command, not far from Saverne, upon which the faid Marquels parted thence the next day for Narcy; fince which, Monfieur de Turenne has changed his Station, and has, at prefent, taken his Quarters at a place called S. Fear on the safe. The Marquels de Vaubrun having quitted Gegmersteim is retreated towards Philipsburgh.

Cologne, April 17. Yesterday Monsteur Courtin, and Monsteur Barillon, Ambassadors of France, parted hence; and their Excellencies the Ambassadors of *England*, intend likewise to be going hence the beginning of the next week at farthest. On Thursday last, the Baron d'Isola signified to the Chapter of this Diocess; that the Emperor demanded a policive answer without any farther delay, whether his Electorsal Highness will finally conclude the Treaty of Accommodation with his Imperial Majesty, or not; whereupon the Chapter resolved, That his Electoral Highness should be humbly prayed to conclude the fame.

Rosserdam, April 20. The Men of War that are fitted out here, and at Helveet fluys, will be very fuddenly in a condition to fail ; in the mean time, feve Companies of Foot lie ready at the Briel, to go on Board the Men of War. The twenty fourth instant the Prince of Orange leaves the Hague, to go to the Army, by the way of Utrecht, where he will flay two or three. cays to fettle the Magistracy of that City, and regula e other Matters, which fince that Province fell into the hands of the French, have been in great diforder therea to the extraordinary prejudice of the Inhabitants: The Rendevous of our Army, is appointed to be about the eight or nineth of the next Moneth at Bergen (p 200m, from whence they may be, with great eafe, transported by Water to Flanders. It is very confidently reported here, That the Elector of Brandenburgh will joyn his Arms with those of the Emperor, and act particularly against the Bishop of Munster. Our Ambassiad rs are returning home from Cologne, and we expect, in fome days, to hear of the arrival of the English Ambaffadors in these Countreys from thence, they intending to take this way, in their return, for England

Amilterdamis April 20. We cannot yet tell you what places the French will quit, and what not; though we feem here to believe, that they will yet ere this Moneth be ended, quit all their Conquests in these Provinces, fave Nimmegén and Messiver is Some Passeners report, That they have already removed their Canon from Wess, and that they are about demolithing Scenckenscans, but without any certainty. The news which we had by the last Ordinary from Groningen, of the defeat of a party of Munster Troops between Otmarsset and Oldenzeel, proves a miltake ; but this is stain. That the Muniters Troops have wholly quitted the Field. Lieurenant Admiral de Ruyser is arrived here, to hatten out our Men of War.

Hague, April 20. On Tuesday next the Prince of Orange goes tor Utrecht, to regulate the Affairs of that Province ; and having flaid there three days, will pare thence, and go and vifit feveral Frontier places, and fo proceed to the Aimy. From Gioringen we have advice, That the Munifer Troops have now wholly quitted the Field, the-Cavalry being retreated to Munfter, and the Infantery to Coefve # ; that four Regiments of Foot have been, fent from Campen, to reinforce Monfieur. Rabenhanp, that to he may be able to maintain the places he hath taken in this expedition : The Marefchal de Bellefinds, his cauled 25 Troops of Horfe to march from Aernheim, but whether they are defigned only to convoy the Garifon of Zutphen, or to go to the affiftance of the Bilhop of Munster, is uncertain. It is faid here, that the Elector of Brandenburgh, will on the first of the next moneth, caule 4000 Foot, and fix Regiments of Horfe, to march with a Train of Artillery proportionable towards the W.f.r; and that the P. ince his Son will foon after follow with other Troops; but whether they are to joyn with the Imperialilis, or only intended by the Elector to fecure his Territories from the violences of the Soldiers of either party, we are yet to learn. From Cologne we hear, That the fixteenth inflant the French Ambaffadors parted from tlence, taking their way towards Mieffricht, and that the twenty third of this Moneth the English and Dutch Ambaffadors intended likewife to begin their journeys, in order to their return home; the former defigning to pals through Holland. The Ambaffadors which the States are fending for Engl. nd, will be accompanied with three Deputies appointed by the East India Company. Monfieur Rabenhaup is expected here, to concert with the Prince of Orange, how farther to employ the Arms of this State, in the Bishoprick of Munster, to our greatest advantage.

Paris, April 21. On Thursday last the King parted hence on his way towards the Franche Comte ; and, it is faid, That His Majefty intends to be the first of the next Moneth at Gray; from whence we have advice Thatour Troops have belieged Bef. nçon. The Deputies of the Parliament having been to wait upon the King before his departure from hence, to with his Ma-jefly a good journey, he told them, That he fhould in a fhort time be back again. The Prince of *Conte* is bringing his Troops together in the Conquests in Flan. ders, and will now very fuddenly take the Field. The feveral Ambaffadors that are here, are preparing to follow the King into the Campagne, when his Marefly shall be returned from the F anche Comie.

Bruffels, April 20. His Excellency having lodged "at Malines, arrived yesterday here from Aniwerp, before his departure from whence, be obtained the confent of that City, for the raising the extraordinary Subfidies for this year. Count Waldeck, Don Bernardo de salinas, and the Marquefs d'Affentar having been at Antwerp, to confer with his Excellency there, the two former are returned for Holland, and the latter hither. The Prince of Orange will come and keep his Court ar Malines, to be nearer the Army, feeing thefe Countreys are like to be the Seat of the War this Summer, and accordingly a Palace is preparing for him there. The Princes Army being commanded by the Count of Waldeck is to joyn with ours, commanded by the Marguess d'Affentar, and our Governor , the Court de Monterer, is tobe General in cheif, becaufe the Durch Troops are Auxiliaries, and are sent to our affiliance.

However all the Defigns are to be concerted with the Prince of Orange, who will therefore be fo near at

hand. Bitto, April 20. Our Letters from Burgundy of the third inftant tell us, "That the Prince de Vaudemont upon his arrival there, having affembled what force he could, of the Gentry, and the Countrey Militia, marched with them to the relief of Arbois, which was befieged by 4000 French, and defended only by its Inhabitants, and some Bores, who had endured two Affaults, after a Breach made in their Walls, and had fill repulfed the Enemy : The Prince being approached, the French upon notice thereof, immediately raifed the fiege, and marched away. At the fame time Monfieur Mejeau, a Burgundian, with 500 Men furprifed a finall place called Orgelet, wherein were four Companies of French Foot, and a Troop of Horle, The Burgers of of Lenxul have likewife very well delended themielyes, and the Bores have retaken a finall Eost which the French had poffelt themfelves of, to fecure Bridge over the River Rhoide. Laft night our Governor'General, the Count de Monterey, returned hither, being much pleased with the great progress that has been made in the Fortifications here, which will now be finished in a very fhort time. Prince Murice of Naffam is upori his march with 6000 Dutch Foot, and will in a day or two be at Ma inei, where he will continue with 3000 of them, the other 3000 being defigned for Lieuwei The Prince of Orange will thorty follow with the Body of the Army. We had yesterday Letters of the eighteenth inftant from Cambray, which fay, That the French are drawing down apace towards those Quarters; that many of their Troops are come as far as Roy, and quarter in all the Villages thereabouts : That the feventeenth inflant, 4000 French Horfe passed between Peronne and Basaumes, towards Arras, and that the next day 10000 Foot were 10 follow ; that the greaseft diligence possible, is used to perfect the Fortifications of Namur.
