THE Elector of Mayence returned hither on the 5th, when his Highness received a Notification of his being unanimously elected Coadjutor to the Elector of Treves in the Bishoprick of Worms, which unites in his Hands the Direction of the Circle of the Upper Rhine with that of the Electoral Circle.

Hambourg, Oct. 9, N. S. We have Advice from Copenhagen, that the Swedish Minister, Baron de Hoepkin, has received his Recredentials; and the Arrival of his Successor was soon expected. Count Dehn, the late Minister from the Court of Denmark to that of Spain, is arrived at Elfinore; and after he has waited on the King his Master, and made a Report of his Commission, will set out for the Post he is appointed to at the Hague.

Hambourg, Oct. 12, N. S. Mr. Titley, his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, left this Place Yesterday Noon on his Return to the said Court.

Hague, Oct. 15, N. S. Mess. de Catwyck and Pauw, who were sent to Leyden last Thursday, as Commissaries from the Prince of Orange, to change the Magistracy of that Town, have not yet been able to terminate their Commission, having met with many Difficulties on the Part of the People, who insist upon a total Change of their whole Regency. The Princess-Dowager of Orange, who has been at the Hague about a Month, set out last Saturday, in order to return to Leeuwarden.

Hague, Oct. 18, N. S. The Commissaries, who were sent last Week to Leyden to change the Regency, have not yet been able to execute their Commission, by reason of the mutinous Dispositions of some of the People of that Town, who insist upon a total Change of their Magistrates. The Rioters attack'd, two Days ago, the Houses of some of their Regents, and would have forced themselves into them, if the

City Militia had not luckily prevented them. It is, however, expected the Change will be effected in a Day or two. There has happened likewise some Disturbance at Tergau, where the People having conceived a Notion, that some Troops, which are in that Neighbourhood, were to be quarter'd in their Town, assembled in a Riotous Manner, and, after committing several Disorders, seized upon the Gates of the Town, disarmed a Party of the Foot Guards, consisting of a Serjeant and 15 Men, that were there to assist the Collectors of the Toll-Duties, and then turn'd them out of the Town, declaring, they will never suffer any Regular Troops to enter it. In this Commotion their Pensionary M. Snelf was in great Danger of his Life, and saved himself with the utmost Difficulty. The Prince of Orange intends to set out in a few Days for Breda. M. Van Til, the States General's Resident at the Court of Lisbon, and M. Greflein, Secretary to the Dutch Embassy at Madrid, are both arrived here. M. Hop, their High Mightinesses Envoy Extraordinary at the British Court, is gone into Zealand for a few Days, before he returns to England.
