An Account has been received of the Genoese Plenipotentiary having acceeded to the Definitive Treaty of Peace.

Dublin, October 11.

This Day being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Coronation, the Great Guns were fired in his Majesty's Park the Phænix, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green. At Noon their Excellencies the Lords Justices met at the Castle, where a Squadron of Horse attended, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, upon this Occasion: At Night a Play was given by their Excellencies, for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and there were Bonsires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
