Rome, October 12, N. S.

M. Archinto, the Pope's Nuncio at the Court of Dresden, having obtain'd Leave to return to Italy on Account of his Health, M. Briglia, it is said, will be appointed to succeed him.

Brussels, Nov. 6, N. S. The Commissaries of the Empress Queen arrived in this City on Monday last, in order to settle all Affairs with those of France, in Conformity to the 8th Article of the Treaty of Peace, relating to the Evacuation of the strong Places in the Low Countries.

Hague, Nov. 8, N. S. The States General have taken into their Service, upon the Prince of Orange's Recommendation, M. Elliot, and given him the Rank of Lieutenant General, which he had in the Elector Palatine's Troops. The Prince Stadtholder's Commissaries are returned from Gorcum to make a Report to his Serene Highness of the State of Affairs there, and to receive his final Orders with Respect to the Alterations to be made in the Regency of that Town. The Earl of Sandwich left this Place Yesterday Morning on his Return to Aix la Chapelle.

Whitehall, November 1.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable George Duke, Earl of Halifax, (in the Room of John Lord Monson, deceased) Richard Plummer, Robert Herbert, John Pitt, Baptist Levelon Gower, James Grenville, Esqrs. Thomas Hay, Esq; commonly called Lord Viscount Duplin, and Francis Fane, Esq; to be Commissioners for Trade and Plantations.

Whereas divers evil-disposed Persons have, for some Time past, made a Practice of filing Guineas, and dispersing the same; and for the apprehending of the Offenders therein, their Excellencies the Lords Justices have been pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds (over and above the Reward allowed by Act of Parliament) to any Person or Persons, who shall apprehend and take any Person or Persons concerned in filing and diminishing of Guineas, so as he, she, or they be thereof convicted: And whereas Samuel Davies and Joseph Mapham, against whom Informations have been taken upon Oath, have, since the above Discoveries, absconded from their Habitation, the Sign of the Bull and Butcher in West Smithfield; on searching which said House, was found in a Bureau belonging to the said Samuel Davies, Tools and other Instruments for filing of Guineas, with a large Quantity of Filings of Gold Coin.

Samuel Davies was born at Wrexham, served his Apprenticeship at Liverpool, well known at Thame in Oxfordshire, and kept a Butcher's Shop for some Years in German-street St. James's. He is a black Man, about five Foot ten Inches high, has a down cast Look, and had on, at the Time he absconded, an old white Wig, a Fustian Frock with Plate Buttons, a blue and white striped Waistcoat, black Breeches, light colour'd Stockings, with large Silver Buckles in his Shoes, and is about fifty Years of Age.

Joseph Mapham (by Trade an Inlayer in Tortoiseshell,) was born in Newgate Market, and for some Years was a Green Grocer there: He is about sixty Years of Age, of a fair Complexion, has a long Nose and Chin, is about five Foot seven Inches high, walks very lame, and had on, when he absconded, an old white Wig, and light coloured Coat and Breeches.
