THE Duke of Aremberg is expected here next Week, to take upon him the Government of the Low Countries, as well Civil as Military, till such Time as Prince Charles of Lorraine shall arrive, which will be in the Spring. It is said that a great Alteration will be made in the Civil Government, That three Persons only are to represent the States of Brabant, of which the Duke of Aremberg is to be the first, M. Steenhout the second, and M. Berrevoet the third; That there are likewise only three Persons to be appointed for the Chamber of Accounts, and it is much doubted, whether the Council of Finances and the Privy Council will subsist.

Rotterdam, Nov. 12, N. S. By the Advices from Amsterdam, there is still a Ferment and Uneasiness amongst the People there. As to this City every Thing is perfectly quiet. We are just inform'd that the Mob at Leyden is up, and insist upon the Magistrates consenting to the free Council of War; and as the Commissaries did not decide this Affair, the Gates were shut Yesterday.

that Richard Coleman, a Brewer's Servant in Bandy Lag Walk, Southwark, together with two other Persons unknown, are guilty of the wilful Murder of the said Sarah Green, and the Coroner's Warrant hath been issued thereupon for apprehending the said Coleman, who hath ever since absconded, and the other two Persons are not yet discovered: In order to the discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concern'd in the said wilful Murder, their Excellencies the Lords Justices are pleased hereby to promise his Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of the Offenders who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement for such Discovery, a Reward of Fifty Pounds to such Person or to any other Person or Persons making the same as aforesaid, to be paid upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

Joseph Mapham (by Trade an Inlayer in Tortoise-shell,) was born in Newgate Market, and for some Years was a Green Grocer there: He is about sixty Years of Age, of a fair Complexion, has a long Nose and Chin, is about five Foot seven Inches high, walks very lame, and had on, when he absconded, an old white Wig, and light colour'd Coat and Breeches.

And whereas Informations have been taken against the following Persons for being concerned with others in filing and diminishing such Guineas as aforesaid, as also the Portugal Gold Coin, to wit, Bryan Duff, Mary Dean alias Harrison, and Margaret Rutherford, who have all lately absconded.

Bryan Duff, born in Ireland, a middle sized Man, full bodied, has a round plump Face, of a ruddy Complexion, and has a brisk Eye; is about thirty Years of Age, and generally wore a light brown Coat with yellow Metal Buttons, and a Scarlet Waistcoat; he lived Servant to a Gentleman in Clarges-street Piccadilly, and Charles street St. James's, and lodged last at the Red Lion in King-street Golden Square.

Mary Dean alias Harrison, born in Cheshire, is between forty and fifty Years of Age, lived many Years in Dublin, and well known at Liverpool, is a Dealer in Irish Stuffs: She is a middle-sized Woman, has a large Scar in the Left Side of her Neck just below her

Hair, a Swelling in one of her Knees, and walks lame; well known in Green Harbour-Court near the Golden Hind, Moor fields, and lodged last in Sedwick's Rents near Moor-Gate.

Margaret Rutherford alias Mary Foster, (born in Ireland) Wife of Robert Rutherford, of Sir John Ligonier's Regiment, is a tall jolly Woman, between thirty and fifty Years old, is pitted with the Small Pox, has grey Eyes, and a remarkable Dent at the End of one of her Thumbs; is by Trade a Mantua-maker and Dealer in Irish Stuffs, well known about Temple-Bar, and the Villages round London, and lodged last in Bow-Lane, Cheapside.
