Danish or Norway ship lately came into this Port, the Men Danes, laden with Deals, pretending to trade upon the account of a Ruff Merchant here, upon confidence of a Pass to be procured for his free trading; but she is at present seised; and good se-

curity given in for the behavior ofher men.

West Cowes, Sept. 15. The twelfth instant Captain Chriflether Gunman, in the Orange, brought in two prizes; one a Vessel of 400 Tun laden with French Salt, a new ship, bound (asp etended) for the Baltick, the other of 240 Tun from Crofaick with Salt, Wine, and Brandy, pretended bound for Briftol, though the Master was by his men forced to enter St. Georges Channel for fear of Pickaroons. The Master of the former gives this account of Beaufort, that at his coming in to Rochelle his Men of War were about 30 great and small, of which 17, from 40 to 60 Guns, the rest from 20 to 30. all of them extraordinary foul, leaky and much shattered, and by the French Kings Shipwright judged not to be made tight, having so long used the Streights, and much spoiled by Worms. That he was providing to come through the English Channel to conduct 60 French, and six great Holland ships laden with Salt for the Grande Partie, which have lain two moneths for Convoy.

Dover, Sept. 16. At five the last night our Fleet lying before St. Valeries, some of our ships chaced two of the ene-

mies on shoare, and blew up another.

This day one of our Fifth Rate Fregats sailed by to the

Downs with a prize.

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Paris, Sepi. 10. The Envoy from Algier being suddealy to take his leave, hath been presented with a present of 150 Pistols, his Companion with 100, and his Son with 50, besides his Majesties Picture in a Case set with Diamonds valued at 3000 Crowns, and other things of good value. Mr. Trudert who has brought on this Treaty, is dispatcht for Aigier to take order for the buying of the Slaves that are

Brussells, Sept. 21. The New Fort at Charleroy advances very fast; and is defigned to be five foo out of ground, and confequently defensible, by the end of the next month; 3000 Germans a e there encamped, to be employed upon the Trenches, and many Propositions have been already made for building in it, the people foreseeing its growth, as well as strength, from the commodiousness of its scituation.

Hamburgh, September 8. The Swedes Forces daily encreale, and more expected from Pomeren, 1000 Foot ate lately marched from Stoads to the Field-Here, and a Regiment of 1,000, lef. behind there. The 5th inftant the Bremers made a fally upon the Swedes, in which many were killed and wounded on both fides : and on the 6th. another, but with what success our Letters tell us not. All the wood round the Town is cut down and distributed amongst the common people 3 and the ground about is made plain, to prevent the Swedes from sheltering themselves near it.

The English upon the Elve endeavor their revenge on the Dutch, and with two floops, after the taking of one Dutch ship, set upon 2 others of their Greenland Vessels, but found them too strongly man'd with people, which they had taken up in this City, the Magistrates prohibiting an Eng-

lish ship from going to their assistance.

Vienna, Sept. 5. Yesterday arrived here Montecuculia bringing him an account of the Empress her Voyage, and arrival at Finale, and that on the 20 instant she intends to begin her journey from Milan, which in probability may requite 50 dayes before her arrival here, against which time great preparations are made for Opera, Tiltings, Fireworks, Comedies, and all imaginary recreations; no cost being spared for Embroderies and rich Coaches, which are already fent from Paris, and all hands being fet on work in order to her reception.

Majence, Sept. 10. The Soldiers of the Palatinate plundered lately two Villages, Gaubischeim, and Gaubiscim, both of them belonging to the Archbishoprick. But in the mean while the Lorrainers have made themselves Master of Billigheim, not far from Neustadt, where they killed

400 of the Palatines men.

The Ambassadors of France and Sweden are on their way for the composure of all differences ; which if the War continue, will juddenly ruine all these Countrys, the Lorrainers

especially making great spoils where they come.

Rome, Sept. 4. Cardinal Chify taking notice of the com-plaints of the Spaniards against him, for not executing his intended Legation to Milan, has committed his Apology to writing, and fent it to all the Cardinals and fecular Princes, to satisfie them of the Reasons he had to wave that Legation during the Popes weaknels.

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Some heits have lately rilen between the Cardinal de Retz. and the French Ambailador; the Cardinal having received the French Kings permission for his return into France, did not (it feems) as we expected, communicate it to the Duke de Chaulins: His Eminence having made his accustomary Visits in order to his Journey, and received his Dispatch, being in conference with the Ambaffador, told him, That notwithstanding his readiness to depart, he was still willing to continue at Kome, if the service of their King should require his presence in the Conclave. To which the Ambassador sharply replied, That since he had so unseasonably made his Visite, he might part thence when he pleased; but the King had as little for him to do in France, as at Rome; after which they parted with much anger : but the Cardinals of that Faction are endeavouring to reconcile them.

Several Matches are here of late proposed. One between the Daughter of the late Prince Pamphilio, with the Duke of

Another between the Duke Sforza son to Don Paolo Cardinal Sforza's brother, and the Daughter and Heiress of the Duke Casarin.

A third is discoursed of between the inheritrix of the Louse of Altieriand young Zanzedari Grandchild to Don Mario,

Genoua, Aug. 28. We are informed from Finale, That upon the News brought to the Governor of Milan of the Empresses Gallies before that Port, he immediately drew all his Forces there into Arms, taking orders for the best Reception that place was capable of giving her; and accordingly, so soon as the Admirals Gally came near the Bridge that was laid for the Empresses landing, the Governor came aboard to make his first Complements, where he made her Imperial Majesty an excellent Treat; which done, she disembarqued, and was received upon the Bridge under a Triumphant Arch by the Archbishop of savonne; where taking Coach with the Dutchels of Albuquerque, she was thence attended to St. Johns Church; all the Gallies and other Vessels in the Port faluting her with their Guns, which was followed by all the great and small shot about the Town, with the sound of Trumpets, and beating of Drums. Atter the Te Deum, she was from the Cathedral attended to the Palace, where she received the Complements of all the great Personages that there waited her arrival, and particularly of the Duke of Savoy, who arrived there in Post; since which, she has been entertained with excellent Mulick, Comedies, and other divertisements of

Lieutenant General Montecueuli was immediately dispatcht to his Imperial Majesty with the News of her safe arrival at Finale; where after some little stay, which 'tis said will be till the first of September, she intends for Milan, where she is to receive the Complements of the Princes, and principal Cities

of Italy.

R. Thomas Nevil Comptroller of the Petty Customs in the Port of London, who formerly dwelt at the Crown in St. Pauls Churck-yard, is now removed to the Ship between Temple Bar and Chancery lane end, over against the hither Temple-gate.

The General Letter Office is now held in Bishopsyatestreet at Sir Samuel Bernardiston's House, the same that Master Sheriff Hanson sometimes kept his Sheriffalty

in.

R. Thomas Warren who formerly lived in Basinglane near Breadstreet, is now removed to Sir Thomas Bonsoyes house in Leaden-hall street, who is appointed as formerly, to receive the Charity of well disposed persons

for the poor visited people at Cambridge.

Seville, Aug. 27. The arrival of our Silver Fleet is no small Cordial to revive our Spirits, being a Fleet so very considerable as to be valued at four Millions of Patacoons, besides other things of value, having in it 2400 Chests of Indigo, 3000 Arrobens of Couchenelle, 20000 Quintalls of Campeche wood, with great proportions of other rich Commodities.

Five new Galliots made at Biscay and sent thence, past by lately for St. Lucar, in their. way to Cadiz, but made no

stay by the way.

Legorn, sept. 6. On the 31 past arrived here the St. Louis, a great Epench ship of 40 Guns, wanting three dayes from Marseilles, and may probably the next week go forwards for smyrna. They report, that six Gallies were preparing at Marseilles, to Transport the Duke of Vendosme for Rome, where 'tis fancied, he is to receive a Cardinals Cap. Several Gallies this week arrived here, and went off again, wig. Seven of Spain, Five of Naples, Five of Sicily, and one Genouese, with three of the great Dukes Gallies, bringing back with them the Prince Matthias from Finale. We are advised from Naples, that a Dutch man of War of 22 Guns, was arrived there from Marseilles; but being denied Prattique, was forced to depart immediately.

Ratisbonne, Aug. 27. The Ambassadors and Envoyes in

The Ambassadors and Envoyes in the Diet, talk only now of returning home, having spent two years and an half, in treating and retreating, and disputing pro and con, to the great expences of their Princes, and some discourse there is of a Resolution upon Deputies, that shall undertake the whole business from the beginning, and with

less charge dispatch more business.

Hague, Sept. 21. Yesterday arrived here an Express from France to inform us. That de Beaufort was parted from Rochelle the thirteenth instant, not without some apprehensions of being intercepted by the English; and it was there-

fore pressed, that de Riyter might be ordered to neet him in the Channel.

We have not lately had any Letters from de Ruyter, but we are informed, that he lately wrote into France of an unfortunate hurt he received in his mouth by the discharging of one of his cwn Guns, which had put him into a Feavor; upon which the King sent one of his Physicians to attend him.

Some Conference has lately been had upon the Affairs of East-Friesland, and 'tis resolved that another Letter be written to the Frincess Dowager at Aurick, to withdraw all the Soldiery out of that Country, and to return their forces

home.

Some few ships lie ready in the Texel to joyn with the Fleet, among st the rest the Spiegel, which tormerly carried de Ruyter. There is a strict Embargo on all our ships, lest they fall in the Enemies hands, or employ those Seamen, which we have occasion to use in the Fleet. 'Tis said a Battery will be suddenly made in the Usy to secure the stream against farther violence from the enemy.

This day the Assembly of the States of Holland begin to consider of the grand Assairs, and 'tis believed will urge the Court of Justice to a vigorous profecution of du Bnat and his

accomplices.

Dantzick, Sep. 4. Letters from Warfaw tell us, That the King would not permit Lubomirsky to absent himself till the seture Dyer, as it was agreed on; but to repair as oft as he can to his Majesty, to advise with him concerning publick affairs.

The new Cham of Tartary has by his Envoyé affured his Majesty of his affection and friendship, only desiring the King to continue the Presents to him yearly, as they have

formerly sent to the Chams his predecessors.

Middleburgh, Sept. 23. The Sieur Newport, Secretary to Admiral de Ruyter, arrived the 21 instant at the Hague, we give the States an account of the Fleet new riding some sew Leagues S. S. E. from Dunkirk. Whilst they lay before Bologne, the Count de la Fueillade came aboard them by order from the French King; upon whose departure the Fleet set sail for the place where they new ride. The Sectetary was the next day after his arrival at the Hague, sent back again to the Fleet with others (as tis said) farther to return towards Zealand, de Ruyter and Monsieur Van Ghent being saln ill, and a great part of their Fleet distempered.

Southwould, Sept, 18. On Sunday night a great ship was seen from hence standing out of the Sea Southwards, with her

Top-mast down, what she is we yet know not.

Yesterday the Mary Ketch crusing upon the Coast about two Leagues to the North east of this Town, near the Bernard Sands, sell in with a small Fregat of six Guns with English Colours, who firing a Gun, and having the Windward, exchanged many shot; the Ketch plying her Guns, and standing in for the Town: but before they came within shot, the Fregat left her, and bore up to the Southwards.

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Whitehall, Sept. 11. This day the two Houses of Parliament, according to their Protogation, assembled at Westmin-ster, and by His Majesties direction adjourned till Friday.

This day nas presented to His Majesty by his Highness the Duke of Yorke, Edmund Godfrey Fsq. one of His Majestics Justices of the Peace for the County of Mindledex, and City and Libertie of Westminster, who after the Publick Thanks and Acknowledgements of his eminent service done in helping to suppress the late Fire in the City and Liberty of London, received the Honour of Knighthood.

Dover, Sept. 18 This morning His Majesties Fleet, the Royal Soveraign being the head-most Ship, passed by this Road towards the Downs in a very good condition, nowith-standing the late storm, in which they rid very safe off of Dengeonness. What luck the enemies have had in it, we hear not, only we have it constitued to us, that seme of His Majesties Ships having given chace to seven of their Menos War (of the Dutch Fleet, as is supposed) fired two of them, and forced the rest to save themselves as they could; and what became of them, we yet heat not.
