St. James's, December 2.

THIS Day being appointed for the Keeping of the King's Birth-Day, a great Number of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, waited on His Majesty, to compliment Him on the Occasion. The Court was very numerous, and extremely splendid; and at Night there was a Ball.

St. James's, November 30.

This Day Signior Businello, Resident from the most Serene Republick of Venice, had his first Private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his Letters of Credence; to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, November 12, 1748.

Whereas it hath been represented to their Excellencies the Lords Justices, that divers Robberies have been lately committed within the County of Suffex, particularly one on John Waters, near Buxted Bridge, on the 12th Day of October last, by five Persons armed, who took from him Twenty six Pounds; and one other Robbery on the 2d Day of November Instant, in the House of Richard Haffenden, by four Men armed with Pistols and a Blunderbuss, who took out of the said House Thirty-five Pounds in Money, five Pieces of old Gold, two Silver Spoons marked I. H. a Silver Watch, a two handled Tumbler, and three plain Gold Rings; and whereas there is good Reason to believe that the Persons who committed the said Robberies are Part of a Gang of Smuglers, who have long infested the Coast of that County: Their Excellencies, for the better discovering the Persons concerned in the said Robberies, are pleased hereby to promise his Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of the Offenders (except Thomas Kemp, of Flimwell, who some Time ago escaped out of Newgate, if it should appear that he was concerned in either of the said Robberies) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be convicted of either of the said Robberies: And as a further Encouragement for such Discovery, a Reward of Fifty Pounds to such Person, or to any other Person or Persons making the same as aforesaid, to be paid on the Conviction of each Offender.

And whereas Informations have been taken against the following Persons for being concerned with others in filing and diminishing such Guineas as aforesaid, as also the Portugal Gold Coin, to wit Bryan Duff, Mary Dean alias Harrison, and Margaret Rutherford, who have all lately absconded.

Bryan Duff, born in Ireland, a middle sized Man, full bodied, has a round plump Face, of a ruddy Complexion, and has a brisk Eye; is about thirty Years of Age

Age, and generally wore a light brown Coat with yellow Metal Buttons, and a Scarlet Waistcoat; he lived Servant to a Gentleman in Clarges-street Piccadilly, and Charles-street St. James's, and lodged last at the Red Lion in King-street Golden Square.

Mary Dean alias Harrison, born in Cheshire, is between forty and fifty Years of Age, lived many Years in Dublin, and well known at Liverpool, is a Dealer in Irish Stuffs: She is a middle-sized Woman, has a large Scar in the Left Side of her Neck just below her Hair, a Swelling in one of her Knees, and walks lame; well known in Great Harbour-Court near the Golden Hind, Moorfields, and lodged last in Sedgwick's Rents near Moor-Gate.

Margaret Rutherford alias Mary Foster, (born in Ireland) Wife of Robert Rutherford, of Sir John Ligonier's Regiment; is a tall jolly Woman, between thirty and forty Years old, is pitted with the Small Pox, has grey Eyes, and a remarkable Dent at the End of one of her Thumbs; is by Trade a Mantua-maker and Dealer in Irish Stuffs, well known about Temple-Bar, and the Villages round London, and lodged last in Bow-Lane, Cheap-side.
