Keeping of the King's Birth-Day, a great Number of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, waited on His Majesty, to compliment Him on the Occasion. The Court was very numerous, and extremely splendid; and at Night there was a Ball.

This Day Signior Businello, Resident from the most Serene Republick of Venice, had his sirst Private Audience of his Majesty; to deliver his Letters of Credence; to which he was in troduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.

Whereas it bath been represented to their Excellenties she Lords Juffices, that divers Robberies bave been lately committed within the County of Suffex, par ticularly one on John Waters, near Buxted Bridge, on the 12th Day of October last, by five Persons armed, who took from him Towenty six Pounds; and one other Robbery on the 2d Day of November Instant, in the House of Richard Haffenden, by four Men armed with Pistols and a Blunderbuss, who took out of the said House Thirty-since Pounds in Money, since Pieces of old Gold, two Silver Spoons marked I. H. a Silver Watch, a two bandled Tumbler, and three plain Gold Rings; and whereas there is good Reason to believe that the Persons who committed the said Robberies are Part of a Gang of Smuglers, who have long infested the Coast of that County: Their Excellencies, for the better discovering the Persons concerned in the said Robberies, are pleased hereby to promise his Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of the Offenders (except Thomas Kemp, of Flimwell, who some Time ago escaped out of Newgate, if it should appear that he was concerned in either of the said Rebberies) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be convicted of either of the said Robberies: And as a further Encouragement for such Discovery, a Reavard of Fifty Pounds to such Person, or to any other Person or Persons making the same as aforesaid, to be paid on the Conviction of each Offender. Whereas it has been represented to their Excellencies
the Lords Justices, that, on the 6th of this Instant

September, one Hugh Coffy was committed to Newgate, on strong Suspiction of Filing and Diminishing Porsugal Gold Pieces: And as there is the strongest Reason to believe, that the said Coffy, and several others (who fince the said Coffy's Commitment have absconded) have been concerned in Filing the Current Coin of this Kingdom called Guineas, and in dispersing the same: Their Excellencies are pleased to promise His Mijesty's most gracious Pardon to any of the Persons concerned with the said Coffy as aforesaid, upon bis or her discovering one or more of bis or ber Accomplices; as likewise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward oflowed by Act of Parkament, to any Person or Persons, who shall apprehend and take any Person or Persons concerned in Filing and Diminishing the said Caurent Coin of this Kingdom, so as he, she or they may be convicted of the same. about fifty Years of Age.

And whereas Informations have been taken against the following Persons for being concerned noish others in filing and diminishing such Guineas as aforest said, as also the Persugal Gold Coin, to with Bryan Duff, Mary Dean alias Harrison, and Mary garet. Rutherford, who have all lately absconded.
