THIS Day the Reverend Dr. Chapman, Master of St. Mary Magdalen College, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, and his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, High Steward of the said University, with several Heads of Houses, Doctors of the several Faculties, Masters of Arts, and other Members of that learned Body, waited on his Majesty in their Formalities, with the following Address, dated the Twenty-ninth Day of November last.

The humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars of the University of Cambridge.

May it please your most Sacred Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars of your University of Cambridge, beg Leave to approach your Majesty's Throne, with our most sincere and unfeigned Congratulations on your Majesty's safe and happy Return to your British Dominions.

Your Majesty's constant and unwearied Endeavours to promote the Happiness and Prosperity of your People, your steady and invariable Attachment to their true Rights and Interests, and the proper and effectual Means you employed in their Vindication and Defence, in the Course of the just and necessary War in which your Majesty was lately engaged, always afforded us the most rational and well-grounded Assurances that they would at length be crowned with the desired Success: And with Hearts full of Gratitude we now adore the Sovereign Disposer of all Events, who has accordingly made your Majesty the glorious Instrument of settling the Ballance of Europe upon a firm and lasting Foundation, and of restoring to these Nations in particular the great and invaluable Blessings of a safe and honourable Peace.

As your Majesty's tender and paternal Concern for the commercial Rights of your Subjects, your strict and religious Observation of the Faith of Treaties, and a just Sense that the Safety and Independence of these Kingdoms is inseparably interwoven with that of their antient and natural Allies, were the wise and just Motives that induced your Majesty to try the Event of

War: so they seem, in a particular Manner, to have directed your Majesty's Conduct, in effecting the great Work of Peace: Inasmuch that your Majesty's People have now the singular Happiness of experiencing the strictest Attention to the Interest of these Nations, rendered compatible with a due Regard for those of your Confederates and the common Cause.

Fully sensible ourselves, that the Preservation of our religious and civil Liberties is inseparably connected with the Stability of your Majesty's Throne, we have used our constant Endeavours to instil into all those who are committed to our Care, a due Reverence for your Majesty's Government, and a full Conviction of the Justice of those Principles upon which it is established; and to these, we shall always think it our indispensable Duty, to add our hearty and most fervent Prayers, that your Majesty's Reign over us may be long and happy; no more disturbed by Foreign Wars or Domestick Insurrections, but that all your Majesty's Subjects, who cannot but feel, may have the Gratitude also to acknowledge the many and great Blessings they enjoy under your Majesty's mild and equal Administration.

Given under our Common Seal the
Twenty Ninth Day of November,
in the Year of our Lord, One thousand seven hundred and forty eight.

To which Address, His Majesty was pleased to return this most gracious Answer:

I Thank you very heartily for this Dutiful Address. The Zeal, Loyalty, and Affection, of my University of Cambridge, have eminently distinguished themselves upon all Occasions, and justly intitle them to my particular Favour and Protection.

Hogue, November 6, N. S. We were informed last Wednesday Evening from Helyoetsluis, that a Ship was arrived that Day in the Maese, the Captain of which reported, that the Day before he had seen the King's Yacht, and other Vessels that attended upon his Majesty, within a few Miles of the Kentish Shore, and that he did not question, but his Majesty landed that same Evening at Margate. We are the more impatient to receive the Confirmation of this good News, as our Uneasiness about his Majesty's sacred Person has been raised to the highest Degree.

Degree, on Account of the violent Storm of Wind that blew upon this Coast all that Night and the Day following. The Transports that sailed from Helvoetsluys, at the same Time as his Majesty, were all obliged to put back the next Day. Upon a Motion made last Saturday by the Deputies of the Province of Holland, in the Assembly of the States General, their High Mightinesses immediately took a Resolution to confer on the Prince of Orange, and his Heirs Male and Female, the Dignity of Hereditary Stadtholder and Captain General of Brabant, Flanders, and the Upper Quarter of Guelderland, with the same Power and Prerogatives as have been given to his Serene Highness as Stadtholder of the Seven United Provinces, and with a Salary of 25,000 Florins per Annum. And in Consequence of this Resolution, Deputies are appointed to present to the Prince, the Diploma of this new Dignity, which was never enjoy'd by any of his Highness's Predecessors. The Directors and principal Proprietors of the India Company, of the Chamber of Amsterdam, have resolved to appoint the Prince of Orange Director and Governor General of the Dutch Possessions in the Indies, as far as it depends on that Chamber; but this Affair cannot be entirely terminated, till a General Court of Directors and Proprietors is held, which has been appointed for the 12th Instant at Amsterdam. The Prince Stadtholder has appointed a new Council of War to examine into the Conduct of General Cronstrom during the Siege of Bergen-op-zoom; General Pretorius is named President of this Council, which is to consist besides of three other Generals, viz. Vander-Duyn, d'Aylva, and Burmania; and of five Lieutenant Generals, viz. Glabbeek, Van Beyden, Kinschot, Villegas, and Glinstra. General d'Aylva took the Oaths two Days ago as Governor of Maestricht; and it is currently reported, that the Governments of Tournay, Namur, and Bergen-op-zoom, are to be disposed of in Favour of the Prince of Hesse Philipsthal, General Schwartzenburg, and General Pretorius. Count Bentinck returned three Days ago to Aix la Chapelle.

Hague, Dec. 10, N. S. We were this Morning informed from England, that his Majesty arrived at St. James's in perfect Health on Wednesday last. This Event has given us the more Satisfaction, as from the Day of his Majesty's Landing, the Wind has continued very stormy, and directly contrary for England. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arrived here this Day about Noon in perfect Health. Besides the Resolution of the States General to make the Prince of Orange Hereditary Stadtholder and Captain General of Brabant, Flanders, and the Upper Quarter of Guelderland, their High Mightinesses have taken another Resolution, by which they authorize the Prince, as far as depends on them, to dispose, provisionally, and for the first Time only, of all the Employments in the Towns of Maestricht and Bergen-op-Zoom, and other Towns and Districts of Flanders and Brabant, and to make such Regulations, with regard to the Regencies, and the Civil, Military, and

Ecclesiastical Affairs of those Places, as his Serene Highness shall think most conducive to their future Security and Advantage. The Hessian Troops began last Saturday their March homewards. And Yesterday the Prince Stadtholder received Advice from Bergen-op-Zoom, that the French Troops had evacuated that Fortress on Saturday last, the 7th Instant N. S. and had delivered up to the Commanding Officer of the Dutch Troops, 70 odd Pieces of Brass Cannon, and about a Dozen Mortars and Haubitizers, besides some Pieces of Iron Ordnance. To-morrow is the Day appointed for the Evacuation of Antwerp, and of all the Forts upon the Scheld. The Prince Stadtholder intends to set out for Friesland towards the latter End of this Week. The Troops, which were lately sent to Leyden, still continue there; and a few Days ago four considerable Burghers of that Town, who had been chiefly concern'd in the late Disturbances, were brought Prisoners to the Hague, and committed to the Common Goal; and it is generally thought, that the Event of this Affair will prove very fatal to them.
