To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of the Archbishop, President of the Convocation of the Province of Canterbury, the Bishops, and Clergy of the same Province, in Convocation assembled.

*May it please your Majesty,*

**W**E, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, in Convocation assembled, beg Leave to approach your Royal Presence, and, in the warmest Sentiments of our Hearts, to express our Joy at your happy Return to your Kingdoms; and our most grateful Thanks to your Majesty, for putting an End to the Calamities of War, and restoring to us the Blessings of Peace.

Your Majesty enter'd into the War upon such Motives and Reasons, as became the Character of a good and just King, with the Voice of your People, the Judgment of your Parliament, and the clearest Justification of Self-defence; and it has pleased God, in the Issue and Event of Things, to make your Majesty the glorious Instrument of procuring and settling such a Peace, as does not only give the highest Satisfaction and Joy to Great Britain, but to every other Nation in Europe.

In this happy Situation, Sir, your faithful Subjects have nothing more to wish, but that it would please God, by whom Kings reign, to continue your Majesty long a Blessing to this Church and Nation, that you may enjoy the Fruits, and cultivate the Arts of that Peace, which you have so wisely and happily accomplish'd.

May the future Part of your Majesty's Reign be undisturb'd and easy; not only free from the

Violence of Foreign, but the Secret Machinations of Domestick Enemies; whose only Punishment, through your Majesty's Goodness, is, in Reality, their Happiness; suffering, as they do, no other Hardship, but that of being compell'd to submit to the Laws of their Country, and the peaceable and just Government of a most merciful and indulgent Prince.— May the Blessings of that Government be as diffusive as the Light; and all, who share in its Advantages, contribute to its Support and Honour!

May Irreligion, Prophaneness, and Dissoluteness of Manners, meet with that Discouragement, and Punishment, which is justly due to them; and may your Majesty's auspicious Reign stand distinguish'd in the Annals of Time, as free as possible from those upquiet and destructive Vices, which undermine all Government, and defeat the Laws of the best and wisest Magistrates!

Your faithful Clergy, Sir, under the Care of Providence, look up to your Majesty, as the Guardian of the Honour of God, the Protector of his Church, and the Support of true Piety and Virtue; and feel themselves bound by the united Principles of Gratitude and Duty, to wish and to procure all imaginable Felicity to your Majesty and your Royal House.

My Lords, and the rest of the Clergy,  
**I** Thank you for this dutiful and loyal Address. You may be assured, that my Endeavours shall not be wanting to discourage Irreligion and Immorality. I am truly sensible of your Zeal and Affection for my Person and Government; and you may depend upon my firm Resolution to support the Church of England, as by Law establish'd.

very full Court, and upon that Occasion their Majesties made a very considerable Promotion, both Civil and Military. Marshal Bathiani was then declared in Form Grand Maitre and Governor to the Archduke Leopold, and this Day he enters upon the Functions of his new Office, and takes Possession of his Apartment at Court. Yesterday their Imperial Majesties reviewed the Archduke's Regiment of Dragoons, and his Highness appeared at the Head of it on Horseback, with Marshal Bathiani at his Side.

*Vienna, December 14, N. S.* A Courier arrived the Day before Yesterday from General Brown from Nice, with an Account, that the Commissaries had met, and had advanced so far in their Business, as to have been able to dispatch a Courier on the 2d for the Low Countries, with a Plan which they had concerted for the Restitutions, &c. in Italy, by which they proposed to evacuate Parma, Placentia, and Guastalla, upon the 4th of January, or sooner, if the Commissaries in Flanders pleased. This Plan was not signed, but had been agreed upon unanimously by the Commissaries at Nice.

*Hague, Dec. 17, N. S.* A solemn Deputation from the States General, consisting of a Deputy from each Province, together with the Grand Pensionary and the Grefrier Fagel, waited on Friday Evening on the Prince of Orange, and presented to his Serene Highness the Diploma of his new Dignity of hereditary Stadtholder and Captain General of Brabant, Flanders, and the Upper Quarter of Guelderland. The next Day the Prince went to the Assembly of the States General, to thank their High-Mightinesses for this new Instance of their Attention; and at the same Time acquainted them with his Intention of going shortly into Friesland. And accordingly his Highness set out from hence early Yesterday Morning, attended by the Grefrier Fagel. The Prince likewise took Leave on Saturday of the States of Holland, who separated that Day till after the Holidays. His Serene Highness having left to the Prince of Saxe Hildburghausen the Choice of one of the three Governments of Nimmegen, Arnheim and Utrecht, this Prince has given the Preference to the first; besides which, he is to have the Command in Chief of all the Troops in the Province of Guelderland. Lieutenant-General Count de Hompesch, who was Governor of Williamstadt, is nominated Commandant of Furnes, as being a Place of greater Profit. M. d'Ammon, the Prussian Minister at the Hague, who was employ'd at Aix la Chapelle during the Congress, return'd hither three Days ago.

*Hague, December 20, N. S.* We hear from Leeuwarden, that the Prince Stadtholder arrived there in good Health on Tuesday last. His Serene Highness's Commissaries are gone to the Brill, after executing the Commission with which they were charged relatively to the Magistracy of Delft, where all the Members of the ancient

Regency (except two) have been continued in their Employments.

*Hague, Dec. 24, N. S.* Mess. de Catwyck and Pauw went to the Brill on Tuesday last, and on Thursday Morning they declared the Place Stadtholder's Intention, that all the Members of the Regency should be continued; but that five Counsellors should be added to the Fifteen who composed the Vroedschap or Town Council. They are since returned to this Place, where they are to wait for the Prince of Orange's Arrival, before they proceed to the eight other Towns of this Province, where it is expected the Magistrates will likewise be changed. M. de Haren the Younger Brother set out on Friday Evening to execute the Commission given him by the Prince Stadtholder to appoint the Magistrates, and settle all that relates to the Regencies of Maestricht, and of the other Towns belonging to the Republick, which have been in the Hands of the French. The Directors of the East-India Company made last Friday to the States General, their annual Report of the Situation of the Affairs of their Company. Count Bentinck returned to this Place Yesterday Morning from Aix la Chapelle.

*Cambridge, December 14.* This Day His Grace the Duke of Newcastle was unanimously elected, in a very full Senate, Chancellor of this University, in the Room of the late Duke of Somerset.

*Leicester House, December 14.*

This Day M. de Klingraff, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Prussia, having delivered his Letters of Credence to his Majesty at Hanover, had his first private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

And afterwards his first private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales; to both which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Doimer, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

*Whitehall, December 9, 1748.*

*Whereas it has been humbly represented unto the King by the Mayor and other Magistrates of the Town of Penryn in the County of Cornwall, that on Friday the Seventh Day of October last past, divers Tinnors, and other Persons unknown, to the Number of two or three Hundred, came in a riotous and tumultuous Manner and broke open the Cellars of Benjamin Heame, Merchant, in the said Town of Penryn, and carried away Corn to the Quantity of 900 Winchester Bushels, (or 300 great Bushels) the Property of the said Benjamin Heame; And whereas the said Mayor and other Ma-*  
gistrates

gistrates, in their said Representation, transmitted the Names of certain Persons therein and herein after-mentioned, as being notorious Offenders in the said Riot; and farther represented, that the Behaviour of the Tinnors since that Time gives no Room to think they are at all concerned at their Conduct, but the said Mayor and other Magistrates have Reason to apprehend the great Danger that may attend the not discouraging in the most effectual Manner the like tumultuous Riots and Disorders for the future; His Majesty, on Consideration of this Matter, hath been graciously pleased (for the Security of the Persons and Properties of his Subjects, and the Preservation of the publick Peace, and in order that the said Offenders may be brought to Justice, and the like Riots and Disorders may be prevented for the future) hereby to signify his Royal Pleasure to all his Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, and Under-Sheriffs, and all other his Civil Officers whatsoever, that they do use their utmost Endeavours for discovering and apprehending the Offenders herein after-mentioned, who are particularly named in the said Representation, (that is to say) John Pope, of St. Merrin, Husbandman, within the Parish of Gluvius; Edward Nicholas, of the Parish of St. Agnes; John Davy, late of the Parish of Perran Arwothall, but now of the Parish of Kea; Richard Remphry, of the Parish of Gwenop, and Walter Richards, of the said Parish of Gwenop, all Tinnors, in the said County of Cornwall: And to the End that they may be brought to Justice, as also all other Persons who have been, or shall be guilty of, or in any wise concerned in such riotous and dangerous Practices; his Majesty doth hereby promise and declare, That if any Person concerned in the said Riot or Tumult, shall discover or apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any two, or more of the Persons concerned therein, or that shall be concerned in any future Riots there, of the same Kind so as they may be convicted of such Offence, such Discoverer shall have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon; And as a farther Encouragement to the Discoverers of such notorious Offenders, his Majesty doth also hereby promise and declare, that any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any of the Persons herein before particularly named, shall have and receive for every such Offender discovered and apprehended, so as he may be convicted of such Offence, the sum of Forty Pounds, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of such Offenders.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, that the Chariot of Robert James, Doctor in Physick, was on Monday the 28th Day of November last, about Eight in the Evening, stopped by two Men, as he was passing therein through Hide Park near the Water Works, one of whom laid hold on the Reins of the Horses, and the Coachman whipping him over the Face, and endeavouring to drive the Horses against him, the Man retired and fell down; whereupon the other told the Coachman, he would blow his Brains out, stept up to the Fore Wheel, and fired a Pistol at him so near, that it scorched his Cheek. And farther, that about the same Hour in the Evening of the next Day, the Chariot of the said Doctor James passing gently through Hide Park, with his Servants armed attending it, near the said Water-Works, a Pistol or Gun, or some other Fire-Arms were discharged at the said Chariot, by some Person or Persons who lay concealed at some Distance from the Road; and whereas there is Reason to believe, from some particular Circumstances, that the Persons who thus attacked the

Chariot of the said Doctor James, and fired thereat, had some malicious Design against the Person of the said Doctor James, or of one of his Servants: For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Crimes above-mentioned, His Majesty is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the Offenders, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he, they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a farther Encouragement for such Discovery, the said Doctor Robert James doth hereby promise a Reward of Twenty Guineas to such Person, or to any other Person or Persons making the same as aforesaid, to be paid on the Conviction of any one of the said Offenders.

He is a black Man, about five Foot ten Inches high, has a down cast Look, and had on, at the Time he absconded, an old white Wig, a Fustian Frock with Plate Buttons, a blue and white striped Waistcoat, black Breeches, light colour'd Stockings, with large Silver Buckles in his Shoes, and is about fifty Years of Age.

And whereas Informations have been taken against the following Persons for being concerned with others in filing and diminishing such Guineas as aforesaid,

said, as also the Portugal Gold Coin, to wit, Bryan Duff, Mary Dean alias Harrison, and Margaret Rutherford, who have all lately absconded.

Bryan Duff, born in Ireland, a middle sized Man, full bodied, has a round plump Face, of a ruddy Complexion, and has a brisk Eye; is about thirty Years of Age, and generally wears a light brown Coat with yellow Metal Buttons, and a Scarlet Waistcoat; he lived Servant to a Gentleman in Clarges-street Piccadilly, and Charles street St. James's, and lodged last at the Red Lion in King-street Golden Square.

Mary Dean alias Harrison, born in Cheshire, is between forty and fifty Years of Age, lived many Years in Dublin, and well known at Liverpool, is a Dealer in Irish Stuffs: She is a middle sized Woman, has a large Scar in the Left Side of her Neck just below her Hair, a Swelling in one of her Knees, and walks lame; well known in Green Harbour-Court near the Golden Hind, Moorfields, and lodged last in Sedwick's Rents near Moor-Gate.

Margaret Rutherford alias Mary Foster, (born in Ireland) Wife of Robert Rutherford, of Sir John Ligonier's Regiment, is a tall jolly Woman, between thirty and forty Years old, is pitted with the Small Pox, has grey Eyes, and a remarkable Dent at the End of one of her Thumbs; is by Trade a Mantua-maker and Dealer in Irish Stuffs, well known about Temple-Bar, and the Villages round London, and lodged last in Bow-Lane, Cheap-side.

Whoever apprehends the said Samuel Davies, or either of the other above-mentioned Persons, or any other Person concerned in these Practices, may apply themselves to Mr. Fountaine Cook, Solicitor to his Majesty's Mint, at his Chambers in Clement's Inn, London.

And the Post-Master General having also been pleased to order a new Branch to be erected between Salisbury and Axminster, through the Towns of Blandford, Dorchester, Bridport and Lyme, by which Means the Correspondence between London and those Places, together with the Towns of Weymouth, Wareham, and Corfe-Castle, and also their Correspondence with the Trading-Towns in Devonshire and Cornwall, as well as with Bath, and Bristol, will be considerably quickened and improved.

Publick Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances will commence upon Monday the 26th of this Instant December, at which Time the present Stage between Crewkerne and Bridport, together with that between Shaftsbury and Blandford, will be discontinued.
