Hambourg, December 13, N. S. We hear from Warsaw, that in the last Session of the *Senatus Consultum*, the Appointment of an Extraordinary Dyet has been refer'd to his Polish Majesty's Pleasure, and it is thought, that the King may sign the *Universalia* for its Convocation, before he leaves that Kingdom, where his Majesty proposes to stay yet two Months. Letters which came in Yesterday from Petersbourg, brought the News of Count Lestock's Arrest, and it was likewise notified to the Russian Minister in a Dispatch from his Court. This Disgrace was signified to the Count and to his Lady on the 24th of last Month: They yet remain in their own House, though in separate Apartments; and two Days before a Nephew of the Countess's had been conducted Prisoner to the Fortress.

Mayence, December 14, N. S. M. de Spangenberg, the Elector of Treves Minister, is return'd to Coblenz; and M. de la Noue is expected every Day on his Return from Paris, to reassume his Post of Minister Plenipotentiary with the Dyet of the Empire at Ratisbonne.

Whereas it has been represented to his Majesty, That the Dwelling House of Mrs. Philippa Leman, of Wenhaston, in the County of Suffolk, was broke into, on the 5th Instant, between the Hours of Ten and Eleven of the Clock in the Night, by Five Men armed and disguised, and a large Quantity of chased Plate was taken thereout; (Part of which was engraved with the following Coat of Arms in Lozenge, viz. a Fez between Three Dolphins, Or:) As also a considerable Sum of Money, together with a Gold Watch in a chased Case, and a large Quantity of Household Linen; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Burglary and Robbery, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a farther Encouragement, the said Mrs. Philippa Leman does hereby promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds, to any one of the said Accomplices, who shall discover one or more of the said Offenders; to be paid upon their Conviction.

Whereas it has been humbly represented unto the King by the Mayor and other Magistrates of the Town of

Penryn in the County of Cornwall, that on Friday the Seventh Day of October last past, divers Timmers, and other Persons unknown, to the Number of two or three Hundred, came in a riotous and tumultuous Manner and broke open the Cellars of Benjamin Heame, Merchant, in the said Town of Penryn, and carried away Corn to the Quantity of 900 Winchester Bushels, (or 300 great Bushels) the Property of the said Benjamin Heame; And whereas the said Mayor and other Magistrates, in their said Representation, transmitted the Names of certain Persons therein and herein after-mentioned, as being notorious Offenders in the said Riot; and farther represented, that the Behaviour of the Timmers since that Time gives no Room to think they are at all concerned at their Conduct, but the said Mayor and other Magistrates have Reason to apprehend the great Danger that may attend the not discouraging in the most effectual Manner the like tumultuous Riots and Disorders for the future; His Majesty, on Consideration of this Matter, hath been graciously pleased (for the Security of the Persons and Properties of his Subjects, and the Preservation of the publick Peace, and in order that the said Offenders may be brought to Justice, and the like Riots and Disorders may be prevented for the future) hereby to signify his Royal Pleasure to all his Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, and Under-Sheriffs, and all other his Civil Officers whatsoever, that they do use their utmost Endeavours for discovering and apprehending the Offenders herein after-mentioned, who are particularly named in the said Representation, (that is to say) John Pope, of St. Merrin, Husbandman, within the Parish of Gluwins; Edward Nicholas, of the Parish of St. Agnes; John Dawy, late of the Parish of Perran Arwothall, but now of the Parish of Kea; Richard Remphry, of the Parish of Gwenop, and Walter Richards, of the said Parish of Gwenop, all Timmers, in the said County of Cornwall: And to the End that they may be brought to Justice, as also all other Persons who have been, or shall be guilty of, or in any wise concerned in such riotous and dangerous Practices; his Majesty doth hereby promise and declare, That if any Person concerned in the said Riot or Tumult, shall discover or apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any two, or more of the Persons concerned therein, or that shall be concerned in any future Riots there, of the same Kind, so as they may be convicted of such Offence, such Discoverer shall have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon; And as a farther Encouragement to the Discoverers of such notorious Offenders, his Majesty doth also hereby promise and declare, that any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any of the Persons herein before particularly named, shall have and receive for every such Offender discovered and apprehended, so as he may be convicted of such Offence, the Sum of Forty Pounds, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of such Offenders.
