HIS Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland left this Place Yesterday Morning about Seven o'Clock, and as the Weather has been very moderate, and the Wind very fair, we don't in the least question but his Royal Highness is safely landed in England by this Time. Among the many Regulations contained in the Proclamation which the Prince Stadtholder published in Friesland, there are some by which the Nobility are restored to the Possession of all their ancient Rights, and Measures taken for preventing any Persons being considered as Nobles who shall not be able to prove themselves such. Care is likewise taken by this Proclamation, for preventing all unlawful Practices in the Election of the Griet-Men and other Deputies to the States. The Prince also exhorts the States to resolve speedily on some Method for re-establishing their Finances (such as a Poll-Tax, or a Tax upon Families) advising them besides to abolish some Employments which are unnecessary, and only serve to increase the Expences of the Province. Two Days after the issuing of this Proclamation, a General Amnesty was published there for all those who were concerned in the late Commotions in that Province; and in Consequence thereof, some People, who had been taken up on that Account, have been set at Liberty.

This Day about Noon his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arrived here from Holland.

This Day M. Zohrern, Secretary of Legation, and charg'd with the Affairs of the Emperor, and likewise of the Empress Queen of Hungary, had a private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver both his Credential Letters; to which he was

introduced, in the Absence of the Secretaries of State, by the Right Honourable the Earl of Rochford, Gentleman of the Bed Chamber in Waiting, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, December 30.

This Day M. de Klingraff, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Prussia, had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke.

As had likewise Seignor Bafinette, Resident from the most Serene Republick of Venice.

And L'Abbe Grossa Testa, Minister from the Duke of Modena; to all which private Audiences they were introduced by the Master of the Ceremonies.

Whereas it has been represented to the King, That Richard Hawkins, late of Yapton in the County of Suffex, Labourer, being, some Time in the Month of January last, at Work in a Barn near the said Parish,

was forcibly taken from thence by Jeremias Curtis, alias Butler, late of Hawkhurst in the County of Kent, and John Mills, alias Smoker, of Trotton in the County of Sussex; Labourer, and was by them carried into a Back Room in the Dog and Partridge Alehouse on Slindon Common, where Edward Savage, alias Sawidge, alias Fat-back, late of Bezbill, but now of Billingshurst, Alehouse keeper; and Thomas Winter, alias Coachman, alias Kentish Coachman, of Posling, near Hythe, in the County of Kent, Farmer, were waiting for them: In which Room they detained the said Richard Hawkins till about Twelve o'Clock at Night; when the said Jeremias Curtis, John Mills, Edward Savage, and Thomas Winter went away, and took with them the said Richard Hawkins; who was not afterwards seen or heard of till his Body was found in a Pond in Parham Park, in the said County of Sussex: That the Coroner's Inquest having sat upon the said Body, found it to be the Body of the said Richard Hawkins, and brought in their Verdict, Wilful Murder by Persons unknown.

And whereas it hath been further represented to the King, That several Murders, Burglaries and Robberies have been lately committed in the County of Sussex; and that there is the strongest Reason to believe, that the said Jeremias Curtis, John Mills, Edward Savage, and Thomas Winter, were the Authors of the said Murder: His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the abovesaid Persons, as well as for discouraging such horrid and barbarous Outrages, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any Person who shall apprehend, or, by giving Information, shall cause to be apprehended, so as he or they be convicted thereof, any one or more of the said Offenders; notwithstanding the Person making such Discovery shall notwithstanding be outlawed for not having surrendered himself to Justice, pursuant to Notice given in the London Gazette; provided that such Person shall not appear to have been concerned in the abovesaid Murder, or any other Murder; or to have been concerned in the breaking open his Majesty's Warehouse at Pool.

And whereas Informations have been taken against the following Persons for being concerned with others in filing and diminishing such Guineas as aforesaid, as also the Portugal Gold Coin, to wit, Bryan Puff, Mary Dean alias Harrison, and Margery Rutherford, who have all lately absconded.

Bryan Duff, born in Ireland, a middle sized Man, full bodied, has a round plump Face, of a ruddy Complexion, and has a brisk Eye; is about thirty Years of Age, and generally wore a light brown Coat with yellow Metal Buttons, and a Scarlet Waistcoat; he lived Servant to a Gentleman in Clarges-street Piccadilly, and Charles street St. James's, and lodged last at the Red Lion in King-street Golden Square.

Mary Dean alias Harrison, born in Cheshire, is between forty and fifty Years of Age, lived many Years in Dublin, and well known at Liverpool, is a Dealer in Irish Stuffs: She is a middle sized Woman, has a large Scar in the Left Side of her Neck just below her Hair, a Swelling in one of her Knees, and walks lame; well known in Green Harbour-Court near the Golden Hind, Moorfields, and lodged last in Sedwick's Rents near Moor-Gate.

Margaret Rutherford alias Mary Foster, (born in Ireland) Wife of Robert Rutherford, of Sir John Ligonier's Regiment, is a tall jolly Woman, between thirty and forty Years old, is pitted with the Small Pox, has grey Eyes, and a remarkable Dent at the End of one of her Thumbs; is by Trade a Mantua-maker and Dealer in Irish Stuffs, well known about Temple-Bar, and the Villages round London, and lodged last in Bow Lane, Cheapside.

Whoever apprehends the said Samuel Davies, or either of the other abovementioned Persons, or any other Person concerned in these Practices, may apply themselves to Mr. Fountaine Cook, Solicitor to his Majesty's Mint, at his Chambers in Clement's Inn, London.

Publick Notice is hereby given, that these several additional Conveyances will commence upon Monday the 26th of this Instant December, at which Time the present Stage between Crewkerne and Bridport, together with that between Shaftsbury and Blandford, will be discontinued.
