To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiss, and Commonalty of your ancient City of Coventry, in Council assembled, do, with the sincerest Joy, congratulate your Majesty on your safe and happy Return to these Kingdoms; and with the greatest Gratitude we return our most hearty Thanks to your Majesty for rescuing Europe from Slavery, and so honourably ending a just and necessary War.

Your Majesty's mild and glorious Reign, and your constant Regard for the Liberties and Happiness of your Subjects, have always, with the utmost Affection, endeared your Majesty's Perfon to us, and it would create in us great Concern and Abhorrence, to find any Remains of Ingratitude in this most happy Island; being fully convinc'd, that if the highest Degree of Goodness in a Prince can make a People happy, all your Majesty's Subjects have the greatest Reafon to rejoice, and are under the strongest Obligations to Loyalty.

May your Majesty long continue to live the Ornament and Honour of Kings, the great and faithful Friend and Preserver of the Liberties of Europe, and the kind Father of all your People; and may Britons, in all suture Generations, find and deserve that Liberty and Happiness we now enjoy, under a Succession of Princes of your illustrious Family.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

Subjects, the Chancellor, Rector, Principal, Dean of Faculty, and other Members of the University of Glasgow, humbly beg Leave, with the greatest Sincerity, to join in the National Congratulations on your Majesty's safe Return to your Kingdoms, and to express our most grateful Thanks to your Majesty, for putting a happy Period to the Calamities which always accompany War however necessarily undertaken.

The inestimable Blessings of Peace, restored to Europe by your Majesty's Influence, must be deeply felt by all Ranks of People; we rejoice with our Fellow Subjects in the Possession of them, and we are particularly sensible that Learning, and every Liberal. Art must flourish under your Majesty's paternal Care, and indulgent Government.

In this happy Situation, your faithful Subjects have nothing farther to wish, but that it may please Almighty God to prolong your Majesty's Life and Reign, undisturbed for the suture by foreign Wars or rebellious Insurrections; that you may continue long to secure the Liberties of your People, while they, under your Majesty's gracious Protection, cultivate the Arts, and enjoy the Fruits of that Peace which you have so wisely and happily established.

We farther beg Leave, with all Humility, to assure your Majesty, that we seel ourselves bound by the united Principles of Duty and Gratitude, to use our utmost Endeavours to inspire the
