WHEREAS a Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship between us; the most Christian King, and the States General of the United Provinces, hath been concluded at Aix la Chapelle the Seventh Day of October last, to which the Empress Queen of Hungary, the Kings of Spain and Sardinia, the Duke of Modena, and the Republick of Genoa, have acceded, and the Ratifications thereof have been since exchanged: In Conformity thereunto we

have thought fit hereby to command, That the same be published throughout all our Dominions: And we do declare, to all our Loving Subjects, our Will and Pleasure, That the said Treaty of Peace and Friendship be observed inviolably, as well by Sea as Land, and in all Places whatsoever; strictly charging and commanding all our Loving Subjects to take Notice hereof, and to conform themselves thereto accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Fourth and Fifth Year of the Reign of their late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, intituled, An Act for the encouraging the Apprehending of Highwaymen; it is (amongst other Things) enacted, That from and after the Twenty fifth Day of March, One thousand six hundred ninety three, all and every Person and Persons who shall apprehend and take One or more Thieves or Robbers on the Highway, and prosecute him or them so apprehended and taken, until he or they be convicted of any Robbery committed in or upon any Highway, Passage, Field, or open Place, shall have and receive from the Sheriff or Sheriffs of the County where such Robbery and Conviction shall be made and done, without paying any Fee for the same, for every such Offender so convicted the Sum of Forty Pounds, and also shall have and enjoy to his or their Use and Behoof the Horse, Furniture, and Arms, Money or other Goods of the said Robber or Robbers so convicted,

victed, which shall be taken with him or them ; but with a Saving of the Right of such Person or Persons from whom the same were before feloniously taken : And whereas by an Act of Parliament, made in the Ninth Year of his late Majesty King George the First, it is made Felony without Benefit of Clergy, wilfully and maliciously to shoot at any Person in any Dwelling-house or other Place : And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the Seventh Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for the more effectual Punishment of Assaults with Intent to commit Robbery, it is enacted, That if any Person or Persons, from and after the First Day of May, in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and thirty four, shall, with any offensive Weapon or Instrument, unlawfully and maliciously assault, or shall by Menaces, or in or by any forcible or violent Manner demand any Money, Goods or Chattles, of or from any other Person or Persons, with a felonious Intent to rob or commit Robbery upon such Person or Persons, that then, and in every such Case, all and every such Person or Persons so offending, being thereof lawfully convicted, shall be and be adjudged guilty of Felony ; and every such Offender and Offenders shall be subject and liable to be transported as in Cases of Felony ; and the Courts by and before whom he, she, or they shall be tried and convicted, shall have full Power and Authority of transporting such Offenders for the Space of Seven Years, upon the like Terms and Conditions, and by the same Ways and Means, and in the like Manner, as other Felons may or are to be transported to any of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America, by Force or Virtue of any Law for that Purpose then in being ; And whereas we have received Information that frequent Murders, Robberies, and other Outrages, have of late been committed with open Force and Violence upon our good Subjects, passing and repassing in the publick Streets, Roads, and other Places in or near the Cities of London and Westminster, to the great Annoyance of our peaceable Subjects : And whereas one Thomas Jones, otherwise Harper, was on the Twentieth of January last committed to the Prison of the Gatehouse in Westminster, on Suspicion of Felony, and the said Thomas Jones, otherwise Harper, being so in Prison, divers Persons, to the Number of Twenty and upwards, armed with Pistols, Cutlasses, and other offensive Weapons, on the same Twentieth Day of January, in a forcible Manner did enter the said Prison, and did wilfully and maliciously assault, shoot at, and wound several Persons therein, and by Force and Violence took away and rescued the said Thomas Jones, otherwise Harper, from the said Prison, in open Defiance of the Laws of this our Kingdom ; and several other Offenders, who have been taken into

Custody, have of late, with Force and Violence been rescued and set at Liberty by great Numbers of Armed Persons ; We therefore, out of a tender Concern for the Lives and Properties of our loving Subjects, and in order, if possible, for the Future, to prevent such wicked and detestable Practices, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to issue this our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly charge and command, That the said Laws, and all other Laws, made for the Prevention and Punishment of Offences of this Sort, be duly put in Execution : And we do hereby strictly command and require all our Justices, Sheriffs, Under Sheriffs, and Civil Officers whatsoever, and all other our loving Subjects, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to discover and apprehend all such Persons as have been or shall be guilty of the Offences before mentioned, and that they do effectually put the said Laws in Execution ; and for the Encouragement of all Persons to be diligent in endeavouring to discover and apprehend all such Offenders, we do hereby promise and declare, That any Person or Persons, who shall discover and apprehend any Offender, who hath at any Time within three Months last past committed, or hereafter, within the Space of Fifteen Months from the Date hereof, shall commit any Murder whatsoever, or any Robbery, with open Force and Violence, in any Street, Highway, Road, Passage, Field, or open Place in the Cities of London or Westminster, or within Five Miles round the same, or shall discover and apprehend the said Thomas Jones, otherwise Harper, or any of the said Persons who were concerned, or aiding and assisting in the Rescuing the said Thomas Jones, otherwise Harper, or as the said Thomas Jones, otherwise Harper, or any other of the said Offenders, so to be apprehended, be convicted of the said Offences, or any of them, shall have and receive for the said Thomas Jones, otherwise Harper, and each and every such other Offender so apprehended and convicted as aforesaid, the Sum of One Hundred Pounds, over and above all other Rewards to which such Person or Persons may by any Act of Parliament be intituled ; which said Sum of One Hundred Pounds, for every such Person so apprehended and convicted as aforesaid, the Commissioners of our Treasury, or our High Treasurer of Great Britain for the Time being, are hereby directed and required to pay accordingly, without any further or other Warrant in that Behalf ; and if the Person so discovering and apprehending any such Persons as aforesaid, (except the Persons actually giving a Wound in any such Murder, and the said Thomas Jones, otherwise Harper) shall have been an Accomplice in any such Murder, Robbery, or Rescue, and by reason thereof shall stand in Need of our most

gracious Pardon, we do hereby further promise and declare, That such Person shall have our most gracious Pardon.

WHEREAS Samuel Downer, commonly called or known by the Name of Little Sam, of Woodhouse Altes near Rowlands Castle in the County of Southampton, Labourer; Edmund Richards, of Long Coppice, in the Parish of Warblington, in the said County of Southampton, Labourer; Thomas Stringer, of Chichester in the County of Sussex, Cordwainer; Daniel Perrier, of Norton in the said County of Sussex, Labourer; Robert Fogden, of Boxgrove in the said County of Sussex, Carpenter, Edward Edwards, commonly called or known by the Name of the Tall Boy, of Fiddleworth in the said County of Sussex, Labourer; Thomas Lillywhite, commonly called or known by the Name of Slotch or Slutch, of or near Storrington in the said County of Sussex, Labourer; Thomas Naylor, otherwise Naylard, otherwise Nailwood, of Partridge Green, in the Parish of East Grinstead, in the said County of Sussex, Labourer; William Naylor, otherwise Naylard, otherwise Nailwood, of the same Place, Labourer; and John Duke the Younger, of or near Arundell in the said County of Sussex, Labourer, were, upon the Eleventh Day of January last, charged by Information of a credible Person upon Oath, by him subscribed before Henry Fielding, Esquire, one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the Liberty of Westminster, with having been guilty, upon the Seventh Day of October, in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and forty seven, of being, together with divers other Persons, armed with Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons, and so armed, being assembled at Poole in the County of Dorset, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Breaking open the Custom-House there, and taking away from thence a large Quantity of Uncustomed Goods after Seizure, which Goods had been there lodged by some of the Officers of his Majesty's Customs; Which Information was afterwards certified by the said Henry Fielding, under his Hand and Seal, to one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before his Majesty in his Privy Council, pursuant to the late Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of

his present Majesty in that Case made and provided:—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, by this his Order in his Privy Council, require and command, That the said Samuel Downer, commonly called or known by the Name of Little Sam, Edmund Richards, Thomas Stringer, Daniel Perrier, Robert Fogden, Edward Edwards, commonly called or known by the Name of the Tall Boy, Thomas Lillywhite, commonly called or known by the Name of Slotch or Slutch, Thomas Naylor, otherwise Naylard, otherwise Nailwood, William Naylor, otherwise Naylard, otherwise Nailwood, and John Duke the Younger, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves, within the Space of Forty Days after the First Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of his Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

The Officers of Arms, with the Serjeants at Arms and Trumpeters, mounted their Horses in the Stable-Yard, St. James's, and proceeding thence to the Palace Gate, Garter Principal King of Arms, read his Majesty's Proclamation, and Norroy King of Arms proclaimed it aloud: Which being done, the Procession was made to Charing-cross as follows, viz. A Party of Horse Grenadiers to clear the Way. Beadles of Westminster with Staves, two and two. Constables of Westminster. High Constable of Westminster with his Staff. The Officers of the High Bailiff of Westminster with white Wands. The Deputy High Bailiff of Westminster. Knight Marshal's Men. Knight Marshal. Drums. Drum Major. Trumpets. Serjeant Trumpeter in his Collar, bearing his Mace. Bluemantle Pursuivant. Windsor Herald. Lancaster Herald. Chester Herald. York Herald.

Herald between two Serjeants at Arms in their Collars. Somerset Herald between two Serjeants at Arms. Norroy King of Arms between two Serjeants at Arms. Garter Principal King of Arms between two Serjeants at Arms. A Party of Horse Guards. At Charing-cross Norroy King of Arms read the Proclamation, and Somerset Herald proclaimed it aloud. In this Method the Procession was made to Temple-Bar, where the Officers of the City of Westminster retired, and within the Gate the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Recorder and Sheriffs in Scarlet, attended; and Bluemantle Pursuivant having presented to his Lordship the Earl Marshal's Warrant, the City Procession followed the Party of Horse Guards. At the End of Chancery-Lane Somerset Herald read the Proclamation, and York Herald proclaimed it aloud. At the End of Wood-street, where the Cross formerly stood, York Herald read the Proclamation, and Chester Herald proclaimed it aloud. And lastly at the Royal Exchange, in 'Change Time, Chester Herald read the Proclamation, and Lancaster Herald proclaimed it aloud. The Spectators expressed their great Satisfaction by loud Acclamations of Joy at each Place.

Genoa, January 27, N. S. Three Days ago a Courier arrived from Nice, with Advice that a Convention had been signed there for the Evacuation of Italy; in Consequence of which a Detachment of the Spanish Regiments marched Yesterday from Recco for Parma, and the Remainder are to follow this Day and To-morrow; and General Almada, who commands them, sets out this Night or To-morrow Morning for Parma, he being appointed to take Possession of those States in the Name of the Infant Don Phillip. The French Troops are to begin to march the 1st of next Month. M. de Chauvelin, it is said, is to remain here as Plenipotentiary to settle the Affairs of Corsica.

Dublin, January 21.

Yesterday being the Birth-Day of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Great Guns were fired in his Majesty's Phoenix Park, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: At Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment the Lords Justices upon this Occasion: And at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies.

Whereas it has been represented to the King, that Richard Hawkins, late of Tipton in the County of Sussex, Labourer, being, some Time in the Month of January last, at Work in a Barn, near the said Pa-

risb, was forcibly taken from thence by Jeremiah Curtis alias Butler, late of Harokhurst in the County of Kent, and John Mills alias Smoaker, of Trotton in the County of Sussex, Labourer, and was by them carried into a Back Room in the Dog and Partridge Alehouse on Slendon Common, where Thomas Winter, alias Coachman, alias Kentish Coachman, of Postling near Hythe in the County of Kent, Farmer, and a Person called Robb, alias Richard Rowland, of East Grinstead in the County of Sussex, and is Brother to a Person living there, known by the Name of the Cackler, were waiting for them, in which Room they detained the said Richard Hawkins till about Twelve of the Clock at Night, when the said Jeremiah Curtis, John Mills, Robb, and Thomas Winter, went away, and took with them the said Richard Hawkins, who was not afterwards seen or heard of till his Body was found in a Pond in Parham Park in the said County of Sussex; That the Coroner's Inquest having sat upon the said Body, found it to be the Body of the said Richard Hawkins, and brought in their Verdict Wilful Murder by Persons unknown.

And whereas at a Special Commission of Oyer and Terminer and Goal Delivery for the County of Sussex, held at Chichester on Monday the 16th Day of January last, a Bill of Indictment was found by the Grand Jury of the said County, against Samuel Downer, alias Samuel Howard, alias Little Sam, of Rowland's Castle in the County of Hants, Labourer, Edmund Richards, of Long Coppice, in the Parish of Warblington, in the said County, Labourer, and Henry Sheerman, alias Little Harry, of Lye near Warblington aforesaid, Labourer, for the Murder of one William Gally; and also another Bill of Indictment was then and there found against Thomas Stringer, late of the City of Chichester, Cordwainer, and Daniel Perryer, alias Little Daniel, late of Norton in Sussex, Labourer, for the Murder of Daniel Chater; and also against John Mills, late of Trotton in the County of Sussex, Labourer, and Thomas Willis, commonly called the Coachman, of Selbourne near Lipbook in the County of Hants, Labourer, as Accessaries before the Fact; to which Indictments they nor any of them have yet appeared to be tried for the said Murders; His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the said Curtis, Mills, Robb, Downer, Richards, Sheerman, Stringer, Perryer, and Willis, as well as for discouraging such horrid and barbarous Outrages, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any Person who shall apprehend, or, by giving Information, shall cause to be apprehended, so as he or they be convicted thereof, any one or more of the said Offenders, notwithstanding the Person making such Discovery shall now stand Outlawed for not having surrendered himself to Justice, pursuant to Notice given in the London Gazette; provided that such Person shall not appear to have been concerned in the aforesaid Murder, or any other Murder, or to have been concerned in the Breaking open his Majesty's Warehouse at Poole.
