Naples.

Naples, Jan. 14, N. S. On the 7th Instant an Edict was published in this City, notifying a Reduction of twenty five Festival Days in the Year, as expressed in the Bull which the King caused to be solicited of the Pope, for the Advantage of the Tradesmen in this Kingdom. On the 8th the Marquis of Villa Darias, Commander in Chief, and M. de Casigal, Field Marshal of the Spanish Troops in this City, had an Audience of Leave of the King, being on their Departure for Spain. The Marquis was presented by the King with his Picture set with Jewels, valued at about 9000 Crowns, and M. de Casigal with a Diamond Ring, esteemed at 2000 Ducats. The said Troops are to embark in a Day or two, the Provisions and other Necessaries being already on Board the Transports: The King's Ships St. Philip, Notre Dame de la Conception, and a Tartan Cruizer, are to escort them, Part to Barcelona, and the rest to Alicant. On the 9th their Majesties, attended by their respective Retinues and Guards, set out from this City to Persano, where they design to pass some Days in hunting in that Forrest.

Rome, Jan. 18, N. S. Last Week upwards of a hundred Shoemakers were committed to the common Goals, for having, in a mutinous Manner, presented themselves to the Pope, whilst he was Abroad to visit some Churches, requiring the Reduction of Duties upon Leather. On the 12th, the Duke de Nivernois, the French Ambassador, arrived in this City; and on the 13th he was, by the Secretary of State, introduced to a private Audience of the Pope.

Dresden, Feb. 9, N. S. The King and Queen of Poland arrived here last Night from Warsaw, in perfect Health. Count Bestucheff, her Czarijh Majesty's Minister at this Court, being named by the Czarina to go as Ambassador to Vienna, will set out for that Court in about six Weeks; and Count Keyserling, the Russian Minister at Berlin, succeeds Count Bestucheff at this Court.

Hague, Feb. 14, N. S. M. de Gros, who was the Russian Minister at the French Court, arrived here two Days ago from Paris.

Hague, Feb. 18, N. S. The States of Holland took a few Days ago a Resolution, by which they enjoin all the Towns of the Southern Quarter to pay into the General Comptoir, and those of the Northern Quarter into the other Comptoirs of this Province, all their Arrears in the ordinary *Verponding* or Tax upon Houses, down to the Year 1748 inclusively. The said Arrears down to 1745 inclusively, are to be sent in immediately; and those for 1746, before the 1st of March; those for 1747, by the 1st of April, and those for 1748, by the 1st of May; and a Premium of Four per Cent. is to be allowed to those Towns which shall regularly keep those Forms, and shall have cleared all their former Arrears: This Premium is to be deducted at each Term, upon the whole Amount of the Arrears paid in by the said Towns. We are inform'd, that 1500 of the Bavarian Troops that were in the Dutch Service, are to enter into that of the Empress Queen, with a Staff, ten Captains, and a proportionable Number of Sub-

altern Officers. M. de Gros, the Russian Minister at the French Court, found here, upon his Arrival, his Letters of Revocation, which he has since sent to Paris. The States General received this Morning the News of the Bishop of Wurtzbourg's Death.

Whereas it has been represented to the King, that Richard Hawkins, late of Yapton in the County of Sussex, Labourer, being, some Time in the Month of January last, at Work in a Barn near the said Parish, was forcibly taken from thence by Jeremiab Curtis alias Butler, late of Hawkhurst in the County of Kent, and John Mills alias Smoker, of Trotton in the County of Sussex, Labourer, and was by them carried into a Back Room in the Dog and Partridge Alehouse on Slendon Common, where Thomas Winter, alias Coachman, alias Kentish Coachman, of Postling near Hythe in the County of Kent, Farmer, and a Person called Robb, alias Richard Rowland, of East Grinstead in the County of Sussex, and is Brother to a Person living there, known by the Name of the Cackler, were waiting for them, in which Room they detained the said Richard Hawkins till about Twelve of the Clock at Night, when the said Jeremiab Curtis, John Mills, Robb, and Thomas Winter, went away, and took with them the said Richard Hawkins, who was not afterwards seen or heard of till his Body was found in a Pond in Parham Park in the said County of Sussex; That the Coroner's Inquest having sat upon the said Body, found it to be the Body of the said Richard Hawkins, and brought in their Verdict Wilful Murder by Persons unknown.

And whereas at a Special Commission of Oyer and Terminer and Goal Delivery for the County of Sussex, held at Chichester on Monday the 16th Day of January last, a Bill of Indictment was found by the Grand Jury of the said County, against Samuel Downer, alias Samuel Heward, alias Little Sam, of Rowland's Castle in the County of Hants, Labourer, Edmund Richards, of Long Coppice, in the Parish of Warblington, in the said County, Labourer, and Henry Sheerman, alias Little Harry, of Lye near Warblington aforesaid, Labourer, for the Murder of one William Gally; and also another Bill of Indictment was then and there found against Thomas Stringer, late of the City of Chichester, Cordwainer, and Daniel Perryer, alias Little Daniel, late of Norton in Sussex, Labourer, for the Murder of Daniel Chater; and also against John Mills, late of Trotton in the County of Sussex, Labourer, and Thomas Willis, commonly called the Coachman, of Selbourne near Lipshott

In the County of Hunts, Labourer, as Accessories before the Fact; to which Indictments they nor any of them have yet appeared to be tried for the said Murders; His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the said Curtis, Mills, Robb, Downer, Richards, Sheerman, Stringer, Perryer, and Willis, as well as for discouraging such horrid and barbarous Outrages, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any Person who shall apprehend, or, by giving Information, shall cause to be apprehended, so as he or they be convicted thereof, any one or more of the said Offenders, notwithstanding the Person making such Discovery shall now stand Outlawed for not having surrendered himself to Justice, pursuant to Notice given in the London Gazette; provided that such Person shall not appear to have been concerned in the abovesaid Murder, or any other Murder, or to have been concerned in the Breaking open his Majesty's Warehouse at Poole.
