Paris, Feb. 15, N.S. The Peace was published here last Wednesday with the usual Ceremonies; and the Day following the whole Town was illuminated, and great Rejoicings were made upon that Occasion.

Hague, Feb. 21, N. S. The Proprietors of the new East-India Company having lately given in, to the Committee of the States General, some Proposals relating to the Conditions

on which the chief Direction of their Company is to be offered to the Prince Stadtholder, the Directors were ordered to deliver in their Remarks upon those Proposals, which they accordingly did Yesterday: But the States have not yet determin'd any Thing on this Subject. Major General Wartensleben, (who was employed last Year in Germany by the Prince of Orange, in several Negociations about Troops) has been proposed to the States General, by the Deputies of Holland, to be sent as their High Mightinesses Minister Plenipotentiary to the three Ecclesiastical Electors, and the Circles of the Upper and Lower-Rhine.
