HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Mr. Bellenden, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax to be raised in Great-Britain, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and forty nine.

An Act, declaring the Authority of the Commissioners appointed by his Majesty, under the Great Seal of Great-Britain, for receiving, hearing, and determining Appeals in Causes of Prizes.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road leading from the Well, at the North-West End of the Town or Village of Farnborough, in the County of Kent, to a Place called Riverhill in the Parish of Sevenoaks in the said County.

And to Five Private Bills.

We are fully sensible how much this desirable Event has been owing to the Firmness and Wisdom of your Majesty's Conduct and Councils, and that the Tranquillity of Europe, and the Prosperity of your People, are the great Ends of your Majesty's constant Endeavours.

Accept, Sir, our most humble and hearty Thanks upon this joyful Occasion, and permit us to add our sincerest Wishes, that your Majesty may long continue to reign over us, and to receive the grateful Returns of a happy People, united in their Duty to your Majesty, and Affection to your Royal Family.

To which Address his Majesty was pleased to return this most gracious Answer.

I Thank you for this loyal Address; and have a firm Dependance upon the Assurances, you give me, of your Zeal and Affection for my Person and Government.

And they all had the Honour to kiss His Majesty's Hand.
