HE following Address of the High-Sheriff, Juffices of the Peace, and Grand Jury of the County Palatine of Lancaster, has been presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Strange, one of the Representatives in Parliament for the faid County, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Fauconberg, one of the Lords of his Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting : Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

As your Majesty entred into the late War from a Principle of Justice, to affert the Rights of an innocent though injured, and to vindicate the Honour of a brave but infulted People; fo your Firmness in the Conduct of it must be extremely pleafing to a martial Nation, and worthy the Majesty of a British King, descended from a Race of Ancestors, ever distinguished for a generous Contempt of Death in Defence of Truth and Liberty. To delight in War is a Symptom of a cruel and weak Mind: But your Majesty has given a fignal Proof of Humanity and universal Benevolence (undifputed Marks of true Greatness of Soul) in putting a Stop to the Effusion of human Blood, and reftoring Peace to the most confiderable Part of Mankind. This fhews your Majesty to be a Friend to Man, as well 'as a true Father of your People, and entitles you to the Efteem and Veneration of all who with well to their Fellow Creatures in general, or to the Wealth and Commerce, to the Peace and Prosperity of Britons in particular. The Bleffings continued to these Kingdoms under your Majesty's Reign, in the Preservation and undiffurbed Enjoyment of every Civil and Religious Right, must convince all reasonable Men, that, both in Peace and War, the Good of your Subjects has been the constant Object of your Attention, and the Laws the invariable Rule and Measure of your Actions. May your Majesty long live to enjoy the unrival'd Pleasure that must arise from the Conscioufnefs of having, with unwearied Affiduity, laboured for the Happiness of your People, and fucceeded! and may every Subject make a just and fuitable Return, by a faithful and undiffembled Loyalty and Affection to your Royal Perfon and Family, and by a quiet and peaceable Submiffion to your mild and legal Government.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, and Grand Jury of the County Palatine of Lancaster, assembled at the Asfizes holden at Lancaster, in and for the faid County, on Monday the zoth Day of March 1748, together with the Clergy, Gentlemen, and other Freeholders.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, embrace this first Opportunity of approaching your Majefty with our most hearty Congratulations on your fafe Arrival to your British Dominions. The Deliverance of your Sacred Person from the Dangers it has been exposed to, heightens our Joy on this happy Event; and the Prefervation of a Life for instrumental to publick Happiness, will warm, with Gratitude to Heaven, each Breaft, that is not dead to every generous Impression, or a Stranger to publick Good. We cannot omit this Opportunity to congratulate your Majefty likewife on the Birth of the young Princefs. It must give great Pleasure to every true Englishman and found Protestant, to see the Encrease of a Family, which, under God, is the chief Support of the Protestant Cause, and the English Liberties.
