Hree or four days fince atrived here two Polifh Noblemen, fent by the Senate of that Kingdom, to prefent to his. Holinefs the Standards that were taken from the Turks in the battel of *Golbim* fome months

fince, where the Poles gained fo confiderable a Victory: his Holinefs very well accepted of the Prefent, and has Commanded, that the faid Standards thall be hung up in Si. Staniflaus Church here. The Crown of Spain has at last agreed to the raifing a Tenth of all the Ecclefiastical Revenues in Italy, for the enabling the Poles to carry on the War against the Turks.

Venice, April 30. Here are arrived feveral Veffels from Confrantinople who bring us an account, That the Grand Signior, fincing the overtures that have been made to the Poles by the Cham of Tartary for Peace, to prove ineffectual, was refolved to profecute the War against that Crown, with all the vigor possible; to which purpose vast preparations are making throughout all the Turkish Territories; and that the Tartars may be ready to joyn their Forces with his, the Grand Signior has first a Chiat x to acquain the Cham with the time that he shall be in a posture to zo into the Field requiring him rot to fail to be then likewise ready with all the force he c.n bring together. Signior Anionio Earbaro, who hash ferved this State as General in $D_{dimential, and Constat, is prepa$ ring for his Embasty to Rome.

Dantzick, May 5. The Bishop of Marfeilin, Am-bassador from the most Cluitian King, arrived here on Monday the 30 paft, and Wednefday following, departed in all hafte to the Election at Warfam; from whence we have Letters dated the first instant, which tell us, there was a hot contest betwixt the Poles and Lythuanians, because the latter would have it Acted ; That no Piasus (or Native of either Countrey) should be once nominated to be elected King; which the other flrongly oppofed, and this had lasted a whole weeks time; but was not come to an end: fo that nothing was then done in relation to the Election. Some Deputics from the Army had Audience the 28 paft, and defired payment of their Arrears, adding, that if they were not fatisfied in a few days, they would leave their feveral Charges, and let the Crown take care for others to oppose the baibarous Enemy, which they are informed is approaching, with a very great Army. General Sebter hi was. not come to Warfam the fust inflant, but expected thither the next day,

Himbrough, May 6. The Dutch very confidently report here, that the Treaty between the States General and the Princes of Lun nburgh, is already concluded, or will be very fuddainly; by which those Princes, in confideration of a monthly Subfidy, oblige themfelves to have 14000 Men on foot to alfish the faid States. They likewise fay, that there is great appearance that the Negotiations of the States Envoye at Berlin, will have a good iffue, notwithstanding all the endeavors of Monfieur Verjus to the contrary, who we are told, onely defires of the Elector, that he will not permit the Electrics of the most Christian King his Master, to have passage through his Territories. The Bishop of Muniter has now quitted all the places he possible delonging to the States, or at least has given orders for the doing it. Our Letters from Copenhagen give us an account of the Ratification of the Treaty concluded between that King the Emperor, and the States-General of the United Provinces.

Ratisbonne, May 3. The Dyet here having iffued out Initructions to the Generals of the Empire; for the fpeedy bringing together the Forces of the feveral Circles, they begin accordingly to march; and about the '16 or 20 of this month, it is thought they will be together in a Body. The Prince of Biden Dourlach, who is at prefent at Viennito adjuft feveral matters relating to the march of the faid Troops, is fiddainly expected back from thence; and having given the Dyet an account of his Tranfaction, he will immediately depart to the place of Rendezvous; In the mean time we have advice, that the French apprehending fome defigne upon-Phillipsbourg, have reinforced the Garrifon there, and made all neceffary Provifion for the defence of the place. The 8 or to inftant, the Imperial Army will begin to march from Egra.

Vienna, May 3. The Prince of Baden Dourlach, General of the Forces of the Empire, having had fiveral Conferences with the Count de Montecuculi, is parted hence for Rathbonne. It is confidently faid, that the Aimy will begin to march from Egra the eighth of this month, but others harely thick it can be fo foon, for feveral pieces of Cannon, which are defigned for this expedition, are as yet here. The Envoye that was here from the Turks, has adjufted the matter about the releafment of prifoners.

Baste, May 8. The forcors defigned for the Franché Comie, under the Conduct of the Duke of Lorrein, are arrived within three Leagues of this place, on the other fide of the Rhyne, and Monficur de Turenne lies with his Troops within a League of us, on this fide of the River, to oppose the pathage of the faid Duke. From the Franche Comie we have not any particulars of the Siege of Bestançon, but onely this in general, That the French continue i with agreat deal of vigor, and that the Befieged defend themsfelves very well. Stratbourgh, May 11. The Troops of the Duke of Lorrin according to our last advices, were arrived at Scaffenhausen, and Monsieur de Turenne continued encamped not far from Basle, being daily reir forced with several Troops that come from Nancy and other parts. In the mean time the Marquis of Vaubuun keeps his Quarters at Hugening in our neighborhood, having about 3 or 400. Men with him. The Imperial and Palatine Troops begin to march, as well on this, as on the other fide of the Rhyne, fo that we may now in a fhort time hear of fome action.

Cologne May 11. The Treaty of Accommodation between the Emperor and our Elector is not as yet concluded, though it hath been often faid, and fo many dif-

figulties

ficulties arife daily, that it will be a hard matter to reconcile them ; however, the Dutch Ambassadors pretend, that before their departure, they doubt not but to fee this Treaty finished's and at the same time fay, that they shall in few days leave this place; their Baggage is already imbarked, and will part hence this day. It is faid, that our Magiftrates have by a publick Infru-It is ment renounced the Neutrality; and that the faid In-ftrument hath been fent so the Dyet at Ratiskonie, to The Imperial Troops bebe likewife published there. gin to march from their feveral quarters to the place appointed for their Rendezvous, which is to be the 15 of this month, between this City and Ben. We have advice, That the Duke of Lorrain was arrived with this Troops at Rhinfelden on the Rhyne above Buffes that he was there the 5 inftant, and that Monfieur de Turenne was on the other fide of that River, with intention to oppose his passage.

Liege, May 12. The French Troops which have been drawn out of the places quitted by the French, will arrive this evening under the Command of Monsieur de Bellefonds, within two Leagues of Macstricht, being in all about 17 or 18000 Men, It is thought they will make but a very thort stay there, and then proceed to go and toyn the Prince of Conic.

Lifle, May 14. The 11 inflant the Prince of Conde decamped with his Army from its Quarters near Sournay, being, to fpeak impartially, 21 or 22004 feen, Horfe and Foot; they took their march towards deib, from whence it is thought they will continue their way for Charleroy, and fo torward, in order to their Conjunction with Monfieur de Eellefonds. The Prince of Conde before his Decampment, feut feveral Companies of Swiffers and others, in all about 1200 Merg, to reinforce the Garrilons at Dunkirk, Gravitation, Ge.

Amfler lam May 15. Our Men of War will no ? in few days be all at the Rendezvous at the Weilings, from whence the Fleet will fail in a fhort time affer. By a Dane arrived from Rashel we have advice, chai the French apprehending a descent of our Troops, are fortifying all their Marithme places, especially those which are Harbors for their Men of War, and that they are disposing of the Militia of the Countrey, that they may be in a readincis to guard the Sea-coaft, as there may be occasion; and it is farther faid, That the moit confiderable of the Inhabitants of St. Martens and the Isle of Rhe, have removed to Rochel. It is confidently reported, that the Treaty with the Elector of Cologne is finally concluded, and that the Articles which concern more particularly this State, are, That Rhynbergh fhall be put into the hands of the Elector, he paying this State the Charges it has been at in fortifying the place; That the Artillery which is now there, shall be reftored to us, and that the Hoftages which were brought thither from Over-Yffel, shall be treely rettored, but this needs a farther confirmation. We feem to be affured here, that the Imperial Army hath been on its march from Egra ever fince the eighth inflant; its firength is differently spoken of, some fay, that it confifts of 25000 Men, whilft others, will not allow it to be composed at present of above 18000 at most.

Hague, May 15. The Army of this State being at prefent at the Rendezvous at Bergen-op-Zoom, Our Fleet ready to fail, and the Prince of Orange abfent from this place, who as we told you in our laft, parted hence on Friday laft; little of news offers here: The difcourfes in the mean time, concerning the defignes of the Campagne are various, and with fo great uncertainty, that little account is to be made of them This morning the Ambaffadors defigned for England took their leaves

of the States General, and the 17 inflant they will begin their journey from hence : the Heer Odyke will first go and wait upon the Prince at Bergen. op-Zoom, from thence he will proceed to Zealand, and so pass over for England.

Bruffels, May 11. We are hastening with all the diligence possible, the preparations for the Campagne; his Excellencies Equipage is now ready, and confiits in 20 Waggons with tour Horfes apiece; Three Coaches with fix Horfes each ; and eighteen Mules : about this day 8 days it is thought his Excellency may go into the Field. The Prince of Orange is coming towards Malines with an Army of 25000 Men; and his Excellency pretends to have likewife an Army in the Field of the like number. The Prince of Conde we hear, is bringing his Forces together near Tournay, they will be about 25000 Men, and when joyned with the Mareschal de Bellefonds, the Prince will have an Army of 40000 Men. Our Letters from the French Conquests tell us, that whilft the most Christian King is making his Conquests in the Francke Comte, the Prince of Conde will onely act defensively in these parts, but we do not truft to this, but have very well provided all our frontier places with Men and all things neceffary, Befides the Army which the Prince of Orange brings with him, he has fent hither 10000 Men as Auxiliaries, who are to be garrifoned in fuch places as his Excellency shall appoint, that fo our own Troops may be drawn out into the Field; fome are to come hither, and Lodgings are provided for them on the Counterfcarps. The Rendezvous of our Troops is to be between this place and Hall. We have advice, that the French Troops under the Command of Monfigur de Bellefonds, have taken a small place in the Countrey of Juliers, called Erkelens, belonging to the Crown of Spain. Bruffels, May 26. The thirteenth inflant the Prince of Orarge arrived at Rofondaci, where is the general Rendezvous of his Army; that afternoon he went to Bcrgen-ip-Zoom, but returned again in the evening, and lodged at Rofendati. To morrow these Treops will match towards Malines. We have advice that the Prince of Conde is broken up from Tournay, and is marched to joyn the Troops Commanded by Monfieur de Bellef nis.

Offend, May 17. Our Letters from Zealand tell us, That most of the Dutch Men of War were come to the Rendezvous at the Weilings, that in a day or two at farthest, they expected the rell would be all there, and then the Fleet would fail; It is faid that the Prince of Orange after having been with his Army at Rosenduel, near Malines, will make a step to Zealand to see the Fleet before they fail.

Whitekal, May 10. This morning their Excellencies Sir I coline Fenkins, and Sir Holph William fon, Knights, His Majeflies Ambassaddors Extraordinary, and Plenipotentiaries for the Treaty at Cologne, arrived here, and were very gracioi fly received by His Majesty.
