Marence, April 19, N. S. His Electoral Highnels our Sovereign having given his own Vote, and engaged his Friends in the Chapter of Wurtzburgh to follow his Example in Favour of Baron Grevenclau; this Gentleman was unanimoufly elected Prince Bifhop of Wurtzburgh and Duke of Franconia on the 14th Inftant. His Electoral Highness returned hither on the 12th from Aschaffenburgh; and Yesterday in the Evening Prince Charles of Lorrain arrived here in his Way to Bruffels. The Elector, attended by the Officers of his Court, received his Royal Highness at his Palace of La Favourite, where a very Magnificent Supper was prepared, to which the Ladies of the first Distinction, the Prince of Hatzfeld, and Mr. Burrish, his Britannick Majesty's Minister, were invited, and no Honours were omitted that could poffibly be employed upon fuch an Prince Charles fet out early the Occasion. next Morning for Cologne, after having made very handlome Prefents to the Officers of the

Court, and the Soldiers of the Garrison. Turin, April 20, N. S. His Sardinian Majefty has published an Edict for opening a free Trade from and into his Dominions, by establifting a Porto Franco at Nice, Villefranche and St. Ofpice, and for inducing foreign Mer-chants to fettle and trade thither. Count Richecourt fet out the Day before Yesterday for Milan and Florence; and after eight or ten Days Stay at the latter, he will proceed to Vienna, and from thence to England.

Paris, April 23, N. S. M. de la Chetard'e has been prelented at Versailles, on being nominated Ambaffador to the Court of Turin. The Duc d'Huescar set out for Madrid on Monday last ; and Prince d'Ardore, Ambassador from the King of the Two Sicilies, has taken Leave, and fets out for Naples the End of this Week.

Hague, April 29, N. S. The States of Hol-land published last Saturday a Proclamation, by which it is ordered, That the Summons for the Payment of the Provisional Taxes shall be the Payment of the Provisional Taxes that be iffued on or before the 15th of June, N. S. and that two Thirds of the faid Taxes, for the whole Year, beginning on the 1ft of July 1748, and ending the 1ft of July next, fhall be paid on or before the 1ft of August, and the other Third by the 1st of September. The Payment for the other Six Months, which begin on the 1st of July next, and end on the last of December, is likewife to be made in two Terms, viz. one Half by the 1ft of November. and the other Half before the 1st of February next.

in the House; and as they were going out of the House, they told the said Batsford, that if he stirred for an Hour, there would be People round the House that would blow bis Brains out : His Majefly, for the better discovering and bringing the Offenders to Justice, is hereby graciously pleased to promise bis most gracious Pardon to any one of the Persons concerned in the abovementioned Crimes, who shall discover any one or more of his Accomplaces, so that be, they, or any one of them, may be apprehended and convisted thereof.
