Naples, April 1, N. S.

ON the 30th past, a Spanish Priest was, by Order of the Court, arrested by the Bailiffs of the Cardinal Archbishop, and conducted to Prison for having forged the Subscription of the Marquis Fogliani the Secretary of State, in a pretended circular Order to the Cities, Towns and Villages of the Kingdom, to pay a certain Sum of Money, to the Bearer of it, by way of Contribution.

Rome, April 5, N. S. The Pope, at the Request of the King of Sardinia, has granted him a Bull to exact a Tax of 300,000 Crowns upon the Ecclesiasticks in his Dominions.

Florence, April 11, N. S. An Edict is on the Point of being published, prescribing to the Nobility and Citizens the Number of Livery Servants they are to keep, and the Distinction of their Liveries. They write from Parma, that Don Phillip has declared his Intention of passing the greatest Part of the Year in his Country Seats of Sala, Colorno, &c. in order to avoid Expences.

Hague, May 2, N. S. The Prince Stadtholder assisted Yesterday at the Council of State, and settled with them the Plan for the further Reduction of the Republic's Troops, which his Serene Highness communicated this Day to the States General. According to this Plan, the Regiment of Dragoons, and the first Battalion of Saxe Gotha, the fourth Battalion of Nassau-Orange, and the third Battalion of Waldeck, are to be sent home; but this last is to continue at their High Mightinesses Disposal, in Consideration of a Subsidy to be paid to the Prince of Waldeck. Besides the abovementioned Battalions, seven Men per Company are to be reduced throughout the whole Army; and it is computed this Reduction will amount in all to about 10,000 Men. The Prince was this Day at the Assembly of the States of Holland, to take Leave of them, as he intends to set out some Time next Week for Loo, from whence his Highness purposes to return to the Hague by the 11th of June, which is the Day appointed for the General Thanksgiving and Publick Rejoicings on Account of the Peace. The States of Holland appointed this Day M. Vander Straeten, Pensionary of Leyden, to be Secretary to the Gecommitteerde Raad. The Directors of the West India Company have appointed a Meeting, in order to consider of the Conditions on which it will be proper to offer the Prince of Orange the supreme Direction of their Company.

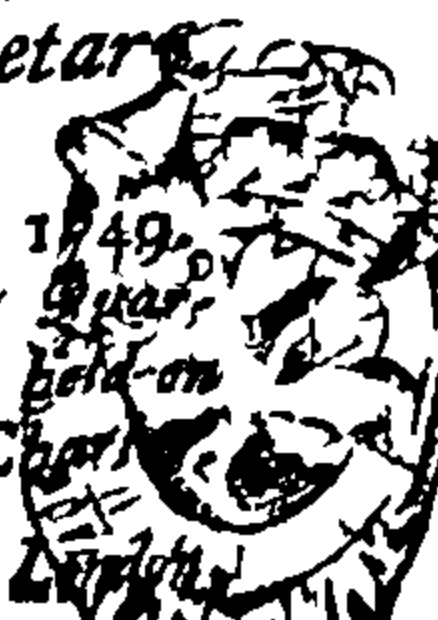
