Madrid, April 21, N. S.

THE new Regulation in the Household, which has been projected ever since the Death of the late King, is at last completed : It consists chiefly in cutting off the Advantages accruing to the Officers, under the Name of Perquisites, and reducing the Number of them to the Establishment. The Supernumeraries, though dismiss'd from the Exercise of their Employments, have their Salaries continued to them ; and are to fill up, according to their Seniority, such Vacancies as may fall by the Death of those upon the Establishment. This Reformation will save considerable Sums to the Royal Finances. The Archdeaconry of Toledo, vacant sometime since by the Death of the Count de Palma, has been conferred upon the Cardinal de Mendoza, Patriarch of the Indies, with a yearly Income of 12,000 Ducats ; and the Surplus of the Produce of this Benefice, which may be about 40,000 more, is applied to the Use of the Infant Cardinal. This Day their Catholick Majesties set out for Aranjuez, where they propose to stay till the 24th of June. The Infanta likewise set out at the same Time for St. Ildefonso, to visit the Queen Dowager her Mother. An Aviso is arrived this Week at Cadiz, with an Account that the Azogues, and the other Ships under the Command of Admiral Reggio at the Havanna, may be expected in Europe in all the Month of May. The Bishop of Rennes, late Ambassador from the Court of France to his Catholick Majesty, left this Place on the 16th Instant ; and M. Partyet, the French Consul General, is to take Care of the Affairs of that Crown, till the Arrival of the Count de Vaulgrenant, appointed to succeed the Bishop of Rennes.

Paris, April 30, N. S. M. Rouille is appointed to succeed M. Maurepas in the Department of the Marine.

Hague, May 6, N. S. M. Gillis, the Grand Pensionary, desired last Saturday his Dismission of the States of Holland, which was immediately granted him. He is however to preserve the Title of Treasurer General of the Province of Holland, with a Pension of 8000 Florins a Year. His Successor will not be named before the next Meeting of the States of Holland. The States General have not yet taken a Resolution with regard to the Plan proposed to them last Week by the Prince Stadtholder, for the farther Reduction of their Forces ; it is however expected they will terminate that Affair in a few Days. The Prince of Orange's Departure for Leo is put off for a few Days.
