it was greatly against his Inclination) he was obliged, in the View of acquitting what he owes to himself, to set this Affair in its true Light, as he would not make himfelf answerable to Posterity, for the fatal Effects that might attend the Prejudice occasioned to the Finances from these Delays. His Highness then acquaints the States, that after having maturely weighed every thing that could be offered on this Subject, he found that there were only two Methods of answering the End proposed. The first, by the Introduction of a General Poll-Tax on Families, divided into feveral Claffes, according to every one's Confumption, Retinue, Calling, and Means. The fecond, by levying, by Means of Collectors, the Imposts which were formerly farmed out to the Pachters.
