**A**N Ordonnance was published here the Day before Yesterday, signed by the Prince Stadtholder; it consists of 36 Articles, and contains several Regulations concerning the Guards, and other Matters in the Garrison Towns belonging to the Republick. The Prince Stadtholder has wrote from Loo to the States General, to inform their High Mightinesses, that in Consequence of their Desire, he consents that the fourth Battalion of Nassau-Orange, (which his Serene Highness had proposed should be discharged) shall only be sent home, and remain there at the Republick's Disposal, upon the same Conditions as the third Battalion of Waldeck.
