Constantinople, April 24.

A Few Days ago was married by the Grand Signor's Orders, the Daughter of the present Vizir, of Eleven Years old, to the Captain Pascha's Son of thirteen, by which these two Ministers are now on the greatest Foot of Friendship. Large Presents were made them by the Sultan. The Captain Pascha is to depart in a few Days with five Men of War and seven Gallies for the Islands of the Archipelago: On which Occasion all the Foreign Ministers as usual are taking their Audiences of him. Two Frigates and two Gallies are likewise sailed for the Black Sea, to carry Stores to the several Fortresses. Hagy Mehemet, Pascha of Mossul, appointed Pascha of Babylon, is not yet entred that City; he wants more Force to vanquish the Opposition he expects to find there. Hesterly Pascha, formerly of Babylon, died at Marrahash, by which a large Inheritance devolves to the Grand Signor.

Vienna, June 4, N. S. Prince Craon, who has been long Governor of Tuscany for the Emperor, has been here for some Time in his Way to Lorraine, where he proposes to go and spend the Remainder of his Days. Count Harrach, Chancellor of Bohemia, died this Afternoon of the Small Pox: He was taken ill at his Country-house upon Tuesday was Sevensnight, the next Morning he came to Town, and in a few Days the Small Pox appeared, but with so very bad Symptoms, that from that Time the Physicians had but very small Hopes of him.

Dresden, June 8, N. S. Sir Charles Hanbury Williams, his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the King of Poland, is to have his Audience of Leave of his Polish Majesty Tomorrow, and of the rest of the Royal Family in the Course of this Week.

Hague, June 10, N. S. Last Night a Dispute arose here between some of the Attendants of Ali Effendi the Tripolitan Ambassador, and some Jews: The Jews assembled in great Numbers, and attacked the House of the said Ambassador; but a Guard being sent for, they were prevented from doing any other Mischief than breaking the Windows.

Hague, June 13, N. S. Yesterday the States of Holland appointed M. Stein to act provisionally as Grand Pensionary till their next or-

inary Meeting, which will be next Month. The Lottery of Obligations, which the States of Holland lately resolved upon, is said to be quite full. As the Fire-Works, which have been preparing for these several Months, on the Restoration of the Peace, are to be play'd off this Evening, the States-General have invited the Prince Stadtholder, and her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, to be present at the Entertainments, and to sup with them in the Chamber of their Assembly; and in Consequence of a Resolution of their High Mightinesses, M. Byemont their Agent has been with all the Foreign Ministers residing here, to deliver to each of them a certain Number of Tickets for this Occasion; and to acquaint them in Form, that an Apartment would be provided for their Reception in Prince Maurice's House. The Prince of Anspach arrived here from Utrecht last Tuesday Evening.
