**T**HE Barbary Pirates still continue to infest the Seas of Sicily; three of the largest of them have made several Captures in Sight of Palermo, and others are actually cruizing off Trapani, which puts the whole Kingdom to an Alarm, lest they should attempt a Descent upon that Coast. The Magistrate of Health, notwithstanding the Sollicitations from that of Venice, to concur in their Measure to subject all Vessels to 20 Days Quarantine, which should come from any Ports in the Mediterranean to those of the Two Sicilies, has declined to adhere thereto, till the Determination of the Deputation of Health at Rome is known.

Rome, May 31, N. S. Last Week M. Lepri, a Banker in this City, broke for a large Sum of Money, which occasions great Confusion amongst the Bankers at Venice, Naples, and other principal Cities of Italy. On the 27th in the Afternoon, the Pope, attended by his Retinue and Guards, set out from this City for Castle Candolfo, where he proposes to pass some Weeks for the Benefit of the Air.

Hague, June 24, N. S. An extraordinary Assembly of the College of the Nobles of Holland was held Yesterday Morning, when the Prince Stadtholder proposed, That Field Marshal Count Maurice of Nassau, and Count Gronsfeld, should be admitted into their College; upon which they were unanimously elected, and this Morning they were introduced, and took the Oaths and their Seats accordingly in the Assembly of the States of Holland. Prince George of Hesse Cassel is expected here this Evening or To-morrow.
