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Cambridge, July 6.

**H**IS Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Chancellor of this University, having on Tuesday last in Congregation declared his Resignation of the Office of High Steward of the University, the Right Honourable the Lord Hardwicke, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, was Yesterday unanimously elected into that Office.

*Naples, June 24, N. S.* The Court continues at Portici, and the Queen advances happily in her Pregnancy. Prince d'Ardore, late Ambassador at Paris, is arrived here; but no new one is yet named for that Court, nor for that of Madrid. There has been a great Reduction of the Troops, but the Officers remain in Pay.

*Turin, July 5, N. S.* The Marquis de St. Germain set out on the 26th past for Paris, where he proposed to arrive on the 12th Instant; but M. de la Chetardie is not expected here till the Beginning of September. Count la Chavanne arrived two Days ago from the Hague, and was most graciously received by the King his Master. There is no Talk as yet who is to be his Successor.

*Compeigne, July 15, N. S.* The Marquis de Mirepoix, who is appointed Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from his most Christian Majesty to the Court of Great Britain, has Orders to repair hither, to receive his final Instructions, from whence he will set out for Calais in his Way to England.

*Hague, July 13, N. S.* A Resolution was taken on Friday last, in the Assembly of the States General, to negotiate the Sum of Seven Millions and Five Hundred Thousand Florins, by Way of a Lottery, on account of the Generality. A Placart was published here last Week, by which the States of Holland inform the Publick, that with the Advice and Participation of the Prince Stadtholder, they were come to a Resolution to levy, from the 1st of January 1750, by Means of Collectors, the several Imposts that were formerly farmed out to the Pachtors. They likewise declare, that in the new Regulations which will be made for that Purpose, particular Care will be taken to

ease the common People, by diminishing the Taxes upon the Necessaries of Life, and to settle Things in such a Manner, that Strangers will be obliged to contribute towards these Taxes as well as the Inhabitants of the Country. The States then proceeded to exhort their Subjects to continue to deserve their good Opinion, by their Readiness in contributing towards the Support of the State; and particularly, by paying at the appointed Terms, the Sums at which they have been lately assessed, towards the provisional Taxes, promising that those Taxes shall absolutely cease on the 1st of January 1750, notwithstanding the malicious Insinuations spread to the contrary by some evil-minded Persons, who are by this Placart declared Enemies to their Country, and threatened as such with the most rigorous Punishments.

*Hague, July 18, N. S.* M. Van Almonde, his Majesty's Commissary for the Packet-Boats, died on Monday last at the Brill.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the Fifteenth Year of his present Majesty's Reign, intitled, An Act for Vacating the Office of King's Professor of Physick in Dublin, upon the Death or Surrender of the present King's Professor, and for Erecting three Professorships of Physick in the said City instead thereof, it is, among other Things, Enacted, That upon the next Vacancy in the said Professorship, by the Death or Surrender of Doctor James Grattan, the Body Politick and Incorporate of the King's Professor of Physick in the City of Dublin, created by the Charter therein mentioned, should be dissolved, cease and be void; And that there should be thenceforth for ever, within the said City, three Professors, to be called by the Names of the King's Professor of Physick in the City of Dublin, the King's Professor of Chirurgery and Midwifery in the City of Dublin, and the King's Professor of Pharmacy and the Materia Medica in the City of Dublin; and that the Provost of Trinity College near Dublin, the Professor of Physick in the same, the President and two eldest Censors of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland, all for the Time being, should be Examinators of the Candidates who should offer themselves for the said three Professorships, AND WHEREAS the said Doctor James Grattan is since dead,

NOW we the Examinators aforesaid, having this Day met at the said Provost's House in Trinity College
