A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

Newport, C. Hen. Boyle.

WHEREAS upon Information to His Majesty, that the Plague was broke out at Sta Cruz, and other Ports and Places in West Barbary, His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council to require all Ships coming into any of the Ports of Great Britain, either from Sta Cruz, or any other Port in West Barbary, to perform a Quarantine of Forty Days.

And whereas their Excellencies the Lords Justices and Council issued their Proclamation, bearing Date the 26th Day of June 1747, ordering and directing, that all Ships and Vessels then arrived and not unladen, and all Ships and Vessels that should thereafter arrive in any Port of this Kingdom from the Port of Sta Cruz, or any other Port in West Barbary on the Atlantick Ocean, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days, in such Manner, and under such Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as were by the said Proclamation directed; which Proclamation is still in Force.

And whereas His Majesty hath lately received Information, that the Plague rages at this Time at Saffie and Salle on the said West Coast of Barbary, and that from the Correspondence which is constantly carried on between those Places and the Towns of Tangier and Tetuan, lying in or near the Streights Mouth, there is great Reason to apprehend that the Infection will soon spread throughout the two Kingdoms of Fez and Morocco: And it being of the utmost Importance to prevent the Contagion being brought into this Kingdom from any of the said Places:

We the Lords Justices and Council do think fit hereby to order and direct, that the Quarantine now subsisting upon Ships coming from any of the Ports in West Barbary upon the Atlantick Ocean, be continued, and a like Quarantine of Forty Days laid on all Ships and Vessels coming from any of the Ports in the Streights of Gibraltar on the Barbary Coast, or any other of the Ports on that Coast in the Mediterranean, lying between the said Streights and Cape de las tres Forcas in the Kingdom of Fez: And that the like Rules, Regulations and Restrictions be observed by all such Ships and Vessels as are required to be observed by our said Proclamation of the 26th Day of June 1747.

And we likewise further order and direct, That the Captains of every of His Majesty's Ships of War attending the Service of this King-

dom, who shall meet any such Ship or Vessel coming to any of the Ports of this Kingdom, shall take due Care to prevent the Landing any Goods, Seamen or Passengers from on Board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Officers of His Majesty's Revenue.

And we do hereby order and direct the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Revenue, to use their utmost Diligence and Care, that the Quarantine herein before directed be duly performed.

And we do hereby strictly charge and command the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War attending the Service of this Kingdom, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea-Coast, and all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, and other Officers and Ministers of Justice, to be aiding and assisting to the Officers of the Revenue and Customs, and to all other Persons that shall be concerned in stopping Ships coming from the Port of Sta Cruz, or any other Port in West Barbary upon the Atlantick Ocean, or coming from any of the Ports in the Streights of Gibraltar on the Barbary Coast, or any other of the Ports on that Coast in the Mediterranean, lying between the said Streights and Cape de las tres Forcas in the Kingdom of Fez, and in bringing them to the Places appointed for obliging them to perform their Quarantine as aforesaid.

G O D Save the KING.

Florence, July 4, N. S. The 24th past, being the Festival of St. John, M. de Richecourt, by Commission from the Emperor, attended by the Magistrates of this City, and a suitable Retinue, received, with the usual publick Formalities, the Homage from the respective Cities, Towns, Villages, Marquisates, Counties, Baronies, and Feudatories of Tuscany; and in that, and the following Evening, the Races of Chariots and Barbary Horses run for the usual Prizes. The 29th, being St. Peter's Festival, a second Race of Barbary Horses run for the usual Prize, which was directed by the Abbe Tornaguince, the Secretary of State, agreeable to the Declaration which M. de Richecourt made to the Members of the Regency to perform the publick Functions for the future alternately. The 28th M. Warren, Colonel of the Artillery in Tuscany, set out from this City for

for Vienna. From Parma we learn, that Don Philip was returned to that City from his Country Seat, and had appointed a Drawing-Room at Court for the Nobility every Tuesday and Friday; in the mean Time, the Ducal Palace is fitting up with the Furniture which daily arrives in that City from France and Spain.

Vienna, July 16, N. S. On Sunday last Count Kaunitz was declared Ambassador Extraordinary to the Court of France. Count Puebla is to go very soon to Berlin, and Tomorrow Count de Richcourt will set out for Lorraine in his Way to England, and is to be succeeded at Turin by General Count Colorado. M. Carvalho, the Portuguese Minister here, having received his Letters of Recall, will soon leave this Place.

Hague, July 25, N. S. The Lottery, which has been resolved on by the States General, is to consist of 7500 Tickets, and the Subscription for each Ticket is to be 1000 Florins, one Half to be paid down in ready Money, and the other Half in Ordonnances or Warrants drawn upon the Comptoir of the Generality, or in Assignations on the several Provinces, and the District of Drenthe: No Ordonnances or Assignations are to be taken in Payment, but such as have been issued for Forage, Bread, repairing of Fortifications, Artillery and Pontoon-Horses, Carriages, and other like Services performed for the Use of the State in and since the Year 1741, in the Places lying within the Territories of the States, or out of those Territories, in the Field, and in Winter-Quarters. There are to be 7500 Prizes in Obligations, the highest of 100,000 Florins, and the lowest of 1000 Florins each; the whole Amount of the Prizes being eight Millions of Florins, and consequently 500,000 Florins more than the States will receive by the Subscription. These Prizes are to be consider'd as Ordinary Obligations, and to bear Three and an half per Cent. Interest from the 1st of January 1750. They are never to be charged with any Tax or Deduction whatsoever. It is also resolved, that the whole Eight Millions shall be reimbursed in 34 Years; and for that Purpose, the several Provinces, and the District of Drenthe, are to pay every Year during that Term, to the Comptoir of the Generality, according to their respective Contingents, Five and an half per Cent. upon the Capital Sum of Seven Millions and an Half, which will amount, for all the Provinces together, to the yearly Sum of 412,500 Florins, which the Council of State is directed to insert in the State of War. M. Stein accepted last Tuesday of the Post of Pensionary of Holland. It was resolved this Day, in the Assembly of the States of Holland, that M. de Berkenroode should be proposed to the States General to be sent as their Ambassador to the French Court.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Melchior Guy Dickens, Esq; to be Envoy Extraordinary to the Empress of Russia.

among other Things, Enacted, That upon the next Vacancy in the said Professorship, by the Death or Surrender of Doctor James Grattan, the Body Politick and Incorporate of the King's Professor of Physick in the City of Dublin, created by the Charter therein mentioned, should be dissolved, cease and be void; And that there should be thenceforth for ever, within the said City, three Professors, to be called by the Names of the King's Professor of Physick in the City of Dublin, the King's Professor of Chirurgery and Midwifery in the City of Dublin, and the King's Professor of Pharmacy and the Materia Medica in the City of Dublin; and that the Provost of Trinity College near Dublin, the Professor of Physick in the same, the President and two eldest Censors of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland, all for the Time being, should be Examinators of the Candidates who should offer themselves for the said three Professorships. AND WHEREAS the said Doctor James Grattan is since dead;

NOW we the Examinators aforesaid, having this Day met at the said Provost's House in Trinity College aforesaid, do hereby, in Pursuance of the said Act, give this publick Notice, That the Examinations, in the several Parts of Physick, of the Candidates who shall offer themselves for the said three Professorships, will be held at Trinity College near the City of Dublin, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, which will be the Twenty-fifth, Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh Days of September next; the said Examinations to begin at One of the Clock in the Afternoon of each of said Days, and to continue for Two Hours each Day. And in order to encourage Candidates to offer themselves for such Professorships, NOTICE is also hereby given, That the said Professors will be intitled to the Use of the Library in the said Act mentioned, and to the clear Rents and Profits of the real Estate of the late Sir Patrick Dun, Knight, M. D. deceased, and to the Produce of the Residue of his personal Estate, to be laid out as the said Act directs; all to be equally divided among such three Professors (and now computed, at a gross Calculation, to be about Ninety Pounds a Year or upwards to every one of the said Professors respectively, and, at the Fall of a Life, will be considerably more) during such Time as they shall respectively behave well, and justly and truly discharge the several Offices and Duties respectively to such Professorships belonging; which Duties of the said Professors are as follows respectively, that is to say, The King's Professor of Physick in the said City, is to read Publick Lectures on the Theory and Practice of Physick; The King's Professor of Chirurgery and Midwifery in the said City, is to read publick Lectures in Chirurgery and Midwifery; And the King's Professor of Pharmacy and the Materia Medica in said City, is to read publick Lectures on ancient and modern Pharmacy and the Materia Medica: All which Lectures are to be in the Latin Tongue, on three several Days in each Week during Term Time, in Trinity College aforesaid, from the first Day of November until the last Day of April every Year during their respective Continuance in the said Professorships, except the first Year after their respective Elections. And the said Professors, for Neglect or Misbehaviour in their Offices, are subject to be admonished and removed by the College of Physicians, as by the said Act is directed. And any Doctor of Physick in any University, who is not a Papist, or Person professing the Popish Religion, or who, by any Law in this Kingdom, is not deemed a Papist, may be a Candidate for any of the said Professorships; and being on Examination found duly qualified, is capable to be elected to any of the said Professorships; such Candidates and Candidate giving in his Name in Writing to the Provost of Trinity College aforesaid, or, in his Absence, to the Vice-Provost thereof for the Time being, Eight Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Examinations aforesaid. And the

said Examinators are respectively obliged, before they proceed on such Examination, to take an Oath that they shall, without Favour or Affection, Hatred or Prejudice, to any Person or Candidate, impartially proceed in such their Examination as the said Act directs.
