*Gibraltar, June 19, O. S.*

**L**ieutenant-General Bland, with the Troops from England, arrived here Yesterday in the Evening, and anchored in this Bay. He sailed from St. Helens on Thursday the 8th Instant, and lost only two Men in the Passage, who were out of Order when they embarked, and those who were indisposed with Agues recovered on their Voyage. The necessary Dispositions are making for landing the said Troops, and for embarking of those which are to return to Ireland.

*Lisbon, July 12, N. S.* His Portuguese Majesty has been of late very much indisposed; but it is now given out that his Majesty is much better, and Preparations are actually making for his Journey to the Hot Baths called the Caldas, about 14 Leagues from this Place. The Rio Fleet, lately arrived, is by all Accounts the richest they have had here for many Years from those Parts. The Amount of the Cargo in Treasure and rich Goods is computed to be worth about two Millions Sterling.

*Madrid, July 14, N. S.* The Marquis de la Eufenada has been indisposed for some Days. M. de Offorio is expected here To-morrow Night; and the Count de Bene two or three Days after. Her Catholick Majesty is taking the Waters of Arnedillo, with great Appearance of Success.

*Paris, July 23, N. S.* The Marquis St. Germain, the Sardinian Ambassador, had his Audience of his most Christian Majesty, and the rest of the Royal Family, last Friday, and returned to Paris again on Sunday.

*Paris, July 26, N. S.* His Excellency the Earl of Albemarle arrived here Yesterday, and it is supposed will be on Monday or Tuesday next at Compeigne to have his Audience.

*Kensington, July 20.*

This Day his Excellency the Marquis de Mi-repoix, Knight of the King's Orders, Lieutenant General, and Ambassador Extraordinary from the most Christian King, had his first private Audience of his Majesty, and delivered his Letters of Credence: He was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Bedford, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

*At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held by Adjournment at Ormeskirk in and for the County of Lancaster, the 17th Day of July, in the Twenty-third Year of King George the Second's Reign.*

**W**Hereas Information is given, and it appeareth to this Court, That the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle hath for some Time past appeared, and now rages in the Counties of Chester and York, near adjoining to the Southern and Eastern Parts of this County, and also in the Northern Parts of this County; and Information is likewise given, and it also appeareth to this Court, That on Thursday the 13th Day of this Instant July, the same appeared and began to rage in the Town of Liverpool in this same County; by reason whereof, it is greatly feared that the said Distemper will spread itself into all or most Parts thereof, which is very large, and abounds in Horned Cattle, unless speedy Care be taken as much as possible to prevent the same: Therefore in order to prevent such Spreading of the said Distemper, and in Pursuance of the Powers and Authorities given, as well by His Majesty's Order and Orders in Council, as by the several Acts of Parliament in that Behalf made, this Court doth order and direct, That no Fair or Market, or other publick Place of Sale, shall be held or kept within this County, for the Sale of any Horned Cattle, from the 23d Day of this Instant July, until the 3d Day of October next; and that no Person or Persons shall or do presume to drive, send or remove, or cause to be driven, sent or removed, any Horned Cattle to any Fair, Market or other publick Place of Sale in this County, within the Time before-mentioned for prohibiting the holding of Fairs, Markets or other publick Places of Sale for Horned Cattle, under the Pains, Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned, set or imposed by His Majesty's said Orders in Council, or the said Acts of Parliament, or any of them in that Case made. And for the notifying this Order, it is further directed, That the same be forthwith inserted in The London Gazette, and also in The London Evening Post, The Whitehall Evening Post, and the Chester, Manchester, Kendall and Preston News Papers.
