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Genoua, April 28.

He differences between the most Christian, King and this State, being happily reconciled at the Mediation of His Majelty of Great Britain, all our fears are at the fame time vanished, and we freed of the many apprehenfions that perplexed us, before. The dispute between

our Duke and Archbishop, is not as yet determined. The Duke d'Offuna, Governor of Milan, expects now very fuddenly the arrival of his Succeffor, the Prince de Ligne.

Warfaw, May 7. On Friday last the Popes Nuncio had Audience of the Dier, where having been intro-suced and taken his place with the ufual Ceremony, he did in his discourse recommend to the Diet in the name of his Holinefs two things. First, That they would elect fuch an one to be their King, whose stedfastness to the Roman Church, could not in the leaft be doubted of : And fecondly, having done that, they would take fuc h refolutions as may beft ferve for the profecuting the War against the Turks. Afterwards the Count Schafgits, Ambaffador from the Emperor, had likewife Audience, who, in the name of his Imperial Majefty, defired the Diet to make choice of a Prince of the Roman Catholick Religion, and who would live in friendthip with the Emperor; and finally, recommended to them the Intereits of the Queen Dowzger. The reft of the Foreign Miniflers will likewife have their Audience in From the *Wkraine* we have advice, that Capcourfe. lan Baffa advances with 60000 Men, and that he is to be followed by Abasti with 30000 more, besides the Troops to be fent by the Cham of Tartary. The Molcovites have now made themfelves mafters of the greateft part of the Hkraine, having Garrifons in most places there.

Francfort, May 20. Our Letters from Basle tell us, That the Duke of Lorraine finding that Monfieur de Turesne had befet all the passages which lead into the Franshe Comte, was fer down with his Forces not far from Schafhaifen, to expect the coming down of the Imperialills; and that Monfieur de Turenne continues ftill encamped not far from Bafle. To morrow or next day, we expect here the Count de Souches, General of the Imperial Army. It is reported here, That a Party of Imperialifts have had a Rencounter with 400 French near Keyfer fluwer, and that the latter were worfted ; but this needs a confirmationn.

. Cologue, May 22, On Friday last Count Tot, Am-bassiadoi from Smeden, and Mediator for the Treaty of Peace that was held here, parted from this place for Bon, where he continued two days, having, during that time, had feveral Conferences with the Imperial Minifters fince he is proceeded on his way to Merr, intending from thence, to pass on towards the Franche Comte, to propofe, as is faid, to the most Christian King, feveral matters relating to a general Peace. The eighteenth instant. General souch's arrived at Wirtsbourgh, and from thence took his way to the Courr of the Elector

Liege, May 21. We are told, That the Imperialists under the command of the Duke of Bournonville having paffed the Roer, take their march through the County of Cornelis Munfter towards Limburgh, 6000 Cuiraf-fiers having the Van under the Conduct of Major General Sporke; their defign is to relieve Navaigne befieged by the French,

Ditto, May 22. On Friday last the French Troops under the command of Monfieur de Belfonds, befieged the Fort Navaigne; their first work was to raise a Battery right opposite to the Fort, on this fide of the Meuse, and Planted four pieces of Cannon on it, from whence they fired very hard upon the Fort, with inten-tion to deltroy the Sluyce, which keeps in the water, that comes out of the Bruwine ; the besieged, in the mean time, were not wanting to return their shot as thick as poffibly they could; fince the French have raifed another Battery of fix Guns on the fide of Vifet, as likewife a third of ten Guns, which have done confiderable execution upon the befieged ; yesterday fome perfons come out of the Camp inform us, That the French ad-vance apace with their Trenches, confidering the weather, which has been very rainy; that on the fide of Ey/den they had brought them within Musket that of the Ditches of the Fort, the Muskettiers firing very martly on both fides : And fince we have advice, that the French have taken a Redoubt, and, that the Prince of Conde, whole Army lies over againft Vifet, with defign to pass the Mcuse there, was himself last night in his Coach on the Hill called Haccourt, to fee what The Duke of Bournonville, it is faid, advances. pafied. likewife this way with an Army of 20000 Men, and ist already come to a place called Chapelle; the Avantguard who are 6000 Men advancing before under the command of Major General Sporke.
