Paris, August 4, N. S.

ON Tuesday last his Excellency the Earl of Albemarle arrived at Compeigne, and the next Morning had his Audience of his most Christian Majesty, when he presented his Credential Letter; and his Excellency was received with the most distinguishing Marks of Civility. From thence his Excellency was conducted to the Audience of the most Christian Queen, to whom he likewise presented his Credential Letter. He was then conducted to the Infanta, and afterwards to the Mesdames.

Paris, August 5, N. S. This Day the Foreign Ministers are expected from Compeigne; the Queen leaves that Place on Friday to go to Versailles; his most Christian Majesty goes to La Muette the Monday following; and the Marquis de Puyzieulx comes to this Place on Tuesday.

Hague, August 8, N. S. The last Ordinance published here by the States of Holland of the 29th of July, relating to the provisional Tax, has had the desired Effect, and greatly quieted the Minds of the People; and it is assured that the Levies go on without Difficulty, and will raise a very large Sum of Money.

Whitehall, August 1.
