Constantinople, July 24.

SOME Advices from Babylon bring an Account, that Solyman, formerly Cheaia of that Town, and since made Pascha of Bassora, was marched and arrived at the Head of thirty Thousand Men before Babylon, and demanded Entrance into that City; that Haggy Mehemet, the actual Pascha, had sent out his Cheaia to know the Reason of his Arrival with such a Force; but instead of returning an Answer, he had detained and imprisoned him. There are also some Commotions of Rebellion towards Synope, on the Black Sea, but some Forces are sent from hence to assist in quelling it.

Florence, August 22, N. S. By the last Letters from Corfica, the Troubles are not likely to be adjusted so soon as People imagined. M. de Cursay, who commands the French Troops there, has lately made a Tour about the Island, and returned to the Bastia, where M. Passagno, the Commissary General for the Republick of Genoa, soon after arrived; the latter retired directly into the Fortrefs, without having had any Intercourse with M. de Cursay, who commands the whole Island except that Fortrefs. From Parma we are informed, that Count Zambeccari was arrived there with a Commission from the Queen Dowager of Spain, to demand the Jewels and Effects which the Dutchess Dowager Dorothy had bequeathed to her, and for that Purpose had been deposited in the Hands of the Countess della Somaglia, who delivered them to Count Zambeccari. All the Gentlemen of that Princess's Court have been dismissed; but the Duke of Parma has taken into his Service the Pages and Livery Servants since the 14th Instant. On the 8th the Duke of Modena, with his Family, arrived at Sassolo, one of his Country Houses, from Venice; the next Day he caused some Families, with whom his Highness had Reason to be dissatisfied, to be banished; and has appointed M. Sabbattini his First Minister.

Madrid, Aug. 25, N. S. The two Spanish Men of War, called the America and Constante, with the four Xabeques, and the four Bomb Ketches, that lately sailed from Cadiz, arrived at Cartagena the 11th Instant.

Brussels, September 5, N. S. Prince Charles of Lorraine set out this Morning for Enghein, to pay a Visit to the Duke d'Arenberg.

Hague, September 8, N. S. The Baron de Hertenberg, Minister from the Prince of Swart-

zenberg, set out from hence the 3d Instant on his Return home; and the Tripolitan Ambassador set out the Day after for Amsterdam, where a Man of War lies ready to carry him to Tripoli. We learn from Cologne, that M. Bentinck arrived there the 4th Instant, and the next Day continued his Journey for Vienna.

Kensington, August 29.

This Day the Count de Richcourt, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Emperor, and likewise from the Empress Queen of Hungary, had his first private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his Letters of Credence from their Imperial Majesties: To which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt, Master of the Ceremonies.
