The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, That the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the Fourteenth of this Instant September, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Sixteenth Day of November next.

Florence, Aug. 29, N. S. Cardinal Simonetti, Bishop of Viterbo, died within these few Days, which makes a fifth Vacancy in the College of Cardinals.

Genoa, Sept. 1, N. S. This Morning a Paper was found fixed upon all the Corners of the Streets, containing a Notification to People of all Ranks, That whereas the Government did not think of re-establishing the Commerce, nor the Credit of the Bank of St. George, it was high Time to call them to an Account, for which they were desired to be ready to appear with their Arms at the Beat of a Drum; these Papers were immediately taken down, and strict Enquiry is making after the Author of them.

Hague, Sept. 12, N. S. The States of Holland, who were to have met on Tuesday next, the 16th Instant, are adjourned for a Fortnight. The Prince of Orange is expected to set out very soon for Soesdyck, from whence his Highness will go to Loo.

Paris, Sept. 13, N. S. His most Christian Majesty went from Versailles to Cressy last Wednesday; he proceeds from thence in a few Days to Havre de Grace, and will be back at Versailles the 22d Instant; M. d'Argenson, M. Rouille, M. St. Florentin, and M. Machault, attend him in this Progress.

Kensington, September 4.

This Day the Count de Richecourt, Plenipotentiary Minister from the Emperor and Em-

press Queen of Hungary, had his first private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke.

Kensington, September 7.

This Day the Count de Richecourt had his first private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia: He was introduced to both these Audiences by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
