Madrid, May 23.

N Monday last, their Majenies returned hither from Aran fuez, extreamly fatisfied with the divertilements of that place. From Cadiz we have advice, that Captain Rooth, with the other Frigars that had been in Port there, were failed Eastward. From Tangier we have Letters which fay, That they were there in daily expectation to receive the Ratification of the Articles concluded with the Emperor Muli Ifmael; who hath been lately forced to go into the Field with all the force he could gettogether, for that another appears at the head of a great Army, who claims the Crown, and to whom feveral Provinces have already fubmitted themfelves.

Duntzick, May 23. Yesterday arrived an Extraordinary Courier from Warfam, who brought us this accoilift, That there had for feveral days been a long and sharp contest in the Diet, between the Poles, and the Nobility of Lithuania, the former propoling the General Sobietki, as a perfon eminently deferving of the Republick by the continued fervices he had rendred it, and particularly for the victory obtained the last Sum-mer over the Turks at Cobhim ; which next to the DE-vine Assistance, they folely attribute to his great courage and conduct; and that at present being engaged in a War, with to powerful an Enemy, they thought they could not make choice of any one, whole skill and ex-perience in Military Matters, and his other great abilities could render him more meriting the Crown, then the faid General Sobietski ; adding, Thata Foreign choice, would engage them in Foreign Interells, which would perhaps be more regarded then the welfare of the Crown ; the Lithuaners on the other fide oppofed the general refolution of the Nobility of that Durchy, not to admit of a Piasti (that is a Native either of Poland or Lithuania) for that they had found the ill confequences of it, during the late Kings Reign ; that therefore they ought to chufe a Foreigner, and fuch a Prince, who, belides his own endowments, which ought to rendet him deferving of the Crown, could be a fit Husband for the Queen Dowager, and who was affifted by fome powerful Neighbor, the better to enable the Republick to carry on the prefent War against the Turks; and laftly, that they knew none fitter to be their King, then the Prince of Lorraine. Some there were, who nominated the Duke of Newburgh, but after long contells General Sobietskies party prevailed, and by plurality of voices he was elected King, though not altogether to the fatisfaction of the Lithuaners : But our next Letters will inform us farther.

Ditto, May 26. Yeflerday by an Express from Warfaw, our Senare received the confirmation, That on the one and twentieth inflant, Fohannes Sobietski; late General of the Crown, had been elected King by the unanimous votes of all the Nobility affembled in the Diet, and with the great applause of all people in that Kingdom; and that accordingly the Bilhop of Cracon, in the absence of the Archbishop of Gnesna, had with the ufual folemnity declared him King. However, fome Letters add, That the Nobility of Lithuania were nor altogether fatisfied. Our Letters from Mosco tell us, That the Swedish Ambaffadors there, had proposed a perpetual Peace and Alliance, between the Czar and their King, which it was thought would be readily acpred by the Mosco view. Some, Letters likewise speak of Propositions that have been made for a marriage between the young King, and the Czars Daughter. We have this morning advice, That the Archbishop of Gness deing dead or dying, the new King had advanced the Bishop of 'Cu'm, Vice-Chancellor of the Crown, to that See.

Strasburgh, May 28. From Bafle our Letters of the 26 inftant tell us, That the day before the Duke of Lorraine parted with the reft of his Troops from his Quarters near Rhinfelden, the Vanguard having feveral days before begun to march; they take their way towards the Palatinate, to joyn with the Imperial Troops, that are now there. The 26 Monfieur de Turanne decamped from Bafle, and marched towards Saverne, where he will form an Army, expecting, to that end, feveral Troops to be fent him by his Majefly out of Burgendy.

Cologne, June 1. The last night the Guint de Soucher, General of the Imperial Army, dance of Munster Eysfelt, from Bon; where, it is faid, the I continue till the Imperial Army artives, which is write march from Limburgh thicher. It is faid, that the perial perial Troops in the Palatinate, are marched to beliege Philipsburgh.

Higue, June I. The Prince of Naflim, Stadtholdér of Friefland, is gone hence to the Prince of Oranges Camp, which is as yet at Duffel, near Malines. It was thought his Highnefs would have marched ere this, but it feems he flays till the Court de Montery is likewifé ready to take the Field. The States General have lately publiked a Placaet, by which they prohibite all their Subjects on pain of death, to furnith any Provifions or other Neceffaries to the Garrifon or Inhabitants of Grave. Monfieur Rabenhaup is arrived here, and in a day or two goes for Nimmegen to command there. We have advice from Liege, that the Imperial Army is marched towards the Electorate of Treves, that fo they may draw the French that way, and free Flanders.

Parie, June 2. The City of Dole in Burgundy makes greater refiltance then was expected; cur laft Letters from the Kings Camp told us, That the befieged had very floutly defended themfelves, but that our Troops were advanced to far, that they expected every minute the befieged would fend out to define a Parley. The King has fent Monfieur de Levieny, 'Son to the Duke de Gramont, to Baronne, to take care of the fecurity of that place, if the Dutch or Spaniards flould attempt any thing upon it. Out Letters from Rehfillow tell us of a Renconner between the Sieur le Biret, and the Duke de St German, who commands the Spanifh Forces in Citatonia; in which, the latter is faid to have had fome advantage, though, we doubt nor, but the Duke of Scomberg, who is appointed by his Majefly

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to be General of his Forces in *Roufillon*, when arrived efficie, and joyned the Troops he carries with him, with choice already there under the conduct of the Sieur *le Brct*, will be able to repair this loss.

Bruffels, June 3. The Duke of Holftein having been abroad wich his Regiment, returned hither on Sunday laft, brin ing with him about thirty French pri-Ioners, and 120 Horfes, belonging to Carriages and Baggage, which were taken about 3 leagues from Char-leroy. The fame night another party of fifty Horfe, wentout from hence, but they had the ill foriune to be merby 500 French, by whom they were all killed or taken prisoners : At the fame time the French pillaged and burnt the Village of Borele, three leagues from heade. On Sunday arrived here, an Express from Burgundy with Letters from the Governor of that Province; to his Excellency, the news they brought is kept private, which makes us fear it is not very good. The Prince of Vaudemene expects daily a Committion from Spain, to be General of the Strangers in the Service of these Countreys, and to command all our Cavalry as Lieutenant General under the Duke de Villa He moja, who, it is faid, will not go into the Field. The Imperial Army is, we hear, marching back from Limburgh towards Treves, to befiege that place, and the Imperial Tro ps in the Palatinate, joyned with those of the E-"lector Palatine have besieged Philipsbourgh. His Excellenco, as we are told, has sent a confiderable sum of Money into Germany, for the finishing the levies that are making there for the fervice of these Provinces. The three Regiments that were raifed in the Emperors Hereditary Countreys by the Spanish Ambassador, are suddenly expected there. Last night his Excellency accom-panied with Monsieur de Lavigny went bence to confer wigh the Prince of Orange in his Camp at Duffel, and about two a clock this morning returned hither again. This cay feveral of our Train Horfes are gone to Ma-Ther, to fetch fome great pieces of Cannon, remainin the Arfenal there, which makes it thought, that out A1 mies will now in few days begin to march. The Prince of Conde continues, in the mean time, encamped with his Army near Charleroy. This day it is reported, That his Excellency has received Letters, giv \g an account, that il e Duke de St. German who commands the Spanish Forces in Catalonia, has obtained a considerable advantage over the French ; of which, we expect a confirmation.

Rye, May 26. Yeflerday Lieutenant Admiral Van Trump, who had been out at Sea with his Squadron, which by effimation confifted of 35 Sail, came into our Bay, and joyned with the reft of the Fleet who was cruifing there: This morning the whole Fleet failed to the Weflward, the Wind at Eaft.

Fort mouth, May 28. This Evening we receive advice, that the Dutch Fleet is at Ankor behind the Isle of Wight.

Whitehal, May 29. His Majefly having been pleafed to appoint, that during His Refidence at Windfor, His Privy Council should meet every Wednesday at Hamp' ton Court, and on Wednesday hast, they being accordingly met there, His Majefly was graciotsly pleafed to make the Right Honorable Robert, Earl of Sunderland, of his faid Privy Council, who after baving taken the usual Oaths, took his place at the Board accordingly.

Windlor, May 30. On Thursday, being the Eve of the Celebration of S. Georges Fealt, appointed 10 be kept this year the 29 instant, the day of His Majestics Birth, and ever happy Restauration. His Majesty, as Soveraign of the most Noble Order of the Garter, recompanied with his Royal Highnes, his Highnes

Prince Rupert, the Duke of Ormond, the Forl of Cxford, the Duke of Monmonth, the Duke of Albemaric, the Duke of Landerdail, the Marquefa of Woreefter, the Earl of S. Albans, the Earl of Bedford, the Earl of Artirgion, the Earl of Offory, and the Earl of Southampton, Knights Companions of the Order, all of them in their habits. proceeded about tEree in the Afternoon, from the Preferce Chamber to the Chapter-Houfe, preceded by the Poor Knights, the Prebends and . the Officers of Arms, and from thence to the Chappel, where before Divine Service begun, the Earl of Mulgrave (who at a Chapter held at Mhitehal the 23 of the laft Moneth was elected into that moft Noble Order) being introduced between the Earls of Arlington and Offory ; after having taken the ufual Oath, was invefted and placed in his Stall. Divine Service ended, the Soveraign and Companions returned in the fame creer to the Preferce Chamber, where they repofed themfelves till Supper, which was prepared in a moft noble manner in S. Georges Hall. The next day, the Soveraign and Companions in the fame manner as the day before, proceeded to the Chappel ; the ficond Liffin being read, they defeend from their Stalls, and go in Procession ; which done with the ufual folemnity, they returned to the Chappel, where having offered, and Divine Service ended, they returned to the Prefence, and from thence went to S. Georges Hall to dinner, which was very fplendid and magnificent in all the circumftances of it. In the Evening, the Soveraign and Companions p roceed again to the Chappel, in the fame order as the Eve betore-This Morning the Soveraign and Companions proceeded again to the Chappel, where the Soveraign having taken his Stall, before the Companions afcended to theirs, the Atchievements of Count Marcin, Knight of the Order, deceased were offered, viq. The Banner by his Royal Highness and Prince Ripert, the Sword by the Duke of Ormond and the Earl of Oa ford, and the Helm and Creft by the Dike of Mormauth and the Duke of Allemarle, then the Soveraign and Companiens having offered as the day before, returned to the Chapter-Houfe, put off their Mantles, which is the peculiar habit of that day, and fo this great folemnity ended.
