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From Thursday May 28. to Bunday June 1. 1674.

Madrid, May 23.

N Monday last, their Majenies returned hither from Aran fuez, extreamly fatisfied with the divertilements of that place. From Cadiz we have advice, that Captain Rooth, with the other Frigars that had been in Port there, were failed Eastward. From Tangier we have Letters which fay, That they were there in daily expectation to receive the Ratification of the Articles concluded with the Emperor Muli Ifmael; who hath been lately forced to go into the Field with all the force he could gettogether, for that another appears at the head of a great Army, who claims the Crown, and to whom feveral Provinces have already fubmitted themfelves.

Duntzick, May 23. Yesterday arrived an Extraordinary Courier from Warfam, who brought us this accoilift, That there had for feveral days been a long and sharp contest in the Diet, between the Poles, and the Nobility of Lithuania, the former propoling the General Sobietki, as a perfon eminently deferving of the Republick by the continued fervices he had rendred it, and particularly for the victory obtained the last Sum-mer over the Turks at Cobhim ; which next to the DE-vine Assistance, they folely attribute to his great courage and conduct; and that at present being engaged in a War, with to powerful an Enemy, they thought they could not make choice of any one, whole skill and ex-perience in Military Matters, and his other great abilities could render him more meriting the Crown, then the faid General Sobietski ; adding, Thata Foreign choice, would engage them in Foreign Interells, which would perhaps be more regarded then the welfare of the Crown ; the Lithuaners on the other fide oppofed the general refolution of the Nobility of that Durchy, not to admit of a Piasti (that is a Native either of Poland or Lithuania) for that they had found the ill confequences of it, during the late Kings Reign ; that therefore they ought to chufe a Foreigner, and fuch a Prince, who, belides his own endowments, which ought to rendet him deferving of the Crown, could be a fit Husband for the Queen Dowager, and who was affifted by fome powerful Neighbor, the better to enable the Republick to carry on the prefent War against the Turks; and laftly, that they knew none fitter to be their King, then the Prince of Lorraine. Some there were, who nominated the Duke of Newburgh, but after long contells General Sobietskies party prevailed, and by plurality of voices he was elected King, though not altogether to the fatisfaction of the Lithuaners : But our next Letters will inform us farther.

Ditto, May 26. Yeflerday by an Express from Warfaw, our Senare received the confirmation, That on the one and twentieth inflant, Fohannes Sobietski; late General of the Crown, had been elected King by the unanimous votes of all the Nobility affembled in the Diet, and with the great applause of all people in that Kingdom; and that accordingly the Bilhop of Cracon, in the absence of the Archbishop of Gnesna, had with the ufual folemnity declared him King. However, fome Letters add, That the Nobility of Lithuania were nor altogether fatisfied. Our Letters from Mosco tell us, That the Swedish Ambaffadors there, had proposed a perpetual Peace and Alliance, between the Czar and their King, which it was thought would be readily acpred by the Mosco view. Some, Letters likewise speak of Propositions that have been made for a marriage between the young King, and the Czars Daughter. We have this morning advice, That the Archbishop of Gness deing dead or dying, the new King had advanced the Bishop of 'Cu'm, Vice-Chancellor of the Crown, to that See.

Strasburgh, May 28. From Bafle our Letters of the 26 inftant tell us, That the day before the Duke of Lorraine parted with the reft of his Troops from his Quarters near Rhinfelden, the Vanguard having feveral days before begun to march; they take their way towards the Palatinate, to joyn with the Imperial Troops, that are now there. The 26 Monfieur de Turanne decamped from Bafle, and marched towards Saverne, where he will form an Army, expecting, to that end, feveral Troops to be fent him by his Majefly out of Burgendy.

Cologne, June 1. The last night the Guint de Soucher, General of the Imperial Army, dance of Munster Eysfelt, from Bon; where, it is faid, the I continue till the Imperial Army artives, which is outs march from Limburgh thicher. It is faid, that the perial perial Troops in the Palatinate, are marched to beliege Philipsburgh.

Higue, June I. The Prince of Naflim, Stadtholdér of Friefland, is gone hence to the Prince of Oranges Camp, which is as yet at Duffel, near Malines. It was thought his Highnefs would have marched ere this, but it feems he flays till the Court de Montery is likewifé ready to take the Field. The States General have lately publiked a Placaet, by which they prohibite all their Subjects on pain of death, to furnith any Provifions or other Neceffaries to the Garrifon or Inhabitants of Grave. Monfieur Rabenhaup is arrived here, and in a day or two goes for Nimmegen to command there. We have advice from Liege, that the Imperial Army is marched towards the Electorate of Treves, that fo they may draw the French that way, and free Flanders.

Parie, June 2. The City of Dole in Burgundy makes greater refiltance then was expected; cur laft Letters from the Kings Camp told us, That the befieged had very floutly defended themfelves, but that our Troops were advanced to far, that they expected every minute the befieged would fend out to define a Parley. The King has fent Monfieur de Levieny, 'Son to the Duke de Gramont, to Bayonne, to take care of the fecurity of that place, if the Dutch or Spaniards flould attempt any thing upon it. Out Letters from Rehfillow tell us of a Renconner between the Sieur le Biret, and the Duke de St German, who commands the Spanifh Forces in Citatonia; in which, the latter is faid to have had fome advantage, though, we doubt nor, but the Duke of Scomberg, who is appointed by his Majefly

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
