Naples, December 30, N. S.

THREE new Gold Pieces have been lately coined at the Mint, viz. an On-
cia of the Value of six Ducats, a
Pistole of four, and a Zecken of
two; which Species, amounting in the whole to
400,000 Ducats, the King has caused to be di-
stributed amongst the publick Banks in this City,
for the Conveniency of Commerce, and for the
better promoting their Circulation in his Domi-
nions. The new Ship of War La Reine, pro-
ving in the late Cruize against the Barbary Pi-
rates, unfit for Navigation, his Majesty, by
Advice of the Committee of the Marine, has
ordered her to be disposed of. The King, at
the Request of the Pope, has ordered a Detach-
ment of his Troops to that Part of his Domi-
nions which borders on the Ecclesiastical State,
for the Security of Passengers on the Occasion of
the Holy Year. On the 23d Instant anchored
in this Port, from the Adriatick, a Convoy of
40 Transport Vessels, laden with Oil, Corn,
and other Provisions for the Consumption of
this City. The same Day M. Clemente, the
late King's Minister to the Pope, arrived here
from Rome, to take his Leave of their Majes-
ties, being on his Departure for Spain, to take
Charge of the Post lately conferred upon him by
his Catholick Majesty in the Council of Castille.

Rome, Jan. 3, N. S. The Pope, to en-
courage and re-establish in this City the Arts
of Sculpture, Architecture, and Painting, has
ordered an Academy to be held regularly at the
Campidoglio, for the Improvement of the Stu-
dents, and to provide for them according to
their Abilities. Cardinal Landi is to succeed M.
Clemente as Minister from the Court of Naples
to the Pope; to which End the King has in-
terposed with the Pope, to permit the Cardinal
to renounce the Archbishoprick of Benevento.

Florence, Jan. 9, N. S. A few Days ago
an Edict was published by the Regency, order-
ing, under the Penalties therein prescribed, that
for the future the Year shall commence on the
First Day of January, and abolishing the for-
mer Custom of beginning it on the Twenty-
fifth of March.

Paris, Jan. 28, N. S. It is said that the
Remainder of La Morliere's Regiment, and the
Swiss Regiment that is at Rochefort, are to be
sent to some of the French Settlements, and
the *Etat Major* of both of them to remain in
France, and be fix'd in some of the Sea Ports.
Some Sea Officers are named for Promotion,
but are not to take their Rank till the General
Promotion is made.

d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathed-
ral Church of Litchfield, empowering them to
elect a Bishop of the See of Litchfield and Co-
ventry, now void by the Death of Doctor
Richard Smallbroke, late Bishop thereof: And
also a Letter for his Majesty's Royal Signature,

Frederick Cornwallis, Doctor in Divinity, one

To the PUBLICK.

London, Jan. 1, 1750.

WHOEVER considers the Task of selecting from History a Series of Subjects proper for such a Design as the present, will easily perceive that many Difficulties must attend it. There are some important Events and remarkable Periods of History, which will not afford any Subject for the Painter: As on the other Hand, some Actions and Occurrences, that would make very agreeable Pictures, are not of Importance enough in the History to merit a Place in such a Series of Prints. Some Subjects must likewise be avoided, because of their Similitude in Painting to others. All Battles, for Instance, are very much alike, except such as afford some striking Object for a principal Figure; as *Harold* in the Battle of *Hastings*, pierced through the Head with an Arrow, and falling from his Horse. The frequent Beheadings also of great and eminent Men which occur in our History, can very few of them be taken, for the same Reason. However, in so large a Tract of Time, there is no Doubt but that the History of *England* will afford to the Painter a sufficient Number of Subjects, various in their Nature, striking in their Circumstances, and important to the History. Those which are here laid before the Publick have been selected from our Historians with some Care, in regard to all these Points; yet they are not so fixed upon, but that the Proprietors will be very much obliged to such Gentlemen of Taste and Knowledge as will give themselves the Trouble of considering this Design, and favour them with their Objections and Remarks, or propose the changing any particular Subject for a better.
