Constantinople, December 14. H E Conful of Aleppo has received a Packet from Governor Wake at Bombay, with Letters from Admiral Boscawen, dated the 20th of April 1749, with the most melancholy Account of the Loss of his Britannick Majesty's Ships the Namur, Pembroke, and Apollo Hospital Ship, with almost all their Men, in a violent Storm, which begun on the 13th of the faid Month in St. David's Road; the Admiral providentially Was on Shore.

The following is an Account of the Damage done by that Storm.

A LIST of Ships and Veffels loft and damaged in the Storm on the *Cormandel* Coaft, the 44th of April 1749. At Sadrass Negapatnam, Portonuovo and Puliacatt.

Two Moors and one Armenian Ship loft. Four Dutch Ships loft.

A Dutch Ship, of 50 Guns, difmasted at Sea, and put in after the Storm was over.

One Sloop and feveral Grain Vessels lost.

At Madrass.

Two French Ships and feveral Grain Veffels loft.

Ships disabled, and put into Fort St. David since the Storm.

Tartar Man of War, her Top Masts and Heads of her Lower Masts gone.

Deal Caftle Man of War, Main and Mizen Maft gone. Swallow Man of War, all her Mafts gone. Rhoda Company's Ship, all her Top Mafts gone. Danbury, a Country Ship, all her Mafts gone,

At Colderoon near the Road of Fort St. David. His Majesty's Ship Namur of 74 Guns, soundered in nine Fathom Water. She went out of Fort St. David Road, after having taken in much Water the 13th, at 7 P. M. Captain Marshal was faved, her third Lieutenant Mr. Gilchrist, Captain of Marines, Surgeon, Purfer, Chaplain, Boatswain, and about 40 other People; and 70 Sick ashore in the Hospital: The First, Secon and Fourth Lieutenants, Masser, Gunner, and two Lieutenants of Marines, in all 520, were drowned.

His Majesty's Ship Pembroke, of 60 Guns, ftruck on Colderoon Point, and over-set, having parted her Cable the 13th; at 6 P. M. she made sail out of Fort St. David Road, but could not clear the Point; twelve Men only were faved; Captain Fincher, and about 330 Men were drowned, and all the Officers except a Captain of Marines.

A large Ship drove on Shore near the Point, fuppofed to be the Apollo Hospital Ship of 40 Guns; she had on board 350 Men, and was seen near the Point without Masts between Cudalore and Fort St. David.

Fanny, a Country Ship, Capt. Rennie, run on Shore. A Portuguese Ship from Macao run on Shore, only one third unladen. Twenty four Brigantines, Sloops and Grain Vessels, run on Shore. In Pondicherry Road. One French Ship of 64 Guns run on Shore, three Men loft. Two other Ships and one Brigantine run on Shore. The Edgebaston, a Company's Ship, now at Anchor near Pondicherry without any Masts; but cannot tell what farther Damage the has fustained; from the Governor of which Place, M. Dupleix, the received great Affiltance in her Distres. (Price Two-Pence.)

Moscow, Jan. 1. The Great Chancellor, Count Bestuchess, having settled divers Affairs relating to this Capital, set out on the 25th past for Petersbourg. The Count de Woronzow, Vice-Chancellor, and several other Lords of the Court, took Yesterday the same Route; but the Foreign Ministers will not set out till next Week.

Lisbon, Jan. 4. A Spanish Register Ship, named the Salomon, bound from Vera Cruz to Cadiz, is put into this Port; she has 700,000 Piastres on board registered, besides a valuable Cargo; but as she has greatly suffered by Storms, and lost many Hands in the Voyage, 'tis imagined she will not be able to put to Sea again for some Time.

Petersbourg, Jan. 12. The Great Chancellor, Count Bestucheff, is arrived here from Moscow. They write from Revel, that M. de Sparreuter, heretofore Lieutenant General of the Artillery, died lately in that City, in the 86th Year of his Age.

Warfaw, Jan. 17. The Count de Malachowski, Great Chancellor of the Crown, is arrived here from Drefden, by whom we learn, that the King is expected here fome Time in April next, for whose Reception they are already at Work in fitting up the Royal Palace in this City. The Count de Tursky, Vice Marshal of the last Diet, died here last Week. According to our last Advices from the Ukraine, the contagious Diftemper was greatly abated in that Province, but continued to rage in Podolia and its Neighbourhood. Stockholm, Jan. 20. The King continues to enjoy a pretty good State of Health, and has lately affifted at divers Conferences which have 1-1 been held upon the prefent State of Affairs. By Letters from Finland we learn, that every Thing remains quiet upon the Frontiers of that k-2 Country, and that the Troops were in a good Condition, and the Magazines well furnished.

Vienna, Jan. 21. The Count de Kaunitz, King's Remembran-Ambassador from this Court to that of France, has put off his Departure for some Time. M. de Villavechia, heretofore Minister from the Republick of Genoa to the States General, is arrived here from the Hague; and the Baron de Backhoff, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, is soon expected. Some Days ago arrived here a large Detachment of Militia from Croatia, in order to learn the new Exercise which has been introduced amongst the Troops of her Imperial Majesty.

Dresden, Jan. 25. General d'Arnim set out this Morning for Petersbourg, where he is to refide in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from this Court. His Majesty has conferred on young Count Keyferling the Office of Councillor of the Supreme Tribunal of Appeals. The Prince of Furstembourg arrived here on Tuesday last from Vienna.

Cologn, Jan. 27. The Recruits for the Imperial Regiments continue to be raifed here with great Success. Last Week another Detachment of 250 of them was fent away for Luxem-We bourg, efcorted by fome regular Troops. learn from Duffeldorp, that a few Days ago died there the Count de Nesselraed Irresheim, President of the Tribunal of Justice of Juliers and Burghues. Paris, Jan. 29. On Thursday last the King, accompanied by the Dauphine, came from the Caftle of Muette to Verfailies; and on Sunday his Majesty figned the Contracts of Marriage between the Marquess de Culant and Mademoiselle Durand d'Auxy; and M. Calender, Nephew to Count d'Argenson, and Mademoiselle de Gravelle. By Letters from Brest we learn, that fome Days before, a Ship from St. Domingo, named the Pere Eternal, laden chiefly with Sugar, was loft off that Port. Hogue, Feb. 3. We hear her Royal Highnefs the Princefs of Orange has appointed Mademoiselle Wilhelmine vander Does de Nortwick, to be one of her Ladies of Honour, in the Room of Mademoiselle de Nassau Berghe, lately married to Count Degenfeld. On the 1st Inftant the Court went into Mourning for a Month, on Occasion of the Death of the Princes Dowager of Nassau Siegen. The States of Holland and Weit-Friefland continue their Affembly, at which his Screne Highness the Prince of Orange often affists in Person.
