N Thursday last arrived here the Marquis Duraggo, who hath resided in the Court of France, in quality of Envoye Extraordinary from this State. Some days since likewise arrived here the Galley, which was taken by the French the year past, and ever since

kept by them at Marfieles.

Vonice, June 5. The first instant a Vessel arrived here from the Levant, whither the was fent from Malsha, to carry Provisions to the Galleys of that Order, which are cruifing there, the Mafter and Seamen of the faid Vossel report, That there are above 30 Christian Cortains at present cruising in the Archipelago, and that they have joyned together, with an intent to fight the Turkish Fleet, if it comes to Sea. The Letters from Constantinople say, that the Grand Signior was marched with a great Army towards the Danube; That in the mean time the contagious diftemper which yet continues among his Soldiers, does very greatly hinder the prolecution of his designes against the Poles. Signior Michieli is according to our advices from VIenna arrived there, having the quality of Ambassador from this State, and Signior Morofini his predecessor there, goes to reside with the same Character at Conftantinopie.

Madrid, June 6. We have advice here by the way of Esdiz, that the Duke of Veraguas, Viceroy of Mexico is ceast; and at the fame time we are told, that our Fleet which comes this year home from the West Indies, may arrive within a month at Cadiz. The 2 instant 200 Horse, that had been in Garrison at Toledo, passed through this place on their march towards Catalonia, and we expect here in sew days a like number of Horse stom Anda usia, where they have had their quarters, who are likewise to march towards Catalo-

nia.

Francfort, June 17. The 15 instant arrived here an Express from the Elector Palatine to the Duke of Bournonville, to give his Excellency an account, that Monsieur de Turenne approached towards Heydelberg, and that he had had a Rencounter with some Saxon and Françonian Troops, in which many Men had been killed, upon which news, the Dake, who otherwife intended his Troops should have continued some days in our neighborhood for their refreshment, caused them to march yesterday morning early; they were, 3000 Cuirassiers, and 400 Foot, having with them fix pieces of Cannon. They took their way directly towards Bergstrasse, and march with that diligence, that to morrow we suppose they will teach Manheim: The Duke of Bournonville defired to have taken with him the Troops which this City is obliged to fend to the Army of the Empire, but though they were ready, yet our senate was willing to expect first the resolution of the Circle of the upper Rhyne, which will be affembled at Fridberg to morrow.

Coblems, June 18. Our Letters from strasbourgh of the 15, and from Heydelberg of the 16 instant tell us; That the 9; the Consederate Troops, under the

Command of the old Duke of Lerrain and the Count of Capraea, decamped from their Quarters at Oberkirchen near Strasbourg, and marched towards the Palatinate; the 1.1 they lodged at Rastast, and the next day encamped near Dourlack; That in the mean time Monsieur de Turenne having notice of their march, immediately lest his Quarters in Alfatia, and took his way towards Philipsbourg, where he passed the Rhyne the 14, with 6000 Horie, and so continued his march towards Heydelberg; The same day about three in the atternoon, his Vanguards furprized and burnt a Village called Bruchausen, two Leagues from Heydelberg, but, while yet there, were unawares attacked by a party of the Troops of the Circle of Francenia, who forced them to retire, as likewife another party, which came in during the dispute, but Monsieur de Turenne arriving at last in person with the rest of his Forces, relieved his Men, and made the Franconians, retreat to a Village called Lamen, a League from Heydelberg, where a party of Saxons with four Field pieces came to their affifiance, upon whose arrival, the compat was renewed, and continued till late in the night, when the Germans retreated together to Heydelberg; the next morning early the French followed them, and came so near to Heydelberg; that feveral Cannon were fired at them from the Walls of the Town; In this action, according to the general computation, were killed on both sides 800 Men upon the place. Monsienr de Turenne lies at present within a League and a half from Heydethers, and his defigne is taid to be to hinder, if posfible, the conjunction of the Troops Commanded by the Duke of Lorrain and the Count de Caprara, with those of the Elector Palatine, and the Duke of Bournonville, who parted the 16 inflant with 15 Troops of Cuirassiers, 400 Foot, and 6 pieces of Cannon from Francfort, and this day is expected to arrive at Manheim. Monsieur de Turenne's Army consists, as is said, at present in 12000 Men, and will be daily reinforced with fuch Troops as he expects from Burgundy, Alfatia, and Larrain.

Cologne, June 19. Yesterday 600 Foot of Count Lesse's Regiment, passed the Rhync here, and marched towards the Imperial Army. On Saturday last the Imperialists quitted the Casse of Breuis, which makes us believe our Elector will goe and reside there. On Monday last the Munster Troops, being 5000 Men joyned the Imperial Army, which marches towards the Muster.

Air là Chapelle, June 20. The last night the Imperial Army encamped between Gulpen, Wylre, and old Fauquemont, and this day they will have their Quarters at Dallem, and so continue their march towards Namur, where they will pass the Meuse. The 18 instant General Southes and Prince Charles of Lorrdin, arrived here, and having been very nobly Treated by our Magistrates, returned again to their Campi

Ghent, June 22. What was faid concerning the decamping of the Prince of Conde from his Quarters near Mond, proves a missake, occasioned by the Princes sending our 6000 Horse and 3000 Foot, with Orders to

Mons, and to continue there for the fecurity of two great . Convoys which are coming to the Princes Camp from Domay and Line. The Prince in the mean time keeps his Quartersal Haure near Mons, where hit is faid, Provisions begin to be somewhat scarce. The Imperial Army is come into the Countrey of Liege, and according to our last advices, was encamped not far from that City, whither our Governor-Generalthe Count de Monterey has fent Commissioners to make all ne-cessary Provision for thesis The 466 Maggens, ages cording to his Excellencies Command, are now brought in by the Countrey people which are to follow our Atthy ; The Trueps which were quartered in Gelder land, conformable to his Excellencies Orders, are on their march hither ; to that we cannot think but our Armies will now marchivery suddainly. Yesterday his Excellency, accompanied with the Prince of Vaudewent to vilit the Prince of Orange in his Camp, from whence it is faild, they will both go to morrow towards Louvain, the General Southes being to meet them at a small place thereabouts; and in the interim 2000 Horse of the Princes Troops, and as many of ours Highhels and Excellency. Major Masiette going out yesterday morning early with 40 Horse to discover the Buemy, met with a like number of the French, whom he defeated, and wook 15 prisoners; but Monsieur Monedabeing near with 600 Horfe, and hearing of the Rencounter, made hafte to overtake our Men, who, however retired in time, but were pursued till within halfe a . League of this place.

Bayanne, June 10. Paris, June 23. Our Letters from Stratbourg give us an account, that Monsieur de Turenne having received information, that the Duke of Lorrain and the Count of Caprara were decamped from their Quarters in the neighborhood of strasburgh, and marched towards the Lower Palatinate, to pass the Rhyne there, and joyn the Duke of Bournonville, parted the 12 instant from his Quarters at Hoesfeldt near Strasbourg, and marched for Philipshourg, passed the Rhyne there and advanced towards Heydelberg; In his way a party of his Troops made themselves masters of a Village, in which were 500 of the Enemy. The 16 Monfieur de Turenne; having advice, that the Confederate Troops lay behind a small place called Saint Zheim, scituate on

The faither particulars of this action, which is faid to have been one of the warmest that Monsieur de Turenne was ever engaged in, we expect by the next.
