Moscow, May 14.

CONFERENCES have been frequently held, since the last great Fire, between the Magistrates of this City and those of the Police, in order to prevent the great Mischiefs which frequently happen by Fires in this City, and, if possible, to render them less frequent. The Grand Dutchess's Birth-Day was celebrated here with great Magnificence on the 1st Instant, as was that of her Imperial Majesty on the 5th, when Te Deum was sung in the Cathedral Church, and a general Discharge was made of the Artillery.

Petersbourg, May 22. Her Imperial Majesty proposes going soon to Czarkaselo for about a Fortnight. All Things remain quiet as well in Finland as in Livonia, to which last Place General Lieven will return this Week.

Warsaw, May 23. The King has disposed of the Castellanies of Rypin and Zakrozin in Favour of Mess. Radziczewski and Kruzinski, who have already taken the Oaths for their Employments. M. Wolski has been made Castellan of Lublin; and Prince Lubomerski has obtained the Office of Ensign of the Crown, vacant by the Death of Prince Sendomir; several other considerable Employments will be disposed of soon after the holding of the General Diet.

Stockholm, June 2. The King has lately disposed of divers Military Employments, amongst which M. Folckman has been made Major of the Regiment of Calmar, M. Rosendorff has obtained a Company of Horse, and M. Flach, the Baron Bibling, and M. Guericke, have been made Captains of Foot. On the 25th past the Prince Successor set out from Drottningholm for Nykoping, and the next Day reviewed the Regiment of Sundermanie, which is in Garrison there; from whence his Highness went to Lincoping, and reviewed the Regiment of Ostrogothel, and then returned to Drottningholm.

Vienna, June 3. Prince Charles of Lorrain's Departure for Bruffels will take Place, as is said, some Time next Month; and it is confidently asserted, that he will be accompanied thither by the Princess Charlotte his Sister.

Copenhagen, June 6. The Prince Royal and the Princesses of Denmark went on the 30th past to Hirschholm, to take Leave of the Queen Mo-

ther, from whence they went to Fredensbourg, where they found their Danish Majesties in perfect Health.

Paris, June 8. The Deputies of the General Assembly of the Clergy went on the 6th to Versailles, where they were admitted to an Audience of the King, to whom they were introduced by the Count de Florentin, Minister and Secretary of State. Yesterday his Majesty, accompanied by the young Princesses, repaired to the Castle of Muette, from whence they set out this Morning for Compeigne: Her Majesty goes To-morrow, and the whole Court will get thither in the Course of this Week.

Brussels, June 12. M. Haren, Deputy from the States-General of the United Provinces, came hither on the 6th from the Hague. We learn from Liege, that a Tumult had happened there on the 5th Instant, occasioned by the Raising of the Price of Bread, but that the Magistrates of that City had prevented any bad Consequences attending it, by obliging the Dealers in Corn to open their Grainaries and sell at a reasonable Price. Since which an Ordonnance has been published here, to prevent, in some Measure, the sending of too great Quantities of Corn out of these Countries.

Hanover, June 14. His Majesty continues to enjoy a perfect State of Health. The Baron de Thun, Privy Counsellor to the Duke of Saxe Gotha, is come hither to compliment the King, in his Master's Name, on his Arrival in his German Dominions. His Majesty proposes to make two general Reviews of the Forces of this Electorate, the first of which will be To-morrow, and consists of 12 Battalions and 18 Squadrons; and the second, which will be on the 22d, will consist of 12 Battalions and 16 Squadrons; besides which, his Majesty proposes to review most of his Troops separately, which private Reviews will take up almost the whole Month.

Hague, June 16. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland will open their Assembly To-morrow, most of the Deputies being already arrived. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange has conferred on Major General Holstein, the Government of the City of Groningen.

Georgia Office, Westminster, May 25, 1750.

Whereas the Trustees for establishing the Colony of Georgia in America, thought it necessary in the first Establishment of that Colony to restrain the Grants they made of Lots of Land to limited Tenures only, in order thereby to prevent many Abuses which at that Time might probably have defeated the good Ends proposed by that Establishment, and during the late War it might have been of dangerous Consequence to have alter'd the Tenures; but as a general Peace and Tranquility happily prevail, the said Trustees are of Opinion, that the intended Enlargement of the Tenures may now be safely made, and have come to the following Resolution, viz.

That the Tenures of all Grants of Land whatsoever already made to any Persons within the Province of Georgia be enlarg'd and extended to an absolute Inheritance; and that all future Grants of Land shall be of an absolute Inheritance to the Grantees, their Heirs and Assigns.
