*Petersbourg, July 4.*

**T**HE Squadron which was in the Port of Cronstadt, put to Sea on the 2d Instant; it consists of seven Ships of the Line, and three Frigates, and is to proceed to Revel, where it will be joined by the like Number of Men of War and Frigates, from whence they are to proceed together to the Baltick Sea, in order to exercise the Seamen in the same Manner as was done last Summer.

*Naples, July 7.* On the 1st Instant, one of the King's Gallies, named the Rover, put to Sea with the Prince of Filomarini on board, in order to convey him to the Place of his Exile. His Majesty has ordered that Prince to be allowed one Ducat a Day for his Subsistence.

*Madrid, July 13.* Their Catholick Majesties returned from Aranjuez to their Palace of Buen Retiro on the 4th Instant; and on the 8th and 9th the Court went into Mourning on Account of the Anniversary of the Death of the late King. His Catholick Majesty has appointed the Marquis of Castellar to be Captain-General of the Kingdom of Arragon, in the Place of Don Luis Spinola Conde de Ciruela, who died the last Week in an advanced Age, extremely rich.

*Stockholm, July 14.* The King continues to reside at Carlsberg, as does the Prince Successor, with his Consort, at Drotningholm. Within these few Days past several extraordinary Councils have been held at Court, at which his Majesty and the Prince Successor assisted; they were occasioned, as 'tis said, by some Dispatches which have been lately received from Petersbourg. The Troops which were encamped at Ladugardsgardet, near this City, are returned to their Quarters, after having performed successfully their Exercises and Evolutions, according to the new Method introduced by the Prince Successor, who visited them daily all the Time they were encamped.

*Vienna, July 15.* The Baron de Backhoff, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had his first Audience of their Imperial Majesties on the 12th Instant; and on the 14th the Emperor, accompanied by Prince Charles of Lorraine, set out for Mannerstorff, where he proposes to spend some Days. Count Coloredo, Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, and divers other

Noblemen who have Estates in Bohemia and Moravia, are making Preparations for the Reception of their Imperial Majesties, who are to set out from hence on the 16th of next Month in order to view the Camps which are forming there. It is generally believed that Prince Charles of Lorraine will also accompany their Imperial Majesties in this Journey; and that his Return to Brussels will be put off to the Beginning of September. The Count de Durazzo, Envoy from the Republick of Genoa, having received his Recall, is preparing to set out on his Return Home.

*Dresden, July 18.* By Letters from Dantzick we are informed, that his Polish Majesty is expected there the 25th of next Month; where he will stop three or four Days, and then proceed to this City. M. Calkoen, Minister Plenipotentiary from the States General of the United Provinces to this Court, who is arrived here, will not set out for Warsaw, but wait the Return of the Court.

*Cobourg, July 18.* On the 15th Instant the Princess of Saxe-Cobourg was happily brought to Bed of a Prince, who was baptized the same Day by the Names of Francis-Frederick-Anthony; the Emperor, the King of Prussia, and the Duke of Brunswick Wolfenbuttel, standing Godfathers; and the Queen of Hungary, the Queen of Prussia, and the Dutchess Dowager of Brunswick Wolfenbuttel, Godmothers.

*Hague, July 28.* The States of Holland are actually assembled, and have been so ever since last Wednesday. It is decided that their Royal and Serene Highnesses are to set out for Loo, with the young Prince and Princess, about the latter End of this Week. The Troops destined for Surinam are embarking at Amsterdam; and General Sporcken is to leave this Place on Saturday; in order to join them at the Texel, and proceed with the first fair Wind to the Place of their Destination. This Embarkation consists only of General Sporcken's Regiment; and it is the common Opinion, that the rest of the Troops that had been assembled at Naerden, will not be sent on that Service. Count Finochietti, Minister from the King of the Two Sicilies, who has been in Italy for some Time on his private Affairs, returned hither last Week, and resumes his Post.
