Constantinople, July 23.

THE Port having been informed, that a Misunderstanding had happened at Asakow; that some Cossack Merchants, Subjects of the Empress of Russia, had been taken up by the Governor as Spies on that Account, and that one or two of them had been executed by the Populace, they sent directly the late Coult Cheaia or Lieutenant General of the Janissaries, at the Head of Part of that Corps, to make immediate Execution on those who had committed that rash Action. On the 18th Instant, the Vizir Cheaia, a Man who was not equal to that Post, was deposed, and the Tasterdar was placed in that Office; the Cheaia being reduced to that of Terzana Emini, or Inspector of the Arsenal. A few Days ago we had two great Fires, the one near the Seven Towers, which consumed a District inhabited by the Butchers and Tanners; the other at Scutary, in which about 200 Houses were burnt. These Accidents are supposed to have happened by a Sett of Incendiaries, who designedly prepare Combustibles, and throw them into Houses, two large Balls of that Composition having been thrown into a French Merchant's Window, one of which was found burning. Ezade Efendi, who was Musty before he who was last deposed, is recalled from his Banishment at Synope, and is soon expected here.

Petersbourg, Aug. 21. The College of Commerce has lately published a Proclamation, setting forth, that having received certain Information that the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle was broke out again at Stockholm, they therefore forbid, in the Name of her Imperial Majesty, under very severe Penalties, the bringing from thence into Russia, of all Provisions of that Kind, whether fresh, dried, or salted.

Rome, Aug. 22. The 17th Instant being the Anniversary of the Pope's coming to that High Dignity, when he entered into the Eleventh Year of his Pontificate, the whole Sacred College met at the Quirinal, and assisted at a grand Mass which was celebrated pontifically by Cardinal Cavalchini; after which the Cardinal Dean complimented the Pope on that Occasion,

in the Name of the Sacred College. On the 20th was celebrated the Anniversary of the Pope's Coronation, when the Alms, usually distributed upon this Occasion, was given to the Poor; and at Night there was fine Illuminations throughout the City. Yesterday they began to say Masses for the Repose of the Soul of the late King of Portugal, in the Church of that Nation; on which Occasion they also distributed Alms amongst the poor People.

Genoa, Aug. 22. The two Galliot of the Company of our Lady of Succours, put to Sea a few Days ago, in order to give Chace to three Tunefian Galliot, which we have been informed are cruizing in the Canal of Piombino; and the Bark and Xebek, also belonging to that Company, are getting ready to follow them. Count Pallavicina arrived here on the 20th Instant from Milan.

Leghorn, Aug. 24. Last Week arrived here from Toulon, in a Bark they had made themselves Masters of, ten Turkish Slaves; which M. Bertelet, the French Consul, and the Count de Lorenzi, charged with the Affairs of that Crown, being informed of, they presented a Memorial to the Regency, insisting on those Slaves being secured and delivered to them, in Conformity to a Convention agreed on some Time ago between the French Nation, and the Great Duke of Tuscany; in which it is stipulated, that all Fugitive Slaves, of each Nation, shall be reciprocally restored.

Warsaw, Aug. 25. This Morning at Nine o'Clock the King went in State to the Castle, and opened the Senatus Consilium with the usual Formalities. On the 20th Instant his Majesty made a numerous Promotion, when the Count Garczynski, and Mess. Wieloposki, Dzialinski, and Rzewuski, were appointed Viceroy of Posnania, Sendomir, Kalitsch, and Volhinia. Prince Czartoriski was appointed Commander in Chief of Podolia; and M. Oginski was named Grand Marshal of the Duchy of Lithuania. The Count Rzewuski, who before the late Dyet resigned the Post of Palatine of Podolia, in order to take his Seat in the Chamber of the Nuncios, has been re-established in that Dignity. This being the Anniversary of the Birth of Prince Xavier, who enters into the

21st Year of his Age, the same was celebrated at Court, and their Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on that Occasion.

Stockholm, Aug. 28. The Count de Goes, Envoy Extraordinary from their Imperial Majesties to this Court, arrived here on the 26th Instant from Vienna.

Dresden, Aug. 28. The young Count de Bruhl, Son to the Prime Minister, whom the King has named Starostie of Warsaw, set out from hence some Days ago for Poland, in order to take Possession of that important Post. We have received Advice from Leipzick of the Death of Count Lichtenstein, in the 36th Year of his Age.

Vienna, Aug. 29. This Court is gone into Mourning for six Weeks on Occasion of the Death of the King of Portugal. Yesterday was celebrated the Anniversary of the Birth of the Empress Dowager, who enters into the 60th Year of her Age; when the Empress Queen, with all the Royal Family, went from Schopbrun to Hetzendorff, to pay their Compliments on that Occasion; where most of the Nobility in Town likewise resorted. The Empress Dowager and the Empress Queen dined together in Publick; several other Tables having been provided for the Lords and Ladies of the Court; and at Night there was a grand Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction to see the fine Fireworks played off before the Balcony of the Castle, in which was all the Imperial Family;

Turin, Aug. 29. A Project has been proposed to the King of Sardinia, for making Salt from a Fountain of Salt Water found at a Place called Conflans, in the Tarantaine, which has been approved of, and there is great Probability of its succeeding. Count Viry, Minister from this Court to that of the Hague, set out on the 26th Instant for Holland; he will stay some Time in Savoy, and make France in his Way. Count Verelst, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General to this Court, is not yet arrived, but is expected every Day. Yesterday died the Marquess de la Chiusa, who was made Grand Master and Knight of the Order of the Annunciation, at the last Promotion.

Ratisbon, Aug. 31. Preparations are making at the Convent of St. Emeran for the Reception of the Prince and Princess of Furstenberg, who are shortly expected here with their Daughter, in order to her Marriage with the Prince of Tour Taxis, the Emperor's Principal Commissary to the Diet of the Empire, who set out from Brussels five or six Days ago, and is also expected here some Day this Week.

Berlin, Sept. 5. The Margrave and Margravine of Bareith set out from hence this Morning on their Return Home. By Advices from Cultrim, the King arrived there, in his Way to Silesia, on the 1st Instant at Night; and the

next Morning his Majesty reviewed the Regiments of Dragoons of Rothenbourg, Bonin and Katt, and seemed greatly pleased with their Behaviour and Appearance.

Copenhagen, Sept. 5. M. Reventlaw, the first President of Altona, is arrived here, and appointed to succeed Baron Bernstorff as Envoy Extraordinary to the French Court. Major General Gruner goes to Petersbourg, and M. Von Thiener, an Officer in the Regiment of Horse Guards, to Berlin. On Tuesday or Wednesday next the Court comes to Town; and after having spent a few Days here, intends to return to Friedensbourg.

Brussels, Sept. 7. There are arrived here some Deputies from Namur, in order to present to his Serene Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine, a free Gift from the States of that Province. The Regiment of Major General Cornabe, in the Service of the States General of the United Provinces, has passed by this City in its Way to Namur, in order to replace that of Lillers, which is ordered into Garrison at Tournay. The Price of Corn has fallen here very considerably within these few Days past, on Account of the plentiful Harvest we have had this Year. By Letters from Paris of the 4th Instant we are informed, that the Count d'Hautefort, Ambassador from France to their Imperial Majesties, was preparing to set out for Vienna; and that the Palace of Bourbon was fitting up for the Reception of Count Kaunitz, their Imperial Majesties Ambassador to the Court of France, who is expected at Paris some Time next Month. The same Letters say, that the Marquess de St. Contest was preparing to set out on his Embassy to the States General of the United Provinces; and that the Count de Steinville, charged with the Affairs of the Emperor, as Grand Duke of Tuscany, at the Court of his most Christian Majesty, was also preparing to set out from Paris, in order to take Possession of the Government of that Dutchy, in the Room of Count Richecourt.

Hague, Sept. 11. The States of Holland, before they separated, issued a Proclamation to explain their Placart of the 12th of March last, N. S. relating to the Ronde Maat, (or Duty levied upon Dry Measure in this Province,) which had been misinterpreted. They declare in the present Proclamation, that they had never intended, by the above-mentioned Placart of the 12th of March, to alter any Thing in the Disposition made by the ancient Ordonnances relating to the Duty on the Ronde Maat, and that consequently they ordain, That the said Ordonnances shall remain in full Force, as heretofore. M. Meynertzhagen, who was Resident from the Margrave of Anspach, has been recalled, and has, in Consequence thereof, presented a Memorial to the States General, to take Leave of their High Mightinesses.
