Lisbon, August 16.

GREAT Preparations are making for the Coronation of his Majesty, which will be performed with the utmost Magnificence before the End of next Month.

On Tuesday last we were greatly alarmed by a Fire breaking out in one of the Wings of the Royal Hospital, which burnt with such Violence, that in a short Time it reduced to Ashes that magnificent Building, together with the Church adjoining to it, notwithstanding all possible Means were used to prevent it. The Hospital was full of Sick People, and it was with the greatest Difficulty that most of them were saved, some few, who could give themselves no Assistance, having perished in the Flames.

Naples, August 18. A few Days ago anchored at this Port, several English, Dutch, and French Ships, from their respective Ports, with divers Goods for the Fair of Salerno; but finding that, contrary to Expectation, and the usual Practice, this Government insisted upon Visiting; many of them, especially the English, not being willing to submit to such Irregularity, departed immediately for Leghorn. Last Week we received the disagreeable News from Apuglia, that on the 26th past, the City of Lucera, and its neighbouring Villages of Troia and Biciari, were greatly damaged by a most violent Hurricane, accompanied with terrible Thunder and Lightning, by which divers Houses were demolished, and many Cattle buried under the Ruins.

Rome, Aug. 25. On the 11th Instant Cardinal Mellini had a long private Audience of the Pope, in Consequence of the Commissions he lately received by a Courier from the Court of Vienna, relating to the Affair of Aquileja; and on the 12th he dispatched the said Courier back to Vienna. The Pope has granted an Indulto in Favour of the King of Sardinia, to nominate, for the future, the Bishops and Archbishops in his Dominions, on Condition of his paying the Pope a yearly Pension of 4000 Crowns.

Plaisance, Aug. 25. The Letters by this Day's Post from Genoa say, that one of the Galliot of that Republick had made herself Master of

one of the Corsairs of Barbary, with 25 Hands on board, at the Head of the Island of Corfica.

Florence, Aug. 28. On the 18th Instant sailed from the Port of Leghorn, the Emperor's Ships of War, the Eagle, Heron, and Lyon, commanded by Commodore Acton, who, tho' he was not to open his Instructions till he was at Sea, it is said he is bound first to Trieste, then to Constantinople, and afterwards to the Coast of Barbary.

Leghorn, Aug. 28. The ten Turkish Slaves, who arrived here a few Days ago in a French Bark from Toulon, having got the better of the Under Officer and his Servant, who had the Care of them, found Means to escape as they were returning to that Port from some Work which they had been employed in. Their Design was to steer directly for the Coast of Barbary; but as they had no Provisions of any Kind, and were six Days in their Passage, they were obliged to put into this Port, being almost starved. The French Minister at Florence, and the French Consul at this Place, on Notice of their Arrival, made Instances to the Government for their being secured; which occasioned an extraordinary Council to be held; and though no Answer has as yet been given to the French Minister, Orders were immediately given for the Delivering up of the Frenchman and his Servant to the French Consul here, and to confine the Slaves in the Fortress until the Emperor shall send the Regency Orders about them. The Tripoline Minister happening to be here at the same Time, waiting for a Ship to return Home, has likewise demanded the Restitution of those Slaves, agreeable to the Treaties between the Emperor and the Regencies of Barbary; but the Government persists in their Resolution to wait the Emperor's Orders about them.

Stockholm, Aug. 30. The King enjoys at present a better State of Health than he has done for some Time past, and often takes the Diversion of Shooting of Pheasants in the Park at Carlberg. His Majesty has appointed M. Lindfelt to be a Captain in the Regiment of Guards; and the Baron Duval is appointed Quarter Master in the same Regiment.

Vienna, Sept. 5. We learn by our last Advices from Bohemia, that his Imperial Majesty, after having taken the Diversion of Hunting for some Days in the Neighbourhood of Banders, was set out from thence for Clumets, where he proposed also spending some Days. The Equipage of Count Hatzsch, Governor of M. L. N., arrived here on Tuesday last; and the Court himself is daily expected.

Berlin, Sept. 8. By Letters from Slesia we are informed, that his Prussian Majesty arrived on Friday last at Glogau, and set out the next Morning for Breslau, where it was expected he would arrive as that Night. The same Letters say, that the Regiments his Majesty proposed to review the evening marching into the Camp assigned them, the Right Wing of which reached to the Village of Wischuz, and the Left to the Town of Hunsfelt, which last Place was the Head Quarters. The Troops assembling in this Camp are, the Regiments of Baddenbroeck and Rochau, Cuirassiers; that of Schwerin, Dragons; the Regiments of Foot of Lestewitz, Schulz, Brands, and Kreitzen; the Battalions of Grenadiers of Izemblitz; Wanghenheim, and Marwitz; and the Hussars of Natzmer and Wartemberg.

Nuremberg, Sept. 8. The Prince of Tour Taxis, the Emperor's Principal Commissary to the Dyet of the Empire, arrived here on the 6th Instant in the Evening; he was saluted at his Entrance into this City by a Discharge of 12 Pieces of Cannon, and soon after complimented by two Deputies from the Magistrates; and Yesterday Morning his Highness left this Place, with a Retinue of about 40 Persons, on his Way to Ratisbon, where it is expected he will arrive this Evening.

Brussels, Sept. 10. The Deputies, who arrived here a few Days ago from Namur, had Yesterday Morning a particular Audience of Prince Charles of Lorraine, and presented to his Highness the Free Gift of the States of their Province.

Dusseldorf, Sept. 10. On Sunday last public Prayers were put up in all the Churches of the Dutchies of Bergues and Juliers, to pray the Almighty to put a Stop to the Distemper which rages there very much amongst the Horned Cattle, and has lately destroyed great Numbers of them. They write from Cologne, that on Saturday Night last a Fire broke out in the Village of Brockhausen, a little Distance from thence, which burnt down six large Farmhouses, with all the Barns and Stables belonging to them; and that the next Morning the Hereditary Prince of Anspach passed through that City, going from Loo to his Father's Court.

Hague, Sept. 15. The Baron vander Duyn, President of the College of Nobles of this Province, is set out for Loo, in order to pay a Visit to their Serene Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange. This Week several Officers, both Civil and Military, who have been

preferred by the Prince of Orange, or by the States General, through his Serene Highness's Recommendation, have taken the Oaths at the Assembly of their High Mightinesses, and at the Council of State, in order to qualify themselves for their different Employments; amongst whom was M. Gravesande in Quality of Receiver-General of Boule Duc, and M. Keyser, in Quality of President of the Council of Flanders.
