Naples, Sept. 22.

HIS Catholick Majesty having conferred the Title of Grandee of Spain on the Prince de Montemiletto, his Highness appeared at Court on the 16th Instant in that Quality. On the 18th Instant, the Feast of St. Januarius, Patron of this City, was celebrated here with the usual Ceremonies, when the Blood of that Saint being placed before the Image, it liquified in 25 Minutes, which was pronounced to the People by a general Discharge of the Cannon of our Fortresses. In the Afternoon the King and all the Royal Family went to the Metropolitan Church, to pay their Devotions to the Relicks of that Saint; after which his Majesty and the whole Court set out for Portici. The Pope has permitted the King to raise 150,000 Ducats upon the Ecclesiastical Revenues of this Kingdom, towards defraying the Charges of Quartering the Troops, on Condition that no Troops whatever be quartered in any Place belonging to the Clergy.

Genoa, Sept. 26. The Master of a French Ship arrived here from Cadiz reports, that two Sallee Rovers had made themselves Masters of two French Tartanes, and had chased a Third for some Hours, but that she had the good Fortune to escape by getting to Gibraltar. And by a Felucca which arrived here some Days ago from Corsica, we are informed, that a Ship from Algiers had drove on Shore, on the 10th Instant, on the Coast of Corsica, two Pinks laden with Barley, which they afterwards secured, and got off; but that the People had all found Means to escape, except one Woman, whom they had carried into Slavery.

Petersbourg, Sept. 26. A few Days ago we had Letters from Astracan, dated the 25th past, with an Account, that by Letters which came there from Rhest to several Armenians, dated the 3d of July, there was Advice, that in the Month of May last, there had been a great Plunder made at Ispahan, in which the Natives, as well as the Foreigners, had lost all they had. These Advices add, that there were two Schachs in Persia, the one Ismael, who resides in Ispahan, and the other Sharug, who resides in Mesched,

both which had named their respective Governors to go and take Possession of the Province of Gilan. That neither was yet arrived there; but as both had an Army under their Command, it was not doubted but that a Battle would ensue whenever they met.

Milan, Sept. 29. Count Pallavicini, on whom the Empress Queen of Hungary conferred some Time ago the important Post of Governor General of this Country, is arrived here from Genoa, and has taken Possession of his Government.

Stockholm, Oct. 1. On the 24th past two new Men of War, of 58 Guns each, were launched here; the one of which was named the Upland, and the other the Sudermania.

Venice, Oct. 2. Last Night the Senate, after having granted a Dispensation to M. Zon, chose M. Pietro Vignola in his Place, to succeed M. Businello as the Republick's Minister to his Britannick Majesty.

Turin, Oct. 3. Last Monday the King of Sardinia, and the whole Court, left this City, and design residing at the Venerie for some Time. As his Majesty proposes often to take the Diversion of Hunting, it has been made known to the Foreign Ministers, that it will be agreeable to the King if they chuse Sundays to pay their Court to him, unless any particular Business should make it necessary for them to require an Audience of his Majesty.

Warsaw, Oct. 3. The Departure of his Polish Majesty for Dresden is fixed for the 8th Instant, and the heavy Baggage is already sent away.

Vienna, Oct. 3. Count Harrach, late Governor General of the Milanese, has taken Possession of the Office of President of the Court of Justice, which her Imperial Majesty has lately conferred on him; and he has accordingly been installed therein, with the usual Ceremonies, by Field Marshal Count Konigsfegg. The Empress Dowager came on the 28th Instant, from Hitzendorff to her Palace in this City for the Winter; and Yesterday her Imperial Majesty, with the young Family, came to pay her a Visit, and returned afterwards to Schonbrun, where 'tis said the Court will reside till the 28th of November next. Most of the Members which

composed

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composed the Assembly of the States of Lower Austria are returned Home, after having agreed to raise the Subsidies demanded of them by the Empress Queen. 'Tis said a Resolution has been taken to add some new Works to the Fortifications of Mantua, and that Orders have already been given for that Purpose. Count d'Engel, heretofore Bishop of Belgrade, is named to the Bishoprick of Temeswar.

Dresden, Oct. 4. The last Letters from Warsaw say, that the Deputies elected in the respective Dietines to assist at the Opening of the Tribunal of the Crown, were all arrived at Petrikau, where the said Tribunal will be opened To-morrow with the usual Ceremonies. The same Letters add, that they had great Reason to believe that they should be able peaceably to chuse a Marshal of that Tribunal, and it was thought the Election would fall on the young Prince Sanguski, who has always seemed agreeable to both Parties. An Express is just arrived from Warsaw with an Account, that his Majesty had determined to set out from thence for this City on the 8th Instant, and proposed reaching Pforten by the 13th.

Ratisbon, Oct. 5. Count Kaunitz, Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties to the Court of France, arrived here on Thursday Night from Vienna; he alighted at the Apartments of the Prince of Tour Taxis, where he received soon after a Deputation from the Magistracy of this City; and the next Morning his Excellency continued his Journey for Brussels, where it was thought he would stay a Day or two before he proceeded for Paris. We learn from Munich, that the Landgrave of Hesse Darmstadt, and his Spouse, arrived the 27th of last Month at Nymphenbourg, in order to spend some Weeks with the Elector of Bavaria.

Berlin, Oct. 6. On Saturday last the Margrave Charles, with several of the Nobility and General Officers, who had been to Potzdarn to see the Regiment of Gendarms perform their new Exercise before the King, returned to this City; and the next Day his Majesty also came hither from thence with a numerous Retinue.

Berlin, Oct. 10. Yesterday was baptized the young Princess, of whom the Spouse of Prince Henry was delivered on the 24th of last Month, and was named Louisa-Henrietta-Guillielmina, the Margrave of Brandebourg Bareith, the Prince of Orange, Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and the Hereditary Prince of Anhalt Dessau, standing Godfathers; and the Margravine of Bareith, the Princess Royal of Sweden, the Princess Amelia, the Princesses of Schwedt, of Mecklenbourg, Schwerin, Hesse Darmstadt and Anhalt Bernbourg, standing Godmothers. The King has conferred the Title of Major General on Colonel Dewitz, who commanded a Regiment of Hussars in Silesia, and has permitted him to resign that Regiment, which his Majesty has given to M. Szeckely, Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Hussars of Wechmar.

Hambourg, Oct. 10. The late Dispute which the Magistrates of this City had brought themselves into with the Court of Denmark, concerning the Arrest and Detention of a Danish Jew, after having subsisted many Months, is at last ended.

Utrecht, Oct. 14. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange having been pleased to approve of the Nomination of Magistrates and Council of this City, the same was finally settled on the 12th Instant; and they have accordingly been sworn into their respective Offices.

Brussels, Oct. 15. 'Tis assured that a Project is on Foot for cutting a Canal from Ostend to the Province of Brabant. The Magistrates of this City have made strong Representations to the Government to obtain this Permission, and we doubt not but it will be carried into Execution if no unforeseen Accident happens to prevent it. The Court has approved of the Plan for making a Road from Courtray to Bruges, and the Grant for it has been delivered to the Undertakers. By Letters from Paris of the 12th of October we are informed, that the King intended soon to give the Title of Duke of that Kingdom to Mess. Mirepoix, Puyfeulx, and Count d'Argenson, and that of Dutchess to Madame de Pompadour.

Hague, Oct. 16. The States of Holland separated on Saturday last. During their last Meeting they have issued a Placart to prohibit the Importation of Black Cattle into this Province, till after the 1st of April next, on Pain of a Fine of 2000 Florins for each Offence, or of publick Whipping and perpetual Banishment for such as shall not be able to pay that Fine. Their High Mightinesses the States-General having appointed M. de Back to be Receiver of the Finances in the Town and District of Dort, in the room of the late M. Stoop, he has accordingly taken the Oaths for that Employment. M. Hop, Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick to the Court of Great Britain, sets out this Day on his Return to London. By Letters from Loo we are informed, that his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange was returned there from Zutphen, whither he had been to assist at an Assembly of the States of Guelderland.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to their Excellencies the Lords Justices, that on Wednesday the 26th Day of September last, about Eleven o'Clock at Night, Mr. Thomas Emes, Vestry Clerk of St. George's Queen Square, was knocked down before his own Door in Eagle Street, near Red Lyon Square, Holborn, by Persons unknown, and was not only robbed of his Watch, Money, one Silver Shoebuckle, his Shirt Buttons, a Silver beaded Cane, and his Hat, but likewise very much wounded on his Head, and bruised on his Temples, of which Wounds and Bruises he languished seven Days and died; Their Excellencies, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, are pleased to promise his Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who gave the Blows) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as they, or any of them, may be apprehended

apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement, their Excellencies are pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders, by the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury.

Whereas Mr. Thomas Moore, of Ilford in the County of Essex, was robbed on Thursday the 13th Day of September last, near Okehampton in the County of Devon, by two Persons on Horseback, the one appearing to be a Seafaring Man, and dressed in a Blue Coat or Jacket, about five Feet and nine Inches high, of a dark Complexion, wore a Wig, and rode on a dark-brown Horse or Mare; the other appearing like a Grazier, wore a Brown Coat, was of a fresh Complexion, wore his own Hair, and appeared to be about the Age of Twenty Years; who took from the said Mr. Moore Five Guineas and two Half Guineas in Gold, and about Sixteen or Eighteen Shillings in Silver, and one Silver Watch, which was bought of Mr. John Overy, London, but the Maker's Name Andrew De Lannay, with a Leather String and Watch Key to it; and after robbing him, endeavoured to shoot him through the Head, by firing a Pistol at him three Times, and at last wounded him in the Face, by the Pistol going off:
