Oxon, Decemb. 9.

His day the Sieur Van Gogh, Ambassador from the States of the United Provinces had Audience of His Majesty, where he delivered his Letters of Revocation, acquainting His Majefty with the Order he had received from his Mafters to return home.

Gron, Det. 11. By Letters from Portsmouth, dated the 9th instant, we understand that a Court Martial has fate there, and condemned to death two Scamen belonging to the Gloeeffer, for some disorders committed by them. advis'd, that diverse of the ships there have received pay, to the great fatisfaction of the Sea-men ; but that which giveth them the greatest evidence of the care taken of them is, a supply of cloaths fent thither; by which they are fully fentible, that the hardships which they have undergone, have been the unavoidable effects of the Contagion, and no want of care in their superiours; so that they have not the least doubt, but that the Plague decreafing, as it doth, they shall be provided for to their just expectations, and all unanimously and cheerfully go on to promote his Majesties service.

Wigan in Lancashire, Dec. 5. This Town was flartled at the death of a Woman, who was found early in the morning before the dore of a poor Cottage in the high-way, within the
Limits of this Corporation; The Major of this Town was very industrious to find the cause ofit, and upoli due examination of three Persons that came with her into the Town from Ireland, and many notorious circumstances, it appeared that fire was clear of any Infection, and that being with Child, to avoid the fhame among her Friends, who are of good Fashion, and live nor many miles from this place, she destroy'd

her self by poyion.

Pera of Constantinople, Sep. 10. The Peace being wholly concluded and compleated with Germany, the Turks are resolved to bend their force against Candia, intending to swallow it up intirely in one year; and to that end make not only Preparations of their own for Transportation of their Soldiery, but also have laid an Embargo on all Christian ships within their power. In Train of the German Ambaffador arrived here the Marquisse Durazzo's Brother, one who pretends to be fent by the Republique of Genova to the Grand Signor, in nature of an Envoy, to know whether li-cense may be given for the coming of an Ambassador to the Grand Signor from that Republick, that fo they may again zenew their ancient Trade with this place; which proposition being made to the Vizier by a Letter from that State, he're plied according to their old Stile aud Maxim, That the Arms of the Port are always open to receive their Friends : This Embally from Genova, may in time introduce another from

Ditto, 04, 2. The Grand Signor is with his Court return'il again to this City, who though he cannot be heartily recon-ciled to this place; yet at the perswasion of those, on whom he puts some considence, he resolved to visit it, but how long he may continue in this humour is uncertain ; his thoughts and wishes are said to be at Adrianople, but the endeavours of his chief Ministers are to keep him here.

Rome, Novemb. 21. Cardinal Antonio Barbarini is come with a defire to have the Popes Bulls for his Archbishoprick of Rhemes, seconded with the defires of the French King: He is Camerlengo of the Church, the greatest dignity of it; and in the vacancy governs for nine days, coynes monies, and has his Swiffe Guards. His Holyness now is faid to be therefore absolutely resolved to make him quit the one or the other, and the French King pretends he shall keep the possession of both, which will beger maiter, of new rancor and unkinducla between them.

Since the death of Duke de Cesarini, who hath lest only Daughters, his Brother Monfieur Cejarini succeeds in the Dignities and Estate; between his Holyness, and whom there is such kindness, that a Treaty of a March is introduced between one of his Neeces (Daughter to the late Duke) and Don Sigifmundo Chigi, Nephew to the Pope, to give the Cap defign d for him to Mot ficur Cefarini, and fo hedge in the Honors of many Dukedoms and Principalities, with a vaft Efface.

Stockholm, Novemb. 15. This Week came a thrange Alarm from Muscowy ward, of an intended Incursion of theirs into Liefland this Winter, which so flartled the Government here, that they arrested very many Ships and Schuits in this Port, as well Strangers as their own, to carry men and Ammunition thither, which they intendere mid-winter, yet to fortifie, with a strength of eleven or twelve thousand Foot, and two thousand Horse. The ground of this jealousie, and the truth of it is not yet publick. The Field Marshal, Count Wrangei, intends to pass the Holy-days in the Dukedom of Bremen, oll when, the Defign of those Forces will hardly be discovered.

Deal, Decemb. 7. Onthe fifth in the afternoon, a Priviteer carried a Gallior which he had taken, through the Downs for Harwich. The Sickness (God be praised) doth very much decrease in Sandwich and Dover.

Tork, Dec. 9. This day we received advise from Newtastle, dated the eighth present, that the Evening before, Captain Lightson of the Speedwil, brought in thither two Prizes, but of their lading there is no mention.

Dover, Dec. 8. The Swallow Kerch, Capt. Berry Commander, brought into our Roadthree Prizespine laden with Wine and Brandy from Bourdeaux, the other two outward bound empty, defign'd for the faid Port. Several Vessels were this day seen in the Narrow passing Northward, after whom his Majeslies Frigot, the Success, made all his Sails, and will doubtless give a good account of them. The former of the Tydes breaking in, should have given you an account of the strange preservation of Mris Nephews Daughter, who, with two Children in a close, boarded Bed, did fwim near to the Ceiling of the House, and finking down with the Tyde, are all at this time very fafe.

Tarmenth, Decemb. 6. Here came into this Road a Ship from Longfound, who hath been buskin too and again this Fortnight; in all which time, they faw not one Man of War, but; within the Dogger fands about twelve Dogger Boars.

Hague, Dec. 11. As well Prince Maurice, a Mounsier de Pradelle, seem by their Letters to intimate it will be no cafie matter to beat the Enemy out of the Holds he hath in our Country, for the great difficulties of the Season, and the good. provision they have made for their security and strength. We are told the Bishop hath Eight thousand Horse in a Body. which is more then allours and the French pur together can make. The Lunenburgh Forces had a late Muster upon the Wefer, where appeared in the whole, but eighteen Troops of Horse, and twenty Companies of Foot.
The States of Holland have prohibited all trade to Green-

land, and likewise to Normay, and the East Country, till far-

ther order. The Sieur Wickfort hith made complaint here in the name, of the Duke of Lunenburgh, that those troops of his in East-Friesland receive not their pay, whereby they are much discouraged in this entrance into the States Service: Upon which the Downger of East-Friesland being required to depute Perfour hither about that matter, the answered a ligile dryly, That she must first confule the Duke of Lunenburgh, as Tutor to her Son. The Town of Embden hath likewise, made a serious : complaint, that contrary to their Piviledges, Greitzyle is like to be fortified.
