On Tuesday last, being the 18 instant, about 8 in the morning, his Highness considering the danger that might ensue by the extremity of the weather, flipt his Cables, and ruade for the Downs, leaving us with Twenty Fregats more at an Anchor, our Top-masts and Yards loured, riding between Faire Lee and Dungconness, four miles from Land. About Three in the Afternoon About Three in the Afternoon we discovered five or fix Sail, which proved to be part of the scattered French Fleet, the headmost of them, named the Ruby, a ship of 1000 Tuns, 412 Men, 2nd 54 Guns, whereof 40 brass, commanded by Mounsieur de la Roche, a Leader of one of their Squadions, who bore up confidently, supposing us (as we believe) to be their own Fleet; but as soon as he came within reach of our middle Tire, he soon perceived his Error; but yet prefently returned some Guns in exchange: Upon which we immediately weighed, and fetcht him up about Ten in the Evening; and having the weather-gage of him, the wind at S. Plymouth, Sept. 21. The last Week arrived an Oftender from Oftend, from whence he came on Saturday last, and reports the Dutch Fleet gone to the Northwards. On Wednelday morning, he met with four French men of War near the Isle of Wight, whereof one of them haled him, enquising for their own Admiral and Fleet; but not receiving satisf faction, they immediately stood for their own Coasts.

Portsmouth, Sept. 23. The Prince having last night commanded out hence the Streights and Lubon Fleet, with the Scandcroon ships, this morning about 7 of the Clock set sail from St. Helens Bay, with those Merchants under his Convoy, and is gone to the East, in search of the Dutch Fleet, some of whose Scouts are faid to have appeared on the back of

Franckfor:, Sept. 6. The Country hereabours are strong-lvallarm'd with the apprehensions of a Winter war upon the Phine, several Pamphlets being lately Printed in Latin and French, to vindicate the pretentions of both parties; in the mean time the Lerrainers continue plundering and ruining a liftance of the Palatine, and 2000 Auxiliaries from Brunfwick.

Hamburgh, Sept. 16. On the 9th instant the Prince of Denmark came to Altena upon the Elbe, and the same evening proceeded on his journey in great hast towards Copenhagen. Letters from Dantzick insorme us, that the King of Poland is expected shortly in Prussia, and Monsieur Lubomirshi is gone to Breslaw, to attend there the Diet, which is to be held in November.

The hostility goes on between the Swedes and the City of Bremen, the Bremers lately making a briske fally with 1500 men, who surprising the Swedes, killed a great number of Soldiers, and some of the Boores who were at work in filling up the Ditches, with the loss only of 18 of their own

Rome, Sept. 11. His Heliness is somewhat better then formerly, though in no probability of Recovery, and continues his defire of changing the Air, and to remove for some time to the Cardinal Prince Savelle's house at Frescati, the Castle Gandolpho being thought too moyst a place for him this Autumn. His kindred and Physicians eppose this defign as much as is possible, being very unwilling he should leave Rome, knowing his condition to be much worle then he himself fancies ic to be.

selves in their own Quarters.

Elfeneur, Sept. 10. Yelterday came from Copenkagen into this Road, feven men of War from 30 to 40 guns ; four of them Danes, the other Dutch thips that came out with Adelaer; they are ordered Convoy to 40 or 50 Dutch Merchantmen, and are now failing, intending to conduct them as far as the Nof. of Normay, and afterwards to Cruze between that and the Shaegen to a tend the Gottenberg Fleet, and as many more are expected from Copenhagen to second them.

Vonice, Sept. 11. Our laft letters from the Levant, tell us, Signiour Barbara Proveditor of the Venetian Fleet, nath taken in the Islands of the Archipelago, several Turkish ships richy laden, and gathered in from the Greeks their usuall Taxes or or Carazzi puid by them to this Republique. Almissa strong place in Dalmatia is threatned by 12000 Turks, whither General Cornaro is gone in person, having beforehand provided well for the other Garrisons of that Province. Letters from Dalmatia inform us, that a body of Morlacks lying in Ambucado, have out off 2000 Turks; but the particulars, or rather the certainty of the whole not yet known. Seaman for every moneths absence.
