Constantinople, November 23.

WE have had of late several Rumours as if a Revolution had happened at Cairo, and that Ibrahim Chiause, and Rudwah Cheaia, had been destroyed. These Rumours were occasioned by the first Imrchor, or Master of the Horse to the Grand Signor, being sent thither. What is most probable; and we are told here, is, that those two potent Men will not admit the new Pascha Abdullah to act; though others say, they have not thought proper this Year to remit the Grand Signor the Whole of his Tribute. A Commotion has happened at Aleppo against the Pascha, who was charged by the Inhabitants of neglecting their Security, and suffering the Gourdines; a lawless powerful People of the Mountains, to intercept the Subsistence sent to the Town, so that all Necessaries were become scarce and dear; and it is thought, without he can buy it off, he will be changed. On the 8th Instant M. Nepleuf, the Russian Resident, departed this Life, after a consuming Illness of near twelve Months.

Gibraltar, Dec. 6. The new Alcaide of Tetuan having received the Emperor of Morocco's Credential Letters for carrying into Execution the Agreement made between William Pettigrew, Esq; his Majesty's Consul General, and the late Alcaide of Tetuan, for the Redemption of all his Britannick Majesty's Subjects who are there in Captivity, Capt. Barrington, in the Sea Horse Man of War, will sail To-morrow Morning for Tetuan Bay, in order to take on board the said Captives.

Gibraltar, Dec. 9. Capt. Barrington, in the Sea Horse Man of War, who sailed from hence on the 7th Instant in the Morning for Tetuan Bay, in order to bring over the British Slaves, is returned hither this Morning, and has brought with him Mr. Latton and 27 Captives. And Mr. Pettigrew is preparing to set out for Fez, with a handsome Retinue, to have an Interview with the Emperor of Morocco, in order to procure the Renewal of all former Treaties, and to receive the British Captives who are still at Fez.

Petersbourg, Dec. 18. The Council of War having regulated the Winter Quarters for all the Troops which were cantoned in Finland, Livonia, and the other conquered Provinces, Orders have been given for filling the necessary Magazines for their Subsistence. This Body

of Troops are reckoned to amount to about 100,000 Men; and, according to the Plan laid down for their Winter Quarters, may be drawn together again in a short Time.

Lisbon, Dec. 24. The Engineers who were to have embarked in the Rio Fleet which sailed on the 7th Instant, received the Night before an Order from Court to postpone their Departure till a Man of War could be got ready to convey their Persons and all the necessary Implements that are wanting for erecting the Stone Pillars in the Limits agreed on between this Crown and that of Spain.

Florence, Dec. 25. The Arch-Priest of Udine is arrived at Rome, with a Commission from the Senate of Venice, to assist Cardinal Rezzonico in treating with the Pope about the Affair of Aquileja.

Turin, Dec. 26. Count Bellegarde, the Polish Minister at this Court, who married the late Marshal Saxe's Sister, and who was appointed his Residuary Legatee, has received from Paris an Account of the Estate and Effects which falls to him by the said Marshal's Death, amounting in the whole to about 900,000 Livres; and on Wednesday last he set out for Dresden, from whence 'tis said he will go to Paris, in order to take Possession of the said Marshal's Estate and Effects.

Vienna, Dec. 30. Their Imperial Majesties have not as yet appeared in Publick since the Death of the Empress Dowager, but their Ministers have been permitted to confer with them. The Mourning for that Princess is fixed to six Months, and three Months half Mourning; and all her Officers and Domesticks are allowed to enjoy the same Honours and Appointments they had during her Life. The Count de Graf-falkowitz, President of the Chamber of Hungary, is arrived here from Presbourg, to confer with the Ministers of this Court, in relation to the Steps necessary to be taken in order to the Opening the General Diet of that Kingdom. The Chevalier de Azlor, Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Spain, is also arrived here.

Venice, Jan. 1. The Term fixed for the Departure of the Imperial Ministers being near expiring, has occasioned for some Days past a great Appearance of Business here. The Savii have had frequent Consultations upon the Arrival of Couriers from Vienna and Rome, and particularly upon some Dispatches from Cardinal Rezzonico; and on the 27th past, there was a Meeting
