*Petersbourg, December 23.*

**H**ER Imperial Majesty has declared her Intention of going To-morrow to Czarkaselo, in order to spend some Days in Retirement. M. Wahrendorff, the Prussian Minister, having desired the necessary Passports for himself, his Domesticks and Baggage, and an Escort to accompany them to the Frontiers of this Kingdom, 'tis expected he will soon be setting out on his Return Home.

*Stockholm, Dec. 25.* Divers Ships, loaden with Provisions of all Kinds for this City, having been drove into different Ports of the Kingdom by the late Tempestuous Weather, and there froze up, we have been obliged to get their Cargoes brought here by Land-Carriage.

*Rome, Dec. 26.* On Christmas Eve, being the Day on which the Holy Year expired, the Pope performed the Ceremony of Shutting the Holy Gates, with all the accustomed Ceremonies, at the Church of the Vatican; Cardinal Corsini did the same at St. John de Lateran; Cardinal Colonne at that of St. Mary Majeure; and Cardinal Ruffo at that of St. Paul. The Concourse of People from all Parts to see this Ceremony was surprizingly great.

*Leghorn, Dec. 26.* For three Weeks past there has been very tempestuous Weather in the Mediterranean; in which three Barbary Corsairs have been drove on Shore, one upon the Coast of Sicily, one upon that of Sardinia, and one upon that of the Ecclesiastical State; they have all been secured, and their Crews made Slaves. Several other Ships have likewise perished in those Seas and that of Genoa during the bad Weather.

*Modena, Dec. 30.* The Marquess de Mari, Governor of the Dutchy of Reggio, is come hither, and has laid before the Duke our Sovereign, the present State and Condition of that Dutchy; as likewise a Project for building an Hospital there for the Benefit of the Poor. He met with a most gracious Reception from his Serene Highness, who greatly approved of his Project. On Friday last, being Christmas-Day, the Duke, accompanied by several of the Nobility, assisted at Divine Service in the Cathedral Church, which was celebrated ponti-

fically by M. Sabattini, Bishop of this City; after which, his Serene Highness received the Compliments of the whole Court, which appeared very numerous and brilliant on this Occasion. The Duke has appointed the Chevalier Salvatico to be Governor to the young Prince d'Este; and his Highness has likewise disposed of some Civil and Military Employments. The Project for making a Port at the Entrance of the River Lavenza, capable of receiving all Sorts of Ships, has at last, as we are assured, passed the Council; and 'tis said it will soon be begun, and that his Highness the Duke, to shew his Readiness in forwarding this Project, will go himself to Massa in April next, in order to be near at Hand to inspect the Work, and proposes spending a good Part of the Summer there.

*Munich, Dec. 30.* The Count de Vitzhum, Adjutant General of the King of Poland, arrived here on Saturday last from Dresden, to acquaint their Serene Highnesses with the Birth of a Prince, of whom the Princess Royal of Saxony was delivered the Wednesday before. This agreeable News has given great Joy at this Court; and the Count de Ponickau was dispatched on Monday last for Dresden, to compliment their Polish Majesties on this happy Occasion. The same Day the whole Court, except the Princess Clementia, who is not yet perfectly recovered from the Small-Pox, set out from hence for Haag, in order to hunt the Wild Boar.

*Vienna, Jan. 2.* The Emperor has disposed of the important Post of President of the Aulick Council of the Empire, vacant by the Death of Count Wurmbrand, in Favour of Count Harrach, late Governor of the Milanese. Yesterday being New Year's-Day, their Imperial Majesties received the usual Compliments on that Occasion in their own Apartments; after which the Emperor, accompanied by the Knights of the Order of the Golden Fleece, all in deep Mourning, assisted at Divine Service in the Royal Chapel, but the Empress heard Mass in her own private Apartment.

*Copenhagen, Jan. 2.* Two Regiments of Marines are going to be raised here, the Officers for which are soon to be named; and 'tis assured they are for the present to mount Guard

at the Old and New Holm. The Supreme Tribunal of Justice closed its Sessions the 24th of last Month, and will open it again on the 4th of March next. The King has caused an Ordonnance to be published throughout this Kingdom, setting forth, that in Pursuance of a Convention lately agreed to between his Majesty and the Great Duke of Ruffia, as Duke of Holstein, all Deserters on the Part of each other, shall be immediately secured and reciprocally given up. The Baron de Flemming, the Swedish Envoy Extraordinary, having obtained the King his Master's Leave to return Home on his private Affairs, set out from hence a few Days ago for Stockholm, and is not expected here again till towards the End of this Month.

*Turin, Jan. 2.* The Duke of Savoy had a few Days ago a slight Fit of an Ague and Fever, but is now perfectly recovered. The Infanta Dutchess of Savoy is entred into the 5th Month of her Pregnancy, and is in perfect Health. Yesterday being New Year's-Day, there was a great Levee at Court, when the Prince of Carignan, the Great Officers of the Crown, and all the Nobility, kissed the Hands of the Royal Family. And the Foreign Ministers were introduced separately to them by the Master of the Ceremonies, to compliment them on this Occasion. M. Pinelli, Envoy Extraordinary from the Republick of Genoa, is on his Departure for his Court; and 'tis said he will be replaced by M. de Villavechia, who was some Time ago charged with the Affairs of that Republick at the Hague.

*Hanover, Jan. 5.* The Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle, which we flattered ourselves was entirely ceased in this Country, has again broke out in several Villages in the Neighbourhood of this City, and carries off great Numbers of them.

*Frankfort, Jan. 6.* The Duke of Saxe Meinungen, who has been to Manheim, to pay a Visit to the Elector Palatine, is returned hither. The Protestants settled here continue still to solicit very strongly for Leave to build a Church in this City, which shews they have not lost all Hopes of succeeding in that Affair. A great Number of Horses, which have been bought up in several Places of the Empire, have passed by here for Alsace and the three Bishopricks, for the Service of the Regiments of Horse and Dragoons which are there in Garrison. The Austrian Officers who are here recruiting, have also very good Success, having sent off last Saturday a great Number of Recruits for the Imperial Regiments quartered in the Low Countries.

*Frankfort, Jan. 7.* On Tuesday last Prince Waldeck passed by Hanau in his Way to Vienna. They write from Munich, that Count Wartensleben, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces to divers

Princes and States of the Empire, arrived there the 26th of last Month from Manheim. And by Letters from Dresden we are informed; that Field Marshal Count Lowendahl was expected there shortly from Paris, and 'twas believed would stay there about two Months.

*Bonn, Jan. 8.* We learn from Cologne; that a malignant Fever has raged for some Days past in that City, and carried off a great Number of Persons of all Ages. The last Letters from the Lower Palatinate of the Rhine say, that Prince Kybourg was arrived there the Beginning of last Week, to take Possession of the County of Daun, which devolved to him by the Death of the late Count of that Name.

*Berlin, Jan. 9.* The King, accompanied by the Princes his Brothers, and several General Officers, went a few Days ago to view the Regiment of Wirtemberg, Fusileers, and was greatly pleased with their Appearance and Behaviour. On New-Year's Day there was a very elegant Entertainment given in the King's own Apartment at the Palace, when the Princes of the Royal Family, the Prince of Anhalt Dessau, and several other foreign Princes who are here, besides many of the Nobility, General Officers, and other Persons of Distinction, were admitted to dine at his Majesty's Table. The Count de Puebla, Minister Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties, had Yesterday Morning a private Audience of the King, and notified to his Majesty the Death of the late Empress Dowager, and the Court will shortly go into Mourning on that Occasion.

*Hague, Jan. 14.* On Friday last the Baron de Reischach, Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties, notified in Form, to the President of the Assembly of the States General, the Death of the Empress Dowager. The same Day he had an Audience of the Prince and Princess of Orange, and notified the same to their Serene and Royal Highnesses; and on Sunday the Court went into Mourning for six Weeks on this Occasion.
