Tunis, January 3.

ON the 28th past a Dutch Ship, called the Mary Galley, was brought into this Port by one of our Corsairs. She was taken off Giorgenti, whether she had been to take in a Loading of Corn for Malaga, and was seized under a Pretence of her not being furnished with a proper Pass; but M. Hudson, the Dutch Consul, has since obtained the entire Restitution of her and her Cargo.

Revel, Jan. 8. The Troops quartered in this Neighbourhood, under the Command of General Lapuchin, are now compleat, and in very good Condition; they are so disposed as to be able to form a considerable Army in a very short Time; the Magazines for their Subsistence are abundantly supplied with all Necessaries, and they remain very quiet in their Quarters, neither is there the least Appearance of their quitting them; so that the Report that has been lately spread of their having received Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march on the first Notice, appears to be without the least Foundation. On the 29th past, being her Imperial Majesty's Birth Day, the same was celebrated here with great Magnificence. After Divine Service in the Morning we had a triple Discharge of the Artillery; at Noon General Lapuchin gave an elegant Entertainment to many Persons of Distinction, and at Night great Part of this City was finely illuminated.

Petersbourg, Jan. 10. When the Empress declared M. Gross, her late Minister at the Court of Berlin, to be one of her Council of State, she annexed to it a Pension of 2000 Rubles per Annum; and her Imperial Majesty has since resolved to employ him in the Department of Foreign Affairs.

Leghorn, Jan. 12. The Differences between the Regency of this Dutchy and the Republick of Lucca, are, as we are assured, in a fair Way of being amicably adjusted, the Emperor, as Grand Duke of Tuscany, having consented that the Magistrates of Lucca shall go on with the Roads they are making over the Mountains, on certain Conditions, which 'tis not doubted but they will readily consent to. A new Duty is laid upon all Sorts of Provisions whatsoever coming into or going out of this Port. The Captain of a Maltese Frigate, who arrived here within a few Days, reports, that three Spanish Men of War have taken two African Shebecks, having on board 377 Men, 68

Brass Cannon, and 90,000 Piastras. We have received Advice, that a most violent Shock of an Earthquake had happened in the Island of St. Vincent in the Brazils, by which the Town of Santos, and Part of the Fortrefs of St. Vincent, had received very considerable Damage. A Ship from Alexandria is arrived here, the Master of which says, that the contagious Distemper, which lately raged in those Parts, was entirely ceased.

Genoa, Jan. 15. The Regulation that has been settling for some Time past, in order to reform Luxury in this City, was published on the 6th Instant, and is to take Place on the first of March next. The Edict lately published concerning the Bank of St. George, is carried into Execution with all imaginable Success, and the Duties established in Favour of it, are raised without the least Disturbance. M. Chauvelin, Minister Plenipotentiary from his most Christian Majesty to this Republick, is set out from hence for Parma, where 'tis thought he will wait the Arrival of the Marquess de Cruffol, who is coming thither to replace the late Count Maulevrier, in Quality of Minister from the Court of France.

Stockholm, Jan. 15. The last Advices from Finland say, that every Thing there remained in perfect Tranquillity. Baron Flemming, Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to that of Denmark, arrived here some Days ago from Copenhagen, and will set out again on his Return to that Court towards the End of this Month. The Prince Successor, and the Princess his Spouse, are gone to pass a few Days at Ulrichsdahl.

Vienna, Jan. 20. The Funeral Service for the late Empress Dowager has been solemnized for three Days successively in the Church of the Augustins. It began on the 17th, when his Imperial Majesty, with the Princess Charlotte of Lorraine, and the whole Court, went thither and heard Prayers for the Dead, which were read by the Pope's Nuncio. On the 18th the Emperor went thither again, with most of the Imperial Family; when a Funeral Oration, on the Death of the Deceased, was pronounced by Father Tausch, a Jesuit; after which a grand Mass was celebrated pontifically by the Pope's Nuncio; and Yesterday his Imperial Majesty and the Archduke Joseph repaired again to the said Church, and assisted at Divine Service, which ended the Solemnity, all the Bells in this City and Suburbs having tolled almost the whole Time.

Time. Her Imperial Majesty not being able to attend these Services, on Account of her Pregnancy, assisted at the usual Prayers for the Dead, which were read in her own Apartment. The four Deputies from the Kingdom of Bohemia, who arrived here some Days ago, were admitted to an Audience of their Imperial Majesties on Monday last.

Turin, Jan. 23. Yesterday and the Day before two Messengers arrived here, one from Naples, and the other from Parma, with an Account of both the Queen and the Dutchess having been delivered of a Prince, which the Spanish Minister made known to this Court.

Copenhagen, Jan. 23. His Danish Majesty returned hither last Thursday, and there was Yesterday a Council and Court as usual. Orders are given to equip two Frigats, one of 40, and the other of 30 Guns, for the annual Exercise of the Cadets in the Sea Service. M. Hading, the Imperial Secretary, having delivered to the Danish Ministers a Notification of the Death of the late Empress Dowager, this Court goes To-morrow into Mourning for three Weeks.

Dresden, Jan. 23. Count Bellegarde set out from hence Yesterday for Paris, in order to take Possession of the Estate and Effects left him by the late Count Saxe. Count Rosenbourg, who is going to reside at the Court of Denmark, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties, arrived here a few Days ago, and is since set forwards on his Journey to Copenhagen, after having been introduced to the King and all the Royal Family, and met with a most gracious Reception. On Sunday last, being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Coronation, the same was observed at Court with great Solemnity; on this Occasion their Majesties received the Compliments of all the Lords of the Court, the Nobility and Foreign Ministers. The Princess Royal, and the young Prince of whom she was lately delivered, are both extremely well. The Count de Loos, Ambassador from this Court to that of France, is on his Departure for Paris, from whence Marshal Lowendahl is expected towards the End of this Month. The last Advices from Poland are very favourable, the Tribunal of Petrikaw continuing its Assembly with all the Success that can be desired; and the Frontiers of that Kingdom enjoying a perfect Tranquillity, by the efficacious Measures which have been taken to stop the Ravages and Cruelties committed by the Heyducks.

Munich, Jan. 23. The Cardinal Prince and Bishop of Liege is so well recovered from his late Indisposition, as to be able to appear in Publick as heretofore; and the Diversions of the Court, which were stopt during his Illness, were Yesterday permitted to go on again. M. Blondel, who resided for some Time at the Imperial Court, in Quality of Minister from his most Christian Majesty, is arrived here from Vienna, in order, as 'tis said, to execute a private Commission at this Court. The Princess, Spouse of Duke Clement of Bavaria, is perfectly recovered from the Small Pox.

Berlin, Jan. 26. The Carnival at this Place will end on Friday next, when his Prussian

Majesty will leave Berlin for the Winter, and return to Potzdam. Many Foreigners, who came here upon Account of the Diversions of the Carnival, have already left this Place, most of whom are gone to Dresden, to enjoy the End of the Carnival there. On Sunday last, being the King's Birth-day, who then entered into the 40th Year of his Age, the same was celebrated at Court with the usual Magnificence. At Noon his Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, and afterwards dined with the whole Royal Family at the Queen Mother's. On this Occasion Baron Fouquée and Count Dohna were promoted to the Rank of Lieutenants General of Foot, and the Pregnancy of the Princess of Prussia was declared at Court; and on Friday next, being her Royal Highness's Birth-Day, there will be a Ball in Mask, and a great Supper at the Queen Mother's Court.

Hambourg, Jan. 26. Doctor Anderson, one of the Secretaries to this Town, and Son to the late Burgher-master of that Name, in whom this City lost some Years ago a very worthy Magistrate, was made Choice of Yesterday to supply the Place of Counsellor, which was become vacant in this Government by the Nomination of M. Schele to be one of the four Burghermasters.

Frankfort, Jan. 29. We learn from Schramberg, a little Town in the County of Hohenberg, in the Black Forest, that a Fire broke out there a few Days ago in the House of one of the Magistrates, which burnt with such Violence, that it was impossible to put a Stop to it; that the Magistrate himself perished in the Flames; and that the whole Town, consisting of about 400 Houses, was entirely reduced to Ashes. It is assured that a Project is on Foot for adjusting the Differences between the Magistrates of this City and the Protestants settled here, in Relation to the Request made by the latter for Liberty to build a Church within the Walls of this City, by which the Protestants will have Leave to build one in the Suburbs; to which Project it is said the Protestants have already given their Consent.

Hague, Feb. 2. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland, who separated last Saturday, are to re-assemble on the 17th Instant. M. Marsfeld has taken the Oaths before the Council of State, in Quality of Colonel of a Regiment of Artillery; as has likewise Count Byland, Captain Lieutenant in the Regiment of Dragoon Guards, in Quality of Lieutenant Colonel. By Letters from Anspach we hear, that his Serene Highness the Margrave, who has got the Small Pox, and which at first was imagined to be a very bad Sort, is so well recovered as to be out of Danger.

Paris, Feb. 3. Yesterday was the Annual Ceremony of the Procession of the Knights of the Holy Ghost; on which Occasion a Chapter was held, and the Titles of Nobility of the Duke of Chaulnes and M. de Hautefort, whom his most Christian Majesty named to be Knights of that Order on New Year's Day, were produced and approved, and they were accordingly received.
