the Mary Galley, was brought into this Port by one of our Corfairs. She was taken off Giorgenti, whither she had been to take in a Loading of Corn for Malaga, and was seized under a Pretence of her not being furnished with a proper Pass; but M. Hudson, the Dutch Consul, has since obtained the entire Restitution of her and her Cargo.

Revel, Jan. 8. The Troops quartered in this Neighbourhood, under the Command of General Lapuchin, are now compleat, and in very good Condition; they are so disposed as to be able to form a considerable Army in a very short Time; the Magazines for their Subsistance are abundantly supplied with all Necessaries, and they remain very quiet in their Quarters, neither is there the least Appearance of their quitting them; so that the Report that has been lately spread of their having received Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march on the first Notice, appears to be without the least Foundation. On the 29th past, being her Imperial Majesty's Birth Day, the same was celebrated here with great Magnificence. Divine Service in the Morning we had a triple Discharge of the Artillery; at Noon General Lapuchin gave an elegant Entertainment to many Persons of Distinction, and at Night great Part of this City was finely illuminated.

Petersbourg, Jan. 10. When the Empress declared M. Gross, her late Minister at the Court of Berlin, to be one of her Council of State, she annexed to it a Pension of 2000 Rubles per Annum; and her Imperial Majesty has since resolved to employ him in the Department

of Foreign Affairs. Leghorn, Jan. 12. The Differences between the Regency of this Dutchy and the Republick of Lucca, are, as we are affured, in a fair Way of being amicably adjusted, the Emperor, as Grand Duke of Tuscany, having consented that the Magistrates of Lucca shall go on with the Roads they are making over the Mountains, on certain Conditions, which 'tis not doubted but they will readily consent to. A new Duty is laid upon all Sorts of Provisions whatloever coming into or going out of this Port. The Captain of a Maltese Frigat, who arrived here within a few Days, reports, that three Spanish Men of War have taken two Afilcan Shebecks, having on board 377 Men, 68

Brass Cannon, and 90,000 Piastres. We have received Advice, that a most violent Shock of an Earthquake had happened in the Island of St. Vincent in the Brazils, by which the Town of Santos, and Part of the Fortress of St. Vincent, had received very considerable Damage. A Ship from Alexandria is arrived here, the Master of which says, that the contagious Distemper, which lately raged in those Parts, was entirely ceased.

Genoa, Jan. 15. The Regulation that has been settling for some Time past, in order to reform Luxury in this City, was published on the 6th Instant, and is to take Place on the first of March next. The Edict lately published concerning the Bank of St. George, is carried into Execution with all imaginable Success, and the Duties established in Favour of it, are raised without the least Disturbance. M. Chauvelin, Minister Plenipotentiary from his most Christian Majesty to this Republick, is set out from hence for Parma, where 'tis thought he will wait the Arrival of the Marquess de Crussol, who is coming thither to replace the late Count Maulevrier, in Quality of Minister from the Court of France.

Stockholm, Jan. 15. The last Advices from Finland say, that every Thing there remained in persect Tranquillity. Baron Flemming, Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to that of Denmark, arrived here some Days ago from Copenhagen, and will set out again on his Return to that Court towards the End of this Month. The Prince Successor, and the Princess his Spouse, are gone to pass a sew Days at Ulrichs-dahl.

Vienna, Jan. 20. The Funeral Service for the late Empress Dowager has been solemnized for three Days successively in the Church of the Augustins. It began on the 17th, when his Imperial Majesty. with the Princess Charlotte of Lorrain, and the whole Court, went thither and heard Prayers for the Dead, which were read by the Pope's Nuncio. On the 18th the Emperor went thither again, with most of the Imperial Family; when a Funeral Oration, on the Death of the Deceased, was pronounced by Father Tausch, a Jesuit; after which a grand Mass was celebrated pontifically by the Pope's Nuncio; and Yesterday his Imperial Majesty and the Archduke Joseph repaired again to the said Church, and assisted at Divine Service, which ended the Solemnity, all the Bells in this City and Suburbs having tolled almost the whole Time.
